## Flute

- 1. Anatomy
- 2. Noisemakers
  - "Be sad, spit rice"
  - Two fingers under the lip
  - Chin can move back and forth
  - Three shelfs
- 3. Assembly
- 4. Holding
- 5. Care and Maintenance

#### Flute Care and Maintenance

#### Supplies:

- 1. Flute cleaning rod
- 2. Rectangular cotton rag (an old t-shirt will work) that is approximately 10"x8"
- 3. Polishing cloth

#### Before You Play:

- 1. Always rinse out your mouth with water
- 2. Make sure your hands are clean
- 3. Make sure the case has the correct side up when opening it

#### After You Play

- Use your cotton rag: Threading the corner of the rag through the cleaning rod hold, fold the rest of the rag over the tip of the rod so that the metal end is covered.
- 2. Use the rod to swab out each section of the flute to remove moisture build-up. Do this every time you are done playing and before you put the instrument away!
  - a. Be careful when cleaning out the headjoint you don't want to ram the tuning cork on the inside.
- 3. If the pads get sticky, you may clean them with a dollar bill by putting the bill underneath the key and pressing the key several times. It may take several cleanings to remove the sticky-ness.

#### **Once Every Two Weeks:**

- 1. Carefully polish the exterior of the flute with a polishing cloth. Be careful with the keys wipe them individually so as to avoid accidentally ripping one of the keys off with the cloth.
- 2. Wash the cleaning rag by hand or in the washing machine to avoid mildew.

#### Once a Year:

1. Take the instrument into the music store to have a technician re-align the keys, add key oil to the rods, and check for old or damaged pads.

#### WARNING:

- 1. NEVER leave anything extra (book, papers, music) on top of your flute in the case when you close the lid. This can damage your flute. Keep your music and book in its own folder.
- NEVER leave your flute resting on the music stand make sure it's in the case, on the chair, or on a flute stand.

# Clarinet/Saxophone

- 1. Anatomy
- 2. Noisemakers
  - Awww, oooeeehh, eeewww
  - Thumb on lip as a guide, reverse milkshake, angry cat
  - Ligature "big feet"
- 3. Assembly
  - Find the holes, watch the bridge
- 4. Holding
  - "Pinkies chillin, fingers hoverin"
  - LH thumb angle
- 5. Care and Maintenance
  - SHAKE OUT THE SWAB
  - Reeds off and away

### Oboe/Bassoon/Horn

- 1. Individual holding positions
  - Instrument comes to them
- 2. Horns should have a buddy
- 3. 70/30

# Trumpet

- 1. Anatomy
- 2. Noisemakers
  - Capri-Sun Straw
  - "Drink tea" on the shank
- 3 Assembly
- 4. Holding
  - Marry your trumpet
  - Racquetball right hand, sled down the hill
  - Weight in your left hand
- 5. Care and Maintenance
  - One valve at a time
  - Silent spit

#### **Trumpet Care and Maintenance**

#### Supplies:

- Valve oil 2. Tuning slide grease
- 3. Mouthpiece brush
- 4. "Snake" cleaning tool
- 5. Clean rag

#### Before You Play:

- 1. Always rinse out your mouth with water
- 2. Make sure your hands are clean
- 3. Make sure the case has the correct side up when opening it

#### After You Play

1. Empty the water from both water keys before putting the instrument away

#### Once a Week (or as needed):

- 1. Apply valve oil to the valves. Do one valve at a time:
  - Unscrew the top of the valve casing (not the top pearl keys!) and pull the valve out
  - · Apply 4-6 drops of oil on the valve, avoiding the holes
  - Insert the valve back into the casing, making sure that the valve guide is lined up with the "notch" in the interior of the valve casing
  - Once it's lined up, check it to make sure the valve doesn't turn right or left
  - Screw the top of the valve casing back on and push the valve 10-15 times to work the oil into the valve
- Clean the mouthpiece out with a mouthpiece brush under warm running water. Make 2 sure the brush is wet before putting it in the mouthpiece.

#### Once a Month:

- 1. Remove the tuning slide (carefully!) and clean the interior of the lead pipe and turning slide with the "snake" brush under running water. Make sure the brush is wet before putting it into the lead pipe.
- 2. Remove all the slides to apply new slide grease. Before applying a thin layer of grease, wipe off the old grease with a clean rag. 3. Remove fingerprints from the exterior of the instrument with a polishing cloth.

#### Once a Year:

1. Take the instrument into the music store to have a technician sonic clean the interior of the instrument, check the valve alignment, check the cork on the water key, and remove dents.

#### WARNING:

- 1. NEVER leave anything extra (book, papers, music) on top of your trumpet in the case when you close the lid. This can damage your instrument. Keep your music and book in its own folder.
- NEVER leave your trumpet resting upright on the bell or unattended. Make sure it's in the case, resting on the chair or floor (with the 2<sup>nd</sup> valve up), or on a trumpet stand.
- Secure your mouthpiece inside the case. If you let it rattle around it can dent your 3. trumpet.

## Trombone/Low Brass

- 1. Anatomy
- 2. Noisemakers
  - Regular soda straw
  - Boba tea for tuba
- 3. Assembly
  - Slide on the ground
- 4. Holding
  - "Live long and prosper, then drink tea"
  - Shake out left hands
- 5. Care and Maintenance
  - Spray bottles
  - No oil

### Percussion

- 1. Anatomy mallet instruments
- 2. Noisemakers
  - D in the Doghouse
- 3. Holding
  - Mail delivery
  - Wrists
- 4. Care and Maintenance
  - Percussion section responsibilities
