Some examples of activities students have done that show Creativity:

- designing HUHS Homecoming banners, posters, etc.
- planning meals and shopping for a disadvantaged Charlotte family
- planning, creating, and packaging holiday cards to the poor, people living in shelters, etc.
- planning and completing service projects for Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts
- assisting elementary students with Kids Voting
- playing, dancing, carrying a flag in the marching band
- helping paint a mural at an elementary school
- acting in a drama production
- making a sculpture for a community exhibit
- planning and participating in a Halloween parade
- providing a story-telling hour at the day care center, library, or nursing home
- participating in debate or chess competitions

Some examples of activities students have done that show Action:

- packaging and delivering holiday cards
- playing on school, church, or after-school league athletic teams; being the team manager
- participating in a Crop Walk
- helping teachers with room setup, lab preparation, etc., after school
- helping at school events (e.g., as "tour guides" on Parent Night)
- planning and participating in club activities with an active component
- participating in a peaceful demonstration for a political cause
- helping build a Habitat for Humanity house
- completing service projects for Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, etc.
- cleaning/planting areas of the school campus
- donating blood
- mowing grass or doing yard work for a disabled or elderly neighbor

Some examples of activities students have done that show Service:

- volunteering time at a special club event that helps others (beyond the club itself)
- peer tutorials for students at HUHS or another school
- completing service projects for Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, etc.
- assisting at a booth for a non-profit-making festival (e.g., Latin American Festival)
- reading/judging middle-school science fair projects
- assisting elementary students with Kids Voting
- volunteering for a political campaign (for a candidate who is NOT a relative)
- volunteering at a nursing home, hospital, clinic, etc.
- helping with Special Olympics
- working with a relief center such as Crisis Assistance Ministries
- helping build a Habitat for Humanity house
