Strategic Plan approved; Action Teams drive next phase

In each of the last four issues of School Pages we've provided updates and insights into the development of a bold, new five-year Strategic Plan that was approved by the School Board in June.

You may recall we partnered with Catalyst for Educational Change to guide the strategic plan process with 90 stakeholders representing students, staff, parents, business partners and community residents. The Strategic Plan Development Team met for three full-day interactive sessions throughout the spring to review extensive data, reflect on the existing mission and vision, and draft a vision for the future.

One of the hallmarks of this collaborative effort has been transparency. So, I'm excited we've dedicated this issue of School Pages to sharing a visually appealing and informative two-page spread of our new mission, vision statements, core values, five goals, 10 strategies, and the characteristics our students, staff and system exemplify.

The strategic plan is inspired by our community but is focused on cultivating an environment and creating the means to improve student achievement for all.
