<u>ATTENTION SIXTH GRADE PARENTS:</u> <u>NEW STATE IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS</u> <u>FOR SEVENTH GRADE</u>

By the start of next school year, your child is required to have a Tdap AND a meningitis shot. You must provide the school with written verification of both of these vaccinations from your healthcare provider. Failure to do so will result in exclusion from school on Friday, September 9 and will continue until this requirement is met. This requirement is a state law. Please contact your child's physician now to see if your child has already had these shots or to make arrangements to receive them. We have already begun accepting written verification of these vaccinations for next school year. This vaccination can also be obtained through the Geauga Co. General Health District. The health district holds monthly walk-in immunization clinics. To view their schedule click on link below.

Meningitis Vaccine Fact Sheet

Meningitis

Meningitis is an inflammation of the fluid covering the brain and spinal cord. There are two types:

- Viral meningitis: Caused by a virus, generally less severe and clears up without specific treatment.
- Bacterial meningitis: Caused by bacteria, can be quite severe and may result in brain damage, hearing loss, limb loss or death.

Who's at Risk?

- Anyone who hasn't been vaccinated is at-risk meningococcal bacteria are spread from person to person through coughing, kissing and sneezing.
- Adolescents aged 16 to 21 are at highest risk for contracting the disease¹. College students are especially susceptible to moningitis because they live in close quarters with other students and often have poor eating and health-care habits.

Vaccination Information

- The MCWI vaccine, used to prevent bacterial meningitis, should be administered between the ages of 11 and 12.
- The vaccination should then be supplemented by a booster dose at age 16.
- There are two available vaccines for meningits: Menactra, produced by Sanofi Pasteur; and Menveo, produced by Novartis.
- Adolescents entering most colleges are required to have a maningitis vaccination in order to live on campus.
- 53.6 percent of adolescents aged 13-17 had vaccine coverage in 2009, up from 41.8 percent in 2008. In Ohio, that number was 53.7 percent, essentially on par with the national average but still below CDC recommendations?.

Why should I protect my child against Meningitis?

In a school setting, your child has close contact with other children and is at high risk of contracting bacterial meningitis. Bacterial meningitis is an extremely serious disease that has a 10 percent death rate³. In instances where it is not fatal, it can still lead to permanent brain damage, loss of hearing and limb loss, potentially inflicting a life-long disability on your child.

Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis Vaccine (Tdap)

The Diseases

Tetanus: Tetanus (lockjaw) is a serious disease that causes painful fightening of the muscles, usually all over the body. It can lead to "locking" of the jaw, making it impossible to open the mouth or swallow. Tetanus leads to death in about 1 in 10 cases. Tetanus enters the body through a break in the skin.

Watch out for: The bacteria are usually found in soli, dust and manure and enter the body through breaks in the skin – usually cuts or puncture wounds.

Diphtheriat, Diphtheria is an infectious disease that causes a sore threat, painful swallowing and difficulty breathing, among other symptoms. Diphtheria also leads to death in about 1 in 10 cases.

Watch out for Diphtheria is transmitted through sneezing or coughing. Overcrowding and poor living conditions can further contribute to the spread of diphtheria.

Pertussis: Pertussis, also known as whooping cough, is a highly contagious bacterial disease. Symptoms are initially mild, and then develop into severe coughing fits. This disease can last 6-10 weeks or longer, which can create significant setbacks for children at school?

Watch out for: Portussis is spread when an intected person sneezes, coughs, or even talks.

Immunization Information

- People aged 11 through 18 who have not been vaccinated against these diseases should receive the Tdap vaccine, followed by additional tetanusdiphtheria (Td) booster doses every 10 years after that.
- Two brands of Tdap vaccine are available: Adacet, produced by Sanoff Pasteur, and Boostrix, produced by ClaxoSmithKline.



- Children in Ohio are required to have the Tdap immunization prior to 7th grade entry.
- 55.6 percent of adolescents agod 13-17 had 1dap vaccine coverage in 2009, up from 40.8 percent in 2008. In Ohlo, that number was 50.2 percent, slightly lower than the national averages.

Why should I protect my child from these diseases?

Your child is in a school environment, exposed to hundreds of other children who could be carrying the diseases. Your child may be fine now, but one cough is all it takes to become infected with diphtheria or perfussis, which could lead to death or severe illness. Even when symptoms are not serious, your child can pass perfussis along to Infants who are not old enough to be veccinated. Perfussis can be fatal in infants.

6th Grade Newsletter-May 2016

As we continue through the 4th quarter, some reminders:

- Please be sure your child has the supplies needed for each class. Many students
 are coming to class without paper, pencils, textbooks, calculators, red pens,
 assignment notebooks, etc.
- With spring here, you may want to go over the dress code policy in the student handbook.
- Students should be <u>reading every night (4/5 school nights for Mrs. Haeberle and Mrs. Rosengard) for 30 minutes</u>. This is an integral part of their Language Arts class and is not optional.

<u>ABSENCES</u>: – Please check teacher Weebly web sites for missed work, handouts, and PowerPoints. It is the student's responsibility to see each teacher for missed work including tests and quizzes. For each day a student is absent he/she has that number of days to make up assignments. We will certainly do our best to get students caught up, but missed instruction cannot be recreated.

In 6th grade Social Studies we are currently studying Ancient Egypt. We will be starting a simulation which recreates almost exactly the mummification the Egyptians used. Ancient Egyptian mummies remain a popular unit of study for countless middle-school students. Ancient Egyptians believed that mummification was necessary to ensure a safe journey to the afterlife. We are going to get students interested in the subject by involving them in the creation and burial of a mummy. By creating a class mummy, re-enacting the mummification process and making accessories for the burial procedure, your child's class will receive a fascinating hands-on lesson in ancient Egyptian history. Over the next several weeks, students will practice their mummifying skills on a whole chicken carcass purchased at a grocery store. They will remove any innards and dry its body completely with paper towels, rub it with strong-smelling spices such as cloves or rosemary, pour salt over the body and pack it into the body cavity, and place the chicken mummy into a plastic storage bag. Several times they will respice and re-salt the carcass. When the chicken is completely drained of liquid, they will wrap it in gauze strips, decorate it with amulets and jewels and "bury" it.







Wrestling Technique Tuesday Clinic Series


This summer the Chardon Wrestling coaching staff and wrestlers will be hosting a summer camp technique series.

Starting June 7th, technique sessions will be held each Tuesday from 6-8 pm in the CHS Lee Kemp Wrestling Room. The series will encompass six 2-hour sessions and will cover the following topics:

- June 7: Takedown set-ups and heavy hands
- 2. June 14: Takedown finishes and counter attacks
- 3. June 21: Breakdowns, pinning and bottom Work
- June 28/July 5: Leg riding turning and pinning combinations (2 sessions)
- 5. Monday July 11: Short offense scoring without shooting

Chardon Youth through incoming 9th graders are encouraged to attend, wrestlers will be grouped by experience and each wrestler will receive a t-shirt on the first day of the series.
