- Provide an opportunity for Public Expression. At each Board meeting, the public has an opportunity to address the Board.
- Consider approval of minutes of the July 17, 2017, August 7, 2017, and August 21, 2017 meetings.
- Receive the following Good News for October 2017:
- Highland School of Technology was chosen as a 2017
 National Blue Ribbon School. The distinction is presented by the U.S. Department of Education. Highland is one of only six schools in North Carolina and 342 schools in the country selected for the honor this year.
- 2. The graduation rate for **Gaston County School**s has increased to 88.3 percent, which is the highest ever for the school district. Since the state first calculated the graduation rate in 2006, Gaston County has increased 20.2 points from 68.1 percent to 88.3 percent.
- 3. The overall student proficiency rate on the state end-of-grade and end-of-course tests has increased for **Gaston County Schools**. The proficiency rate for the 2016-2017 academic year is 55 percent compared to 52.9 percent the previous year. Additionally, the district had more schools to exceed academic growth expectations.
- 4. South Point High School student Jessica Helton and Highland School of Technology students Mary Martin and Nicholas Thorpe were selected as semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program. They are three of approximately 16,000 students from across the country chosen for this honor and will continue in the competition for a National Merit Scholarship.

 and plaque unveiling was held on September 26 with
