




(Meet your Teacher): Brian Hierstein




After college Brian mostly created portraits of friends and relatives with hand carved frames











For the past several years Brian has been working intermittently on a self portrait composed of pinky to thumb sized portraits of everyone he has known throughout his life.








Brian eventually decided to combine his love of realism and Pop culture by working in an art style called Pop Surrealism.

Growing up, Brian loved and admired courageous and outgoing characters. One of his favorite TV icons was Mr. T.

Brian has shaved his head into a Mr. T. style mohawk at least 5 times.

For this painting he painted Mr. T. first and then reverse painted (rather than painting hairs and highlights last you have to paint them first) his image on plexi glass so that it would fit over the other portrait when the cabinet was closed.



Another character Brian admired was The Fonz from Happy Days because he was calm and even tempered.

Brian also studied Buddhism and found parallels between The Fonz and Buddhism.

The painting was done in the style of Buddhist scrolls and the frame was hand carved and hand colored with Buddhist symbols (including Buddha giving a thumbs up.



The trick to art is trying to create something that is not usually shown.

Brian loves Jurassic Park but images of the characters with dinosaurs are used too often.


Brian decided to combine his favorite movie characters with one of his favorite activities (using shopping carts as skate boards.
