"That's The Way We've Always Done It - Ville"

Values:

- Your group is really concerned with the way things were done in the past.
- Position of authority, jobs, etc. are handed down according to tradition.
- You value the past and see no need for concern about increased economic growth in the future.
- Basically everything in your society is determined by beliefs and customs.

<u>Goals:</u>

- To produce what your ancestors did and in the same way that they did.
- Following tradition is your basic underlying goal.

Situation:

- With your limited resources of string, beads, ruler, and scissors you can create rings, bracelets, and/or necklaces.
- However, your country has always produced bracelets, so everyone will produce bracelets.

Production Procedure:

- Each person must make their own entire bracelet (no specialization of tasks).
- The teacher will designate people to use each of the following first: the string, ruler, and scissors. After using each item, pass it clockwise around the table.
- Each *bracelet* must be made with a 12 inch piece of string and 8 beads in this sequence: 2 red, 2 yellow, 2 blue, and 2 green.
- After the beads are on the string it should be tied in a knot.
- The knot should be neatly trimmed off, as done by past generations.
- After each bracelet is finished it must be passed around the group clockwise and each member must tell the maker how beautiful it is. (This is an old tradition of the country.)
- The maker then hands it to the quality control specialist who records the \$5 if all procedures have been followed correctly.
- According to tradition each person can only make 1 bracelet every 15 minutes before starting another. After you complete your first bracelet, relax for 15 minutes before starting another - sing a traditional folk song, talk with your fellow countrymen, etc.

Sale Prices: Necklace= \$10 Bracelet = \$5 Ring = \$2

Quality Control Specialist

Check to make sure each of the following is correctly completed for each bracelet:

- 12 inch piece of string
- **a** 8 beads in this sequence: 2 red, 2 yellow, 2 blue, and 2 green
- knot tied
- L knot neatly trimmed
- passed around the group clockwise and each member told the maker how beautiful it is
- handed to the quality control specialist (you) by the maker of the bracelet

Record \$5 for the maker if all above procedures have been followed correctly.



"We Do What We're Told - Ville"



Values:

- You've accepted a government which is run by a very strict and strong central leadership group.
- You're highly organized and the people of your group are assigned specific tasks by the leader.
- Your country strives for efficient use of time and resources, which will increase economic growth and hopefully raise the standard of living.
- It is up to the central leaders to determine what is needed and how the resources will be used.

<u>Goals:</u>

- To produce what the central leadership finds necessary for your society.
- Use time and resources efficiently so increased production and growth will occur.

Situation:

- With your limited resources of string, beads, ruler, and scissors you can create rings, bracelets, and/or necklaces.
- However, your country needs 5 bracelets immediately, and then the central planners want your group to produce necklaces.

Production Procedure:

- The central planners emphasize specialization:
 - The person sitting closest to the front of the room will be the string cutter. Then, going clockwise around the group, the next person will be the bead sorter, then the bead stringer, knot tier, and knot trimmer.
- Each *bracelet* must be made with a 12 inch piece of string and 8 beads in this sequence: 2 red, 2 yellow, 2 blue, and 2 green.
- Each *necklace* must be made with a 20 inch piece of string and 10 beads in this sequence: 3 yellow, 3 blue, 2 green, and 2 red.
- After the beads are on the string for both bracelets and necklaces, the string should be tied in a knot and the ends should be neatly trimmed.
- The finished product should then be handed to the quality control person who marks down the appropriate dollar amount.
 - Your group will receive \$10 per person if the required quota of 5 bracelets is filled.
 - After that, the money earned by your production will go to the central planners and not added to your group's total earnings.





Record \$10 for each correctly completed necklace. This money goes to the central planners.

"Make As Much As We Want - Ville"



<u>Values:</u>

- Your country and economic system reflects values which center around rugged individualism. It is up to each person to make him/herself more prosperous than others.
- Your country produces whatever brings the highest price and produces it with the method that costs the least.
- Individual rewards and material incentives are used to encourage and stimulate continuous economic growth and production.

<u>Goals:</u>

- To produce whatever your group decides will be most beneficial.
- To organize yourselves so you can make the most efficient use of time and resources.
- Maximize profit.

Situation:

- With your limited resources of string, beads, ruler, and scissors you can create rings, bracelets, and/or necklaces.
- Your group may produce any combination of rings, bracelets, and/or necklaces.

Production Procedure:

- It is up to you to organize your group and choose jobs in whatever fashion you want. You should have a string cutter, bead sorter, bead stringer, and knot tier.
- Each *ring* must be made with a 6 inch piece of string and 4 beads in this sequence: 1 red, 1 yellow, 1 blue, and 1 green.
- Each *bracelet* must be made with a 12 inch piece of string and 8 beads in this sequence: 2 red, 2 yellow, 2 blue, and 2 green.
- Each *necklace* must be made with a 20 inch piece of string and 10 beads in this sequence: 3 yellow, 3 blue, 2 green, and 2 red.
- After the beads are on the string, the string should be tied in a knot.
- You may trim the knot neatly if you want.
- The finished product must be handed to the quality control person.
- Your group will be paid in full for as many of the items as you can produce within the time limit.
