
The Explorers: Dr. Mae C. Jemison

Jemison's parents encouraged her dreams. She finished high school in 1973. Jemison earned an award for black high school students who work hard and get good grades. The prize was money to pay for college. Jemison went to Stanford, one of the best colleges in the world, when she was only 16. There, she studied science. She earned a degree in engineering.

A Young Doctor In Africa

After graduating from college, Jemison went to medical school to become a doctor. She even traveled to other countries to work and learn.

Jemison became a doctor in 1981. Later, she moved to the continent of Africa to work as a doctor in the Peace Corps. She went to Sierra Leone and Liberia, two countries in West Africa. The Peace Corps sends American people to poor areas of other countries where people need help.

First African-American Female Astronaut

Jemison came home to the United States in 1985. She had a new plan. She wanted to learn to be an astronaut. Jemison applied to space training school in 1987. Many people wanted to go. Only 15 people were picked out of 2,000 who wanted to become astronauts - and Jemison was one of them.

Dr. Mae Jemison finally flew into space in 1992. She was on a space shuttle for eight days with six other astronauts. She did science experiments high above the Earth. She was the first African-American woman in space. The first thing she saw from space was Chicago, her hometown, in the state of Illinois.
