- identify character traits and capture their thinking in their journal while reading independently.
- · create a theory about a character and notate with evidence in their journal.

Directions: Create a journal entry that shows that characters are complex (like people) and have likable and less likable sides to them. Be sure to include at least 2 likable traits and 2 unlikeable traits. For each trait, provide at least one direct quote for evidence. You can set your journal up like the class-wide journal entry or you can choose to organize it another way. Be sure to grade yourself on the rubric to ensure you're meeting expectations.
