

She showed no concern at all that the lion could harm her.
<ul> <li>Explain how your chosen evidence supports the topic</li> <li>This shows thatbecause</li> </ul>	When Dorothy scolded the lion, telling him, "You ought to be ashamed.", she showed that she is fearless because she did not run and hide. <b>This shows that</b> her overwhelming desire to get back home may have given her courage to face anything and just carry on <b>because</b> nothing could frighten her.
