

1. Introductory Paragraph




- An engaging hook/ lead to grasp the reader's attention and give the reader a sense of what your essay is about
- Key background or context to help the reader understand the topic of your essay
- Your claim


2. Body Paragraphs

- Restate claim
- Text evidence
 - Opener (According to...)
 - Quotation marks
 - Citation (Author/Source)
- Description of the key parts of your evidence
- Reasoning clear explanation of how this evidence supports the claim









3. Conclusion

- Restate your claim
- A final thought


