As the spring FFA season comes to an end, thirteen members will attend the State FFA Convention in Columbia April 21-22 to represent Stanberry FFA. FFA members will also conclude the year with their Vocational Banquet on April 28th alongside FCCLA and FBLA.

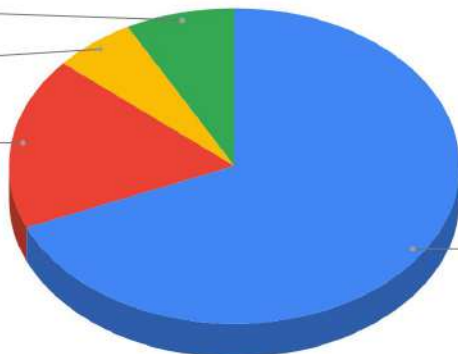

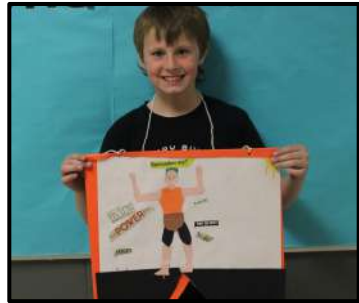

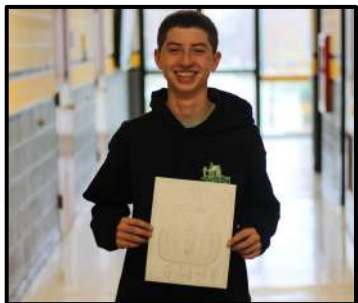
