Helping the Needy

- Conditions in the slums shocked many middle class people.
- Moved by social conscience or religious idealism, thousands of people joined groups to improve society.
- The New York Charity Organization Society -Founded in 1882 by Josephine Shaw Lowell helped the needy with advice and assistance to help their situation.

- Social Gospel Movement -A social reform movement that developed within religious institutions and sought to apply the teachings of Jesus directly to society.
- Thousands of educated
 young men and women put
 the social gospel into
 practice using an innovative
 reform program called the
 settlement movement.
- <u>Reformers believed that</u> <u>prosperous Americans</u> <u>should lead reform efforts.</u>

The Settlement Movement

- <u>Settlement House A</u>
 <u>community center organized to</u>
 <u>provide various services to the</u>
 <u>urban poor.</u>
- In 1889, Jane Addams and Ellen Gates Starr turned a run-down mansion into a place for immigrants to come and stay.
- Over the decades Addams and Starr turned the mansion into a center of community activity.
- <u>People of the settlement</u> <u>movement believed that social</u> <u>workers should live in poor</u> <u>neighborhoods.</u>







The Development of Sociology

- Scholars in Europe and America were trying to develop a scientific way of looking at how people lived.
- Philosopher Auguste Comte coined the term sociology.
- <u>Sociology The Study of</u> <u>how people interact with</u> <u>one another in a society.</u>



Controlling Immigration and Behavior

- Many Americans linked the problems of the cities to the new immigrants.
- In 1859 the Know-Nothing Party had gained many followers by vowing to restrict immigration.
- <u>Nativism The favoring of</u> <u>native-born Americans over</u> <u>immigrants.</u>
- <u>Nativists also believed in</u> <u>teaching only American</u> <u>culture in schools</u>

- In the late 1800's the
 <u>Temperance Movement</u>
 began a <u>campaign to</u>
 <u>eliminate alcohol</u>
 <u>consumption.</u>
- They supported
 prohibition a ban on
 the manufacture and
 sale of alcoholic
 beverages.
- <u>They saw a link between</u> <u>drinking and lower</u> <u>public morals.</u>

Purity Crusaders

- As cities grew, drugs, gambling, prostitution, and other forms of vice became big business.
- <u>Vice immoral or</u> <u>corrupt activity</u>, was not unique to the cities
- Large urban cities made vice highly visible and very profitable.

- <u>Purity crusaders wanted</u> to rid the cities of Vice.
- This started in 1873 with with the founding of the New York Society for the Suppression of Vice.
- The following year a law was passed that outlawed obscene materials to be sent through the mail.
- Purity crusaders were also known for attacking political machines and corruption.
