

### **New Building Planned**

Stanberry R-II is in the process of adding on a new building. With student enrollment growing, it's necessary to add new space in order to keep classes relatively small. The plan is to build a new ag building by the high school section of the school and renovate the old ag space into three classrooms for the special elementary and education students. This will keep elementary classrooms near the elementary and prevent the long walk high school students face if they are enrolled in any agriculture classes.

The building is still currently in the planning stages, with designs being drawn and perfected. They hope to start building in November and have the project completed by the end of the school year. After that, the old ag room will be

renovated over the summer.

Superintendent Mr. Heddinger commented, "I'm very excited for the school and community to see the growing numbers. These projects should carry the school district well into the future." Agriculture teacher and FFA advisor, Mrs. Korinne Noble added, "I am very excited about the new ag building! It will be wonderful to be on the high school end of the building and be closer to the greenhouse that we are building this fall. The new building and greenhouse provide will students with a fresh and exciting learning experience."

Finally, the current weight room will be added onto as a space for the wrestling team and for the community to use. Each of these three phases is planned to be completed by the start of the 2022-23 school year.

#### **Special Education Public Notice**

All responsible public agencies are required to locate, evaluate, and identify children with disabilities who are under the jurisdiction of the agency, regardless of the severity of the disability, including children attending private schools, children who live outside the district but are attending a private school within the district, highly mobile children, such as migrant and homeless children, children who are wards of the state, and children who are suspected of having a disability and in need of special education even though they are advancing from grade to grade. The **Stanberry R-II School District** assures that it will provide information and referral services necessary to assist the State in the implementation of early intervention services for infants and toddlers eligible for the Missouri First Steps program.

The **Stanberry R-II School District** assures that

personally identifiable information collected, used, or maintained by the agency for the purposes of identification, evaluation, placement or provision of FAPE of children with disabilities may be inspected and/or reviewed by their parents/guardians.

Parents/guardians may request amendment to the educational record if the parent/guardian believes the record is inaccurate, misleading, or violates the privacy or other rights of their child. Parents have the right to file complaints with the U.S. Department of Education or the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education concerning alleged failures by the district to meet the requirements of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

The Stanberry R-II School District has developed a Local Compliance Plan for implementation of State Regulations for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). This plan contains the agency's policies and procedures regarding storage, disclosure to third parties, retention and destruction of personally identifiable information and the agency's assurances that services are provided in compliance with the General Education Provision Act (GEPA). This plan may be reviewed during regular business hours from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday when school is in session.

This notice will be provided in native languages as appropriate.

#### Dear Parent.

The U.S. Congress has passed education legislation entitled "No Child Left Behind." One of the requirements of this legislation is parent notification if a class is going to be taught by someone other than a highly qualified (fully-certified) for four weeks or more. This notification would apply if a long-term substitute teacher who is not fully certified for the assignment, even though that person does hold a state-issued certificate to substitute teach, were assigned to cover a class. This would also apply if the school district were waiting on issuance of a teaching certificate or renewal of a certificate from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). Technically the teacher has the credentials, but the process of issuing the certificate could take longer than four weeks.

At this time, the teachers of the Stanberry R-II School District all hold valid certificates, and we do not anticipate any longer term substitute situations. We are fulfilling the requirements of No Child Left Behind by issuing this notice. We are very proud of all our staff members, and we can assure you that your child is receiving a quality education. #### **Information Notice**

The Stanberry R-II School District designates name, address, and telephone listing as "directory information". Historically Stanberry R-II School District does not release this information to third parties. Under the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and the National Defense Authorization Act for the Fiscal Year 2002 schools are required to provide these directory lists upon request to military recruiters. They are to be used specifically for armed services for recruiting purposes and informing young people of the

scholarship opportunities associated with the military. Under law, parents may also opt out of providing this directory information to third parties as well as military recruiters upon notification to the school. While we will accommodate our armed services we will continue to be cautious in releasing information as we have in the past unless law requires us to do otherwise.

Their options included: barricade yourself in Walmart, fly to Antarctica, form an army and fight, become a zombie, or make a cure?


### **Book Review**






Song Review

The season got underway at Appleton City. With 10:58 left in the second quarter, the Bulldogs were up 44-0 on the opposing team. Tucker Schieber carried the ball for 3 touchdowns, Tyler Schwebach scored on punt return, Ethan Oldham had a running touchdown, and Austin

Colvin had a blocked punt and scored. Tyler Schwebach stated, "We scored early and held them on defense. That's how the game played out the whole night."

Heading back home for game 2, Stanberry faced the Albany Warriors in a beatdown. Stanberry started with touchdown taking only 5 plays to get Schieber in the endzone. Next series, the Bulldogs forced a 4 and out and Schieber ran it 61 yards to the house. Stanberry finished the game at halftime with a score of 50-0. They advance 2-0 on the year (1-0, GRC-8). Head coach Shane Hilton said, "we are off to a good start this season both in practice and on Friday nights. The boys have been doing a good job of staying focused through all the

heat and other distractions. I am looking forward to seeing how we progress and improve as the season continues." Heading to the defensive side, assistant coach Jeffrey Maronde stated, "we have executed really well. Definitely had a lot of fun. Bulldogs on a 4 and out. They took the ball to the endzone for the lead. With the game on the line, the Bulldogs rolled out on a pass, Austin Schwebach kept the ball and took it in for the touchdown. For the lead, Schwebach again kept the ball and took it straight up the gut for the 2-point conversion. Score is 34-32. Stanberry stopped the Wildkats on defense and ran the clock out for another Bulldogs victory. They advance to 3-0 (2-0, GRC-8) on the season.

Heading to week 4 the football boys were to face Osceola. They were ready to take down anyone in their way. However, Osceola's team came down with Covid and they were forced to forfeit. Stanberry was bummed they couldn't face them, but they kept their heads up and prepared for week 5 against the Pattonsburg Panthers.


