Unit 3: Petroleum: Breaking and Making Bonds

Essential Understandings	▪ The physical world contains basic elements whose structure can be studied. ▪ Matter is transformed in accordance with various chemical laws and principles. ▪ Energy is a fundamental part of physical and chemical changes. ▪ Heat is one of the fundamental forms of energy affecting change and order of matter in our universe.
Essential Questions	▪ What are important chemical and physical properties of hydrocarbons? ▪ Why are hydrocarbons commonly used as fuels? ▪ Why are carbon-based molecules so versatile as chemical building blocks? ▪ What properties are important to consider in finding substitutes for petroleum?
Essential Knowledge	▪ Petroleum (crude oil), is a nonrenewable resource that must be refined prior to use, consists of a complex mixture of hydrocarbon molecules. ▪ The distribution of crude oil reserves does not necessarily correspond to areas of high petroleum use. ▪ Liquid substances can often be separated according to their differing boiling points in a process called distillation. ▪ The atoms in hydrocarbons and in other molecules are held together by covalent bonds. ▪ Molecules can be represented by Lewis dot structures, structural formulas, or molecular formulas.

The Physical Setting D3.Matter and Energy Students describe the structure, behavior, and interactions of matter at the atomic level and the relationships between matter and energy. - Describe the structure of atoms in terms of neutrons, protons, and electrons and the role of the atomic structure in determining chemical properties. - Describe how the number and arrangement of atoms in a molecule determine a molecule's properties, including the types of bonds it makes with other molecules and its mass, and apply this to predictions about chemical reactions. - Explain the essential roles of carbon and water in life processes. - Describe how light is emitted and absorbed by atoms' changing energy levels, and how the results can be used to identify a substance. - Describe factors that affect the rate of chemical reactions (including concentration, pressure, temperature, and the presence of molecules that encourage interaction with other molecules. - Apply an understanding of the factors that affect the rate of chemical reaction to predictions about the rate of chemical reactions. - Describe nuclear reactions, including fusion and fission, and the energy they release. - Describe the radioactive decay and half-life. - Explain the relationship between kinetic and potential energy and apply the knowledge to solve problems. - Describe how in energy transformations the total amount of energy remains the same, but because of inefficiencies (heat, sound, and vibration) useful energy is often lost through radiation or conduction. - Apply an understanding of energy transformations to solve problems. - Describe the relationship among heat, temperature, and pressure in terms of the actions of atoms, molecules, and ions.

Sample Lessons And Activities	▪ Perform a laboratory experiment that uses distillation to separate a mixture of two liquids. ▪ Using data of hydrocarbon boiling points make predictions by answering questions regarding many selected hydrocarbons. ▪ In an investigation of alkanes, assemble models of several simple hydrocarbon molecules and then answer the accompanying questions. ▪ Explore trends in alkane boiling points by plotting trends on a graph and extrapolate the results. ▪ As an end of unit project create and present an advertisement featuring an imaginary but plausible vehicle that uses a particular type of fuel.
