<u>Course Overview</u>

AP Seminar is a foundational course that engages students in cross-curricular conversations that explore the complexities of academic and real-world topics and issues by analyzing divergent perspectives. Using an inquiry framework, students practice reading and analyzing articles, research studies, and foundational, literary, and philosophical texts; They will also listen to and view speeches, broadcasts, and personal accounts; in addition to experiencing artistic works and performances. Students learn to synthesize information from multiple sources, develop their own perspectives in written essays, and design and deliver oral and visual presentations, both individually and as part of a team. Large areas of study will include: Question and Explore, Understand and Analyze, Evaluate Multiple Perspectives, Synthesize Ideas, Team, Transform, Transmit.

<u>Essential Understandings</u>

- The ability to craft and communicate evidence-based arguments.
- Understand and analyze authors ideas, perspectives and arguments.
- Evaluate multiple perspectives and information with accuracy and precision.
- Narrow research motivated by personal interest and intellectual curiosity to draw conclusions and develop solutions.
- Evaluate the credibility and relevance of source material.
- Align methods of research with the purpose of inquiry.
