| Essential Knowledge | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Basic Rules <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Scoring – every time you swing the club at the ball, it is a shot. The least number of shots to get the ball into the hole, the better. ○ Wherever the ball lands, that is from where the next shot is played. ▪ Game Etiquette <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The ball farthest from the hole is played first. ○ If the ball is in the way of another's play the spot of ones ball is marked with a coin or other marker until the other player has played through. ○ Honesty is essential. ○ Replace the divots. ○ Rake the sand trap if it is played out of. ▪ Safety <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Students do not swing the club until told to do so by teacher. ○ Always look around before swinging club. ○ Grip club properly so that it doesn't fly out of ones hands. |
