B-PEN (Brookline Parent Education Network) invites you to send your son or daughter to 8th Grade SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions). The meetings, run by the BHS Peer Leaders and their advisors, will be held at the Brookline Teen Center and Brookline High School.

What is SADD?

SADD is a peer-to-peer education, prevention and activism organization dedicated to teaching students how to make healthy decisions. SADD was founded on the philosophy that young people, empowered to help each other, are the most effective force in prevention. Its unique approach involves teens delivering education and prevention messages to their peers, focusing on underage drinking, drug/marijuana use, risky/impaired driving, teen violence, teen stress and high school life.

Why should my 8th grader attend a SADD meeting?

SADD offers 8th grade students an informal introduction to Brookline High School and the Brookline Teen Center. Meetings provide opportunities to become familiar with the layout of Brookline High School and meet current BHS students who are choosing to make good decisions. It is also an excellent opportunity to learn about the Brookline Teen Center and meet other 8th graders from all the Brookline schools. These one-hour club meetings include games, group discussions and a BHS scavenger hunt. Health teachers give extra credit for attending meetings, and pizza is served at all meetings.
