American Halloween Mask

Halloween has originated from the old Celtic festival. The tradition of dressing in costume for Halloween has both European and Celtic roots.

On Halloween, men painted a mask on their face with blackened ashes from the sacred bonfire and dressed up as fearsome beings.

It was believed that this is the last night for the dead to have their vengeance before moving on so people wore masks and costumes not to be recognized, to scare away evil spirits and to prevent them from entering homes.







Venetian Carnival Masks



Worn during Carnival in Venice, these world-famous masks date back to the 13th century.

The origin of the masks is unknown, but some theories suggest that they were donned in rebellion to the rigid society of the times.

Venetian masks range in quality, size and material, from cheap papier mâché eye masks to porcelain face masks with long noses or elaborate feathers. They were originally made by skilled craftsmen called the mascherari.

Today they can be purchased as shops throughout Venice to wear during the 11 days of Carnival, which happen in January or February, depending on where Easter falls.



Mexican Day of the Dead Masks

Dia de los Muertos masks represent calaveras, or skulls.

The celebration originated as a way to honor the deceased and acknowledge death as a natural part of life.

The festivities are on November 1st and 2nd throughout Mexico and Latin America, with celebrants wearing skullshaped masks or face paint and colorful costumes and hats.



Chinese New Year Masks





On the biggest holiday of the year in the most populous country in the world, various masks are worn during week-long celebrations to ring in the new year.

Made from materials including stones, metal and leather, these colorful masks are designed to display the moods and emotions associated with the festival.

The masks represent the deities, spirits and fabled animals that Chinese New Year mythology originated from.

Venezuelan Dancing Devils of Yare


Masks to some theories, the Dancing Devils originated in the fifth century in Spain, when the Catholic Church used the dance to convert pagans to Christianity.

In Venezuela, it was used to draw African slaves into the religious celebrations.

Across Venezuela, there are 11 "cofradias", or religious groups, following the Dancing Devils tradition.

Traditionally, only men used to be part of the cofradias, but in Naiguata women are now allowed to join in the procession





African Festima Masks



Officially dubbed the International Festival of Masks and Arts, Festima is a centuries old tradition celebrated in several West African countries, including the Ivory Coast, Senegal and Burkina Faso.

Mask making is an ancient custom in Africa, and Festima is celebrated to protect the tradition. Festima masks made of wood, straw, leaves and textiles represent animals and ancestral spirits.

Many locals believe that mask wearers embody the subject of the masks.



Japanese Shimokita Tengu Matsuri

Shimokita Tengu Matsuri is also known as the long rednosed goblins festival, which describes the design of the masks on parade floats and festival-goers alike.

The long red nose on the mask is a portrayal of a bird's beak, and the facial features resemble a human, following the mythological Tengu, a bird-like anthropomorphized creature in Japanese folklore.

Shimokita Tengu Matsuri is held in Tokyo over three days in late January and early February. The festival centers around a parade, drum performance and the throwing of edible, roasted soybeans into the crowd.





Vietnamese Traditional Opera Masks







Tuồng or hát bội is a form of Vietnamese classical theatre. Face make up in tuồng is quite peculiar. Depending on the character, the artist's face is covered with a thick layer of red, white or black powder that looks like a mask.

Tuồng masks are highly symbolic. Face color represents the background and/or personality of the character.

- White colour is used mostly for women, scholars or urban dwellers.
- Red colour is for loyal war heroes.
- Black faces usually belong to straightforward and hot-tempered martial men.
- Thick lines are also drawn around the character's eyes. These are more or less slanting, depending on the age, and the colour is also related to the character's background and personality.

Building your Mask Steps Overview:

Step 1: Vaseline the mask form Step 2: Build-up 4 areas with the clay & vaseline the top of clay Step 3: Start paper mâché & newspaper Step 4: Keep adding paper mâché & newspaper Step 5: Adding 8 to 10 Layers of newspaper & paper mâché Step 6: Use a solid light color that can be painted on to add 3 to 4 layers of solid color paper & paper mâché Step 7: Let dry overnight Step 8: Once dry, remove from the mask form Step 9: Clean the Mask Form and get checked off Step 10: Paint using a minimum of 5 colors







Step 1: Vaseline the mask form

Step 2: Build-up 4 areas with the clay & vaseline top of clay

Step 3: Start paper mâché & newspaper





Step 4: Keep adding paper mâché & newspaper Step 5: adding 8 to 10 Layers of newspaper & paper mâché

Step 6: Use a solid light color that can be painted on to add 3 to 4 layers of solid color paper & paper mâché

Step 7: Let dry overnight

Step 8: Once dry, remove from the mask form

Step 9: Clean the Mask Form and get checked off

Step 10: Paint using a minimum of 5 colors
