New Playground stands tall at Hayes Elementary School



September 20, 2014 was a Saturday. The weather was still balmy and many people were spending as much time as they could outdoors before the bitter cold of winter set in. That afternoon, two teenage friends out and about in the neighborhood stopped by the south playground at Hayes Elementary School. The playground, while on school property, is open and available to the community to use and enjoy.

One of the teenagers would later recall that when they left the playground, unbeknownst to them, a discarded cigarette butt would soon cause a spark of fire in the wood chips at the playground. In no time at all, that spark turned into a raging fire, billowing thick black smoke that was visible for miles. While Fridley firefighters put out the fire, the playground could not be saved.

"It is one of those phone calls you do not expect to receive," said John Piotraschke, Hayes Elementary School principal, "and the images of that playground on fire were horrific."

Piotraschke said that the initial feeling of relief that no one had been hurt in the playground fire was quickly followed by questions of why and how this could have happened. These sentiments were reflected in the gazes of many students who paused by the school's back glass doors the following Monday morning and stared in somber silence at the skeletal remains of the playground.

"This accident," said Piotraschke, "caused a great loss to our students and community. And as with any loss, there was a grieving process while we all came to terms with what had happened."

Piotraschke added that community members helped build the old playground. "They made an investment of their time and energy in creating something meaningful and fun that hundreds of students have enjoyed over the years."

Hayes is home of the giraffe, a beloved mascot that stands tall and proud in the center of school's courtyard. In his communication to staff informing them of the incident, Piotraschke reminded the school's staff that "We are giraffes. We stand tall, we have big hearts and we stick together."

Part of having a big heart is being able to forgive and when one of the teenagers came to the school accompanied by his mother and apologized to Piotraschke, he accepted the apology on behalf of the entire Hayes community.

"This was an unfortunate accident and there are lessons here for all of us to learn,' Piotraschke said. "And it was great to start that healing process with forgiveness."

Fridley High School named one of Minnesota's Best High Schools



U.S. News and World Report, in its 2014 High School rankings, has named Fridley High School as one of the Best High Schools in Minnesota. Coming in at number 29 out of more than 500 public high schools in the state, Fridley High School's success is based on how well the school prepares students to demonstrate proficiency in basic skills as well as readiness for college-level work.

According to the U.S. News Best High Schools ranking methodology, a Best High School is one that succeeds at the following steps.

Step 1: Attains performance levels that exceed statistical expectations given the school's relative level of student poverty, as measured by state accountability test scores for all the school's students in the core subjects of reading and math.

Step 2: Achieves proficiency rates on state tests for its least advantaged student groups – e.g., black, Hispanic and economically disadvantaged students – that exceed state averages.

Step 3: Prepares its students for col-

lege, as measured by student participation in and performance on Advanced Placement exams or International Baccalaureate exams.

Since 2007, the Best High Schools project has identified the country's top performing public high schools while also providing a clear, unbiased picture of how well public schools serve all their students—from the highest achieving to the lowest achieving.

This year, 31,242 public high schools in all 50 states and the District of Columbia were analyzed and this number was reduced to 19,411 that were eligible to be ranked.

"It is rewarding to have Fridley High School validated on a national level for working to provide our students with the knowledge and skills for college and career readiness," said Renee Van Gorp, Fridley High School Principal. "This is a great testament to the International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum and the work our teachers and support staff do every day to help each student succeed," said Van Gorp.

Next came the process of rebuilding. Working with the district office, the school quickly went through the logistics of replacing the damaged playground.

Piotraschke said that the process of selecting the best playground design for their school involved staff members, parents and PTO members who all looked at and evaluated the merits of different playground designs to determine the best one for the school.

The design that was finally selected has interactive features that include various activity stations to keep students busy with interactive play. The playground has areas for climbing and crawling, stations for younger students in grades Kindergarten through 1, and "more challenging" stations for students in grades 2-4.

"The new playground has many safety features that will make the playground safer for students," said Piotraschke. The clamps, bolts and joints connecting the stations are secured internally, instead of externally - a safety feature that prevents clothing from being snagged in sections of the playground while a child is playing.

"I know the students are eager to try it out," said Piotraschke. "I probably get asked about 40 times a day when the new playground will open," he said.

The students will soon play on the new playground, the images of the devastated old playground a fading memory. "We have come a long way in a short time and are past the September incident," said Piotraschke. "I feel a sense of peace knowing that we have a new beginning to focus on and enjoy."

of Excellence school improvement process. This includes a systematic school-wide self-study, and the development and implementation of a school improvement plan. The entire Minnesota School of Excellence Program is aligned with six national standards: Learning Centered, Diverse Communities, 21st Century Learners, Quality Instruction, Knowledge and Data, and Community Engagement.

Hayes Elementary School is a K-4 International Baccalaureate World school with a student population of 585. Out of this number, 189 students have chosen to attend Hayes from other school districts and are open enrolled students. This is a testament to the quality of education Hayes offers and the staff's commitment to the success of their students.

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Arel Moodie speaks to 9th grade students



Fridley High School 9th graders had a surprise visit from someone familiar in November 2014. Author and inspirational speaker Arel Moodie returned to Fridley as a special guest invited by the GEAR UP program (Gaining Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) to speak to students about success and confronting fear of failure.

"Arel spoke to this group of students while they were in 7th grade," said Mary Vang, GEAR UP Program director. Those 7th graders are now in 9th grade and are the first student cohort participating in the GEAR UP program in Fridley.

"At that time, Moodie encouraged students to get excited about learning and think of creative ways to 'freak out the teachers' by being prepared, engaged, and proactive in their education," said Vang.

Moodie started his speech by recalling an earlier experience in his life where he confronted his fear of heights at the urging of his friends. "Do something good and positive that you didn't think you could do," said Moodie. "you can take something that you believe to be impossible and make it possible," he encouraged students.

Moodie, the author of The Student Success Action Guide, believes education was key to helping him overcome the harsh and challenging circumstances of his environment. The best selling author, entrepreneur and founder of The College Success Program grew up on welfare in the projects of Brooklyn, NY.

GEAR UP is a U.S. Department of Education program that increases the number of low-income students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. The program serves at least one grade level of students, beginning no later than 7th grade, and follows them through high school graduation and first year of college. GEAR UP services include tutoring, mentoring, academic preparation, financial education and college scholarships to improve access to higher education for low income, minority and disadvantaged first-generation students and families.

Fridley Public Schools participates in the GEAR UP program in partnership with Hennepin Technical College.

Fridley to implement online enrollment system

Parents enrolling their children at Fridley Public Schools will soon be able to do so through EnrollView, an online enrollment program. Developed in partnership with TIES, the online program allows parents to fill out enrollment paperwork, attach required documents and submit completed applications with the click of a mouse. TIES began work on Fridley's site during the 2013-2014 school year.

Among its many features, Enrollview has a school finder option that allows registering parents to enter their home zip code to see which school their child may attend. Parents also need to enter basic general information such as home address and phone number once and the program will populate those related fields for additional child registrations.

Customizing and set up for the online tool was completed in December 2014 and the program will be available for use by the end of January 2015 for select buildings. Enrollview will also be available for the elementary schools' kindergarten registration period in April 2015 and the rest of the district schools (middle school, high school and ALC) will be using the program by July 2015.

Baker selected to review IB Diploma Program Data Analysis Service

The Optimizing Assessment Analysis service is designed to increase DP coordinators' ability to analyze and interpret DP assessment data. There are several tiers of service ranging from a published self-help document to customized consulting for a specific course or issue the school may be having.

"In this capacity, I will be reviewing the materials for this service before it is rolled out to IB schools," said Baker who applied for the opportunity after learning about it at the IB Americas conference. The current task will take a few weeks, but she expects to be involved on an ongoing basis.

"I am looking forward to the opportunity to participate on a new level in the IB, and in a way that lets my skills be helpful to other schools and coordinators," Baker said.

Hayes Elementary School earns Reward School designation



For the second year in a row, based on the Multiple Measures Ratings (MMR) system, the Minnesota Department of Education has recognized Hayes Elementary School as a Reward School.

The MMR is a 0-100% score for all schools in the state and includes data on proficiency, growth, achievement gap reduction, and graduation rates. In addition, the Focus Rating (FR) is a 0-100% scale for all schools in the state and includes data on proficiency and growth for only students of color, special education students, English learners and students in poverty. Using the MMR and FR rankings, Title I schools can fall into five groups: Reward, Celebration, Continuous Improvement and Focus.

Reward schools are Minnesota's highest performing Title I schools and are schools that have demonstrated exceptional student outcomes and success in closing achievement gaps. Reward schools are recognized annually. Hayes Elementary School is one of 131 schools in the state to receive the 2014-2015 Reward School designation.

"This type of thing happens because of GRIT," said principal John Piotraschke, "displayed in the relentless pursuit of excellence and student achievement on the part of teachers."

Stevenson receives local support for reading program

Through the support of community members, Stevenson Elementary School will provide more reading support for students who are struggling with reading.

The school's latest financial support comes from the Presbyterian Church of the Way in Shoreview, whose members collected a total of \$2,862 in support of the Lexia reading program to be used by students at the school.

Presenting the check to school principal Daryl Vossler in October 2014, Kar-

en Villesky, a deacon and member of the church, said the money was raised by church members and matched by the church's Mission Awareness Commission.

"Carol Sellers who was a former Stevenson teacher was also a member of our church," said Villesky. "She talked to me one day about the needs of the students struggling with reading at the school and I knew I had to do something," she said.

Sellers died in July 2013, but the effort that she started at her local church will help support more than 60 additional students. To date, Hayes and Stevenson Elementary Schools have received a total of more than \$10,000 from Fridley Redeemer Lutheran Church and Presbyterian Church of the Way to support the implementation of the Lexia reading program.

"This program is helping students struggling in literacy to improve their skills by providing an individualized program," said Veronica Westerman, a teacher and instructional leader at Stevenson.

The cost of the technology based Lexia reading program is \$39 per student. Thanks to the generous support of the churches, 150 students will begin the Lexia program at Stevenson this year.

Helping your child read at home:

- Help your child find books with subject matter that he or she is interested in
- Set a quiet time for children to read every day (turn off television, music, and anything else that may distract your child's attention)
- Let children read for at least 30 minutes every day, and
- Read out loud to your child, and have your child read to you.

Fridley High School held its 5th Annual Extended Essay Silver Platter Celebration on December 12, 2014. During the celebration 11 students presented their essays to their parents, teachers and peers. The Extended Essay is an in-depth study of a focused topic, chosen within a subject group, intended to promote high-level research and writing skills, intellectual discovery, and creativity. It provides students with an opportunity to engage in personal research in a topic of their own choice under the guidance of a supervisor. The product is a piece of formally presented, structured writing in which ideas and findings are communicated in a reasoned and coherent manner, appropriate to the subject chosen. This 4,000 word essay encourages students to develop the independent research skills that are expected at colleges and universities.

Wanda created and coproduced *A Sterling Performance*, honoring the 25th anniversary of shows produced on the Fridley Auditorium stage. The production raised over \$40,000 for auditorium improvements. Wanda remains a member of the Sterling Scholarship Committee awarding over \$50,000 to Fridley students pursuing arts in their college education and is a member of the Fridley Alumni Choir, which raises funds for the Sterling Scholarship.

Wanda has been a board member for Grace Manor Ministries since 1987. The Ministries were started by Wanda's husband's great-grandmother as a care facility for aging adults, and currently supports these ministries: Minnesota Adult and Teen Challenge; Good News Jail Ministry; the Haiti Teen Challenge; Mom's Haven of Hope and International Justice Mission which works to combat human trafficking. Wanda attended Bethel University, and has been a Licensed Real Estate Agent since 2003. Wanda lives in Fridley with her family and all her children attended Fridley Schools.



BILL INGALDSON (1975) is an attorney and founding partner of Ingaldson Fitzgerald PC, a law firm he formed in 1994. The firm has six lawyers, a paralegal, an investigator and four other staff members. The firm focuses on civil litigation and is recognized as one of the top litigation firms in Anchorage, Alaska.

Bill's clients include Northland In-

surance Company in St. Paul, MN; Target Corporation; Traveler's Insurance; Lloyds of London and several national construction companies. He has handled several liability cases against auto manufacturers. Bill assisted a national child safety group in getting legislation changed to make power windows safer in cars.

Bill is most proud of the pro-bono work done by his law firm. Bill was a founding member of a non-profit charitable organization called the Scotty Gomez Foundation. The foundation has raised over one million dollars to enable economically disadvantaged youth to play hockey and has also refurbished hockey rinks with volunteer labor, and materials. Bill's law firm also sponsors children with special needs from a local high school so they are able to participate in the Challenge Alaska ski program.

As executive director, she provides strategic leadership and vision in addition to overseeing all aspects of operations.

The Emmy Award winning Executive Producer also serves as chief board contact and liaison, and is the face of Kartemquin in the community. Justine has held many roles at Kartemquin, including Director of Human Resources and Intern Coordinator, Director of Communications and Distribution, and Board Secretary.

Prior to joining the Kartemquin team, Justine worked at Wisconsin Public Television, Wisconsin ABC affiliate WKOW-TV, Vitality Media Productions, the University of Chicago Arts and Planning Council, and The History Makers for PBS. MARIA WALDE-DOUGLAS



In 1975 Fridley becomes first in nation to win Dual Meet Crown

Capturing the first ever Minnesota State Wrestling Championship based on a dual meet system in 1987 was an appropriate way for the seniors to end their high school wrestling careers.

The seniors in the team never lost a dual meet in junior high and had a 44-1-0 dual meet record over the previous three years. Their accomplishments include three Skyline Conference Championships, three District 14 Championships, three Region IV Championships, two State Championships, and an overall 5th place state ranking.

In 1975 they were 20-0 in dual meets and defeated the champions of ten different conferences. Seniors Kirby Frank, Jim Hansen (3rd in State) and Scott Dickinson (2nd in State) were untouchable in the first three weights.

Co-captain Karl Jurisson and surprises Ed Anderson and Mike Reeves held down the middle weights. In the last three weights Dave Lubinski, Lonnie Malikowski and Bernie Sitz assured Fridley's invincibility. These seniors and juniors Bill Myers, Mark Obrycki, Randy Sitz, Joe Zemien, Bill Reeves and Greg Cariolano displayed hard work, dedication, sacrifice and accomplished the ultimate in high school wrestling: the title of State Wrestling Champions.

Weather related school closings

The decision to close schools is often a difficult one to make; students need to be in school and closing schools affect families and students in many ways. We are very mindful of this and only close schools when severe weather poses a risk to the safety of our students and staff.

Making the Decision

Primary factors we consider in making a decision include:

- Safety and wellbeing of students
- Severity of the weather
- The ability for buses and cars to travel safely

District officials monitor local and National Weather Service (NWS) forecasts and use that information to determine if weather conditions warrant closing schools for that day. The decision to close schools is made by 6:00 am.

Notifying Families

Once a decision has been made to close schools, the district will notify families as soon as possible through:

- Phone calls and email
- Announcement on local news channel
- District website
- Social media (Facebook and Twitter)

In case of inclement weather, parents may personally decide not to let their children come to school. Children absent in inclement weather when schools are open will be marked absent and treated the same as in any other legitimate absence. The school though, must receive proper notice. Schools will remain open unless you receive a message from the district through the sources listed above.

NWSISD

Students enrolled through the Northwest Suburban Integration School District (NW-SISD): If the district you reside in closes school, there will be no transportation for that day. If the district you reside in delays school due to weather, there will be no morning bus service to Fridley on that day.

Annual Notification

Asbestos Abatement Notification

Fridley Public Schools ongoing efforts related to the management and control of asbestos containing materials is geared singularly toward providing a safe and healthy environment for students, employees and other occupants of our buildings.

During the 2013/2014 school year, asbestos containing materials were removed from the Fridley Middle School as part of a roof replacement, and from Fridley High School as part of a restroom remodel project. Asbestos removal was performed by licensed personnel and monitored by the Institute for Environmental Assessment (IEA).

In addition, continuing asbestos operations, maintenance, and regular re-inspections of all remaining asbestos containing materials was performed throughout the District.

The District continues to rigorously follow the proper procedures and steps for the various types of asbestos removal. The IEA has, and will continue to design and monitor all asbestos abatement projects.

In 2014/2015, asbestos containing materials are to be identified and removed from any areas of the District school buildings affected by scheduled construction. Again, asbestos removal will be performed by licensed personnel and monitored by the IEA.

Monitoring of Indoor Air Quality

The Fridley School District has developed an indoor air quality program designed to make certain that our schools continue to provide a safe environment for students and staff. The program is simple: each school in the district is evaluated on a yearly basis for potential problems. If problems are found, they are promptly corrected.

Indoor air quality problems are becoming a concern in schools around the country and the Fridley Schools will take every precaution to assure that the air in each of our schools is safe.

The yearly evaluation includes a number of steps. Ventilation systems are examined to make sure they are functioning properly and are providing adequate fresh air. Visual inspections are also made to check for signs of excess moisture from leaks that could lead to growth of molds. Finally, cleaning practices are reviewed to ensure that cleanliness is maintained and that cleaning supplies are safe.

This year's evaluation will be performed in February 2015 by licensed personnel from the Institute for Environmental Assessment (IEA). Results are available in the district office
