Literary Elements Characteristic of Comedy

A Comedy represents the world as it should be. The central metaphors are spring or rebirth.

Setting: The story is set in a world of experience. There may be outside scenes of nature and greenery and flowers.

Characters - The hero or heroine does not possess the outstanding qualities of the romantic or tragic hero. They show the potential good in normal people. They are often young, in spirit if not in years. They display flexibility and wit.

Stock Characters may include some or all of the following:

An Imposter The straight man (churl) a miserly,

snobbish killjoy

The Buffoon (clown)

The blocking force (usually an authority

An Imp or facilitator figure)

There is often a matchmaker

Plot The plot may show the rise of the common man and the recognition of a new, freer society.

In romantic comedies there is usually a romantic triangle including the two people who should be together and the third person who must be displaced.

The hero/heroine struggles to make a difference, protect individuality, or get the girl/boy.

There are often double plots.

There is always a happy ending.
