

Arts Integration

On every grade level, Casey students are learning science, math, language, and other subjects through artsintegrated lessons.

Ms. Kling's first graders made their own musical instruments and collages of "cubist" musicians in the style of Picasso to explore the idea of singular and plural.








Third graders used their knowledge of animal habitats and adapta-

tions to design their own "wild things." They made haunted houses to display geometric arrays. And they made "food chain" pictures that clearly show which animals devour others.









In fourth grade, Ms. Haynes's students made salt dough relief maps of Mississippi complete with topographic features and color coded geographic regions. They have also written original state songs for Mississippi. And they have tested their cooperation and engineering skills with a simple string device for stacking paper cups.
