There is much to celebrate over this past year. We have worked tirelessly to implement all initiatives for our district strategic plan, Vision 2026. We are confident this work will accelerate learning, focusing on student educational opportunities and wellness.

Paige Leddy, a Richmond Elementary Educator, was selected as the RI Milken Elementary Educator of the Year. Paige is an excellent representative for our district and state. Paige is a fantastic educator and an asset to our Chariho community. We are thrilled that she received what educators call the "Oscars of Teaching." Paige attributed her award to all the fantastic educators that she works with and that her award was a team effort. In addition, Chariho Middle School Teacher Michelle Conary Brittain was named the 2023 Middle School STEAM Educator of the Year, and Chariho Alternative Learning Academy Teacher Adrienne Buckley was named 2023 RI Environmental Education Teacher of the Year. Congratulations to Paige, Michelle, and Adrienne!

The 2024 US News & World Report ranked Chariho Regional High School in the Top 10 among all RI High Schools. Chariho High School's Advanced Placement (AP) exam performance is strong, with most students outperforming state and global data across many subject areas. Seventy-three percent of Chariho AP students earned a score of 3, meaning that a student has proven capable of doing similar work in an introductory-level college course.

CHARIHOTech's Construction Technology Program worked with Habitat for Humanity to build a home in the community again, and we will continue to partner with them to build another house this coming year. CHARIHOTech also has a newly recognized Visual Arts career and technical program and we have received a food truck through a RIDE grant to expand opportunities in our CTC programs!

Our newest Chariho Charger is our therapy dog in training, Hope. Hope is an Australian Labradoodle. The principal at Hope Valley Elementary, Mr. Gencarelli, is Hope's handler. Our students and staff are absolutely in love with our newest addition. Research has shown that school therapy dogs can reduce the stress hormone cortisol and boost academic focus. In the process, they relieve anxiety and heighten students' motivation to participate in learning activities. In a time of higher-than-normal anxiety, Hope has supported positivity and excitement across our district.

Ashaway Elementary School has received a 5-star rating, and Charlestown, Hope Valley, and Richmond Elementary schools are ranked as 4-star elementary

schools based on our State proficiency data. The district continues to grow strongly, with Richmond Elementary seeing the highest growth. RIDE has a special segment entitled "RICAS RockStars," which highlights the efforts of our students and staff at Richmond.

Our Health and Wellness Subcommittee worked diligently to revise our Health and Wellness policy to include language regarding mental health, outdoor learning, and farm-to-school opportunities. We are also in our second year partnering with the Chris Collins Foundation to train Peer Mentors at the middle and high school to support their peers and work on removing mental health stigmas.

We continue to enhance our work by exploring grant opportunities. We are continuing our work with Project AWARE this year, which is a multi-year \$1.2 million dollar grant. In 2024, we received numerous grants including a USDA [Project SCALES](#) grant, which will support increasing local foods in our school breakfasts and lunches. We also installed outdoor learning spaces and pollinator gardens across the District with our [Green Team](#) and our Learning Inside Out Grant.


We continue to review facility needs in our Capital Improvement Plan, which requires approximately \$30 million dollars for the entire district over the next five years to keep our schools safe, warm, and dry. For that reason, the district has done extensive facility reviews. We will continue to work on plans to upgrade our elementary school buildings while remaining fiscally responsible for all Chariho taxpayers.

Chariho High School is proud to offer 25 Advanced Placement (AP) courses, which is one of the highest numbers of offerings in any high school in the state. Our AP enrollment is open to all students who want to challenge themselves without the need for a teacher recommendation. A score of "3" or "Qualified" means that a student is capable of doing the work of an introductory college course in a particular subject.

92% of our AP English Literature and 91% of our AP US History students scored a 3 or better on their AP exam.

89% of our AP Chemistry and 87% of our AP Calculus students scored a 3 or better on their AP exam.

High School Poetry Out Loud Finalists Regan Clark, Carter Stolt and Penelope Nicolas



Senior Ryan Currier took 1st place (157 lbs) at the South County Invitational and earned Most Outstanding Wrestler honors. He was also the 157 lb champion at the Chad Antoch Memorial Wrestling Tournament this past weekend.

Congratulations to the Chariho High School Girls' Basketball Team for defeating six-time defending champion South Kingstown 48-32 in the Westerly Community Credit Union Holiday Tournament. Last time Chariho Girls' won the Tournament was in 1991. Charlie Edmunds received the Joseph N. Cugini Service award (given to a player on the winning team who demonstrates the spirit and importance of community service and leadership within the team and community); Tori Babineau earned the Bob Bewlay Sportsmanship Award; Jules White was named to the All-Tournament Team and Keira Frias was selected as the Most Valuable Player. High School Coach is Dan LaBelle.

High School Boys' Basketball player Owen Apice was named to the All-Tournament Team at the Westerly Community Credit Union Holiday Tournament.

High School Girls' Indoor Track: On January 13th, Erin vonHousen had another record-setting afternoon with two 1st place finishes at the Yale University High School Track Classic. She won the 1000 and broke her own mark set last year at the Last Chance Qualifier in Providence; her winning time in the 3000 lowered her record time that she broke two weeks ago. Both of her new record times in those events are the best so far this winter in Rhode Island. On January 27th, Erin vonHousen broke the school record she set three weeks ago in the 600 with a 1st place

time of 1:42:41; she also won the 3,000. Emily Brown set three personal bests winning the 55 hurdles, placing 2nd in the long jump and 3rd in the 600. Weeko Thompson won the shot put.

At the Class Medium Indoor Track and Field Championships, held the first week in February, Emily Brown finished 2nd in the long jump breaking the previous program mark set in 2011. She also set personal marks in the 55 hurdles for 3rd place and the 600 for 4th place. Erin vonHousen continued her assault on breaking her own records with a personal-best 1st place finish in the 1500; this time is also the best in the State this season. Weeko Thompson won the shot put with a season-best throw.

High School Boys' Indoor Track: On January 13th, Eli Sposao finished 5th in the 300 which broke the mark he set last week at the URI Indoor Track Classic; it is the third fastest time in RI this year. On January 27th, he won the 300 in a Southern Division Tri-Meet at the Providence Career and Technical Academy and he won this event again at the Class Medium Championships.

Senior Brooklyn Vacca qualified for the State Tournament on all four apparatuses and in the All-Around in a Division II Tri-Meet at Newport YMCA. She recorded a personal best on the beam (8.7) and recorded scores of 8.75 on floor, 8.6 on vault and 8.05 on bars. 







Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act (FERPA)

A federal law designed to protect the privacy of a student's education records, FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's educational records. These rights transfer to the student, or former student, who has reached the age of 18 or is attending any school beyond the high school level. Students and former students to whom the rights have transferred are called eligible students. Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review all of the student's education records maintained by the school. Parents and eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records believed to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record commenting on the contested information in the record.

Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student before releasing any information from a student's record. However, the law allows schools to disclose records, without consent, to the following parties:

1. School officials, including school employees and contractors, who have a need to know;
2. Other schools to which a student is transferring;
3. Certain government officials in order to carry out lawful functions;
4. Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
5. Organizations conducting certain studies for the school;
6. Accrediting organizations;
7. Individuals who have obtained court orders or subpoenas;
8. Persons who need to know in cases of health and safety emergencies;
9. State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific state law; and
10. Another school in which a student enrolls.

Parents have the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the Chariho Regional School District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA are:

Schools may also disclose, without consent, directory type information such as a student's name, address, email address, telephone number, honors and awards, date and place of birth, height and weight of athletes, grade level, photographs, participation in officially-recognized activities and sports, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. If you wish to opt out from the disclosure of directory information, please complete the form at the bottom of the next page and return it to your child's school by the end of September or within one week from date of new student registration.

Notification of Rights Under the Protection of Pupil Rights (PPRA) Amendment

PPRA affords parents, students who are 18, or emancipated minors ("eligible students") certain rights regarding our conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include the right to:

Consent before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following protected areas ("protected information survey") if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the U.S. Department of Education (ED) -

1. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent;
2. Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
3. Sex behavior or attitudes;
4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
5. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
6. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
7. Income, other than as required by law, to determine program eligibility.

Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of -

1. Any other protected information survey, regardless of funding;
2. Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or scoliosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under state law; and
3. Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of personal information obtained from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others.

Inspect, upon request and before administration or use -

1. Surveys of students;
2. Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
3. Instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum.

The School District has developed a policy, in consultation with parents, regarding these rights, and has made arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of protected information surveys and the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes. The School District will directly notify parents and eligible students of this policy at least annually at the start of each school year and after any substantive changes are made. Parents of students who believe their rights under PPRA may have been violated may file a complaint with ED by writing the Family Policy Compliance Office. Complaints must contain specific allegations of fact giving reasonable cause to believe that a violation of PPRA occurred.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION POLICY

School Offender Registration and Community Notification Act

At the beginning of each school year, the Chariho Regional School District is required, under Rhode Island's Sexual Offender Registration and Community Notification Act (R.I. Gen. Laws § 11-37.1-1 et seq.), and in compliance with guidelines issued by the Department of the Attorney General, to submit to local law enforcement agencies a directory of the names and addresses of parents who have children attending schools in Chariho.

The Rhode Island Sexual Offender Registration and Community Notification Act requires certain offenders to be registered with law enforcement agencies and, in certain instances, requires local law enforcement agencies to provide notification to the community.

The Rhode Island Attorney General's Department has issued guidelines for the procedures to be utilized in connection with community notification. Under the Attorney General's guidelines, the Chariho Regional School District is required to submit a directory listing of the names and addresses of parents whose children attend school in the district. In keeping with Chariho's responsibilities under the law and the Attorney General's guidelines, Chariho will be submitting a directory listing of all parents who have children attending schools in Chariho to the local law enforcement authorities.

In the event that a local police department determines that it is appropriate to provide community notification to the parents of children attending school, this directory will be utilized; and you may receive offender fact sheets from the law enforcement agency unless and until you notify Chariho that you wish your name(s) to be removed from the directory or until you no longer have children attending school within the district, whichever comes first.

Below is a form which you may utilize if you choose to opt-out from the disclosure of directory information. If it is your preference not to be listed in the directory, please complete the form, indicating the name(s) of your child or children, your address, and affix your signature(s). Please return the form to your child's school by the end of September or within one week from date of new student registration. Information will be included in the directory unless we receive this form, signed by you.
