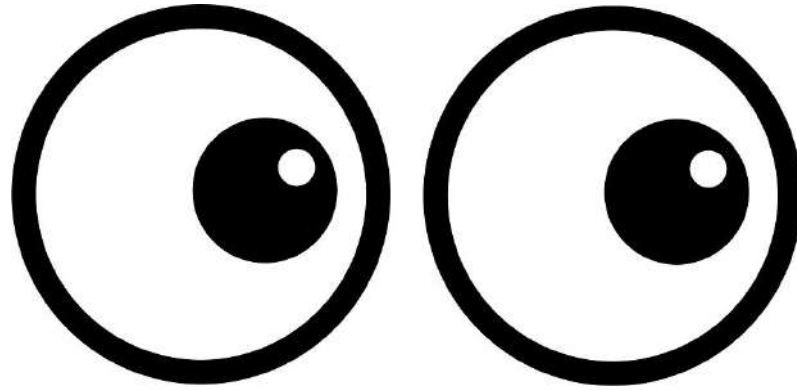


Value

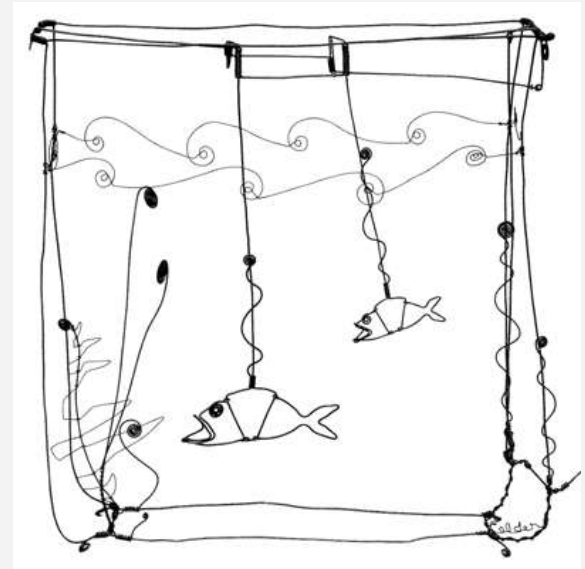
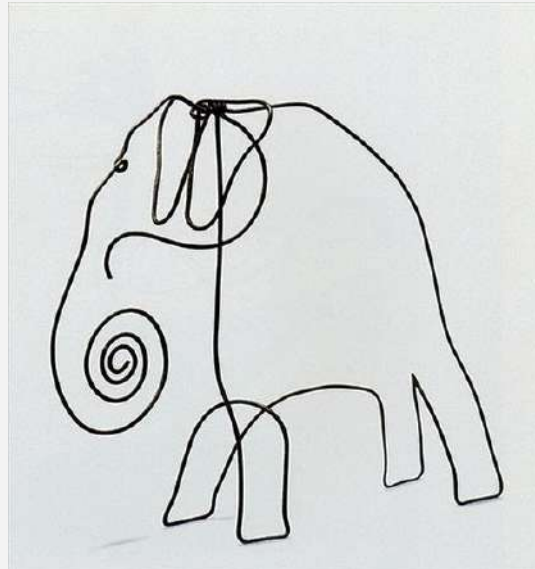
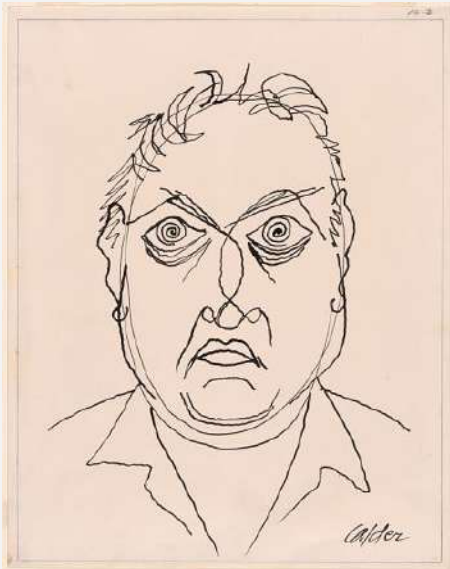

# Line: Artistic Focus

Alexander Calder (1898-1976) was known for his wire sculptures and drawings, which are excellent examples of the use of the element line. His sculptures and drawings are created by using one continuous line with one beginning and one end.



# Shape: Artistic Focus

Henri Matisse (1869-1954) invented a new type of art called “paper cut outs” in which shape was the focus of the artwork.



# Color: Artistic Focus

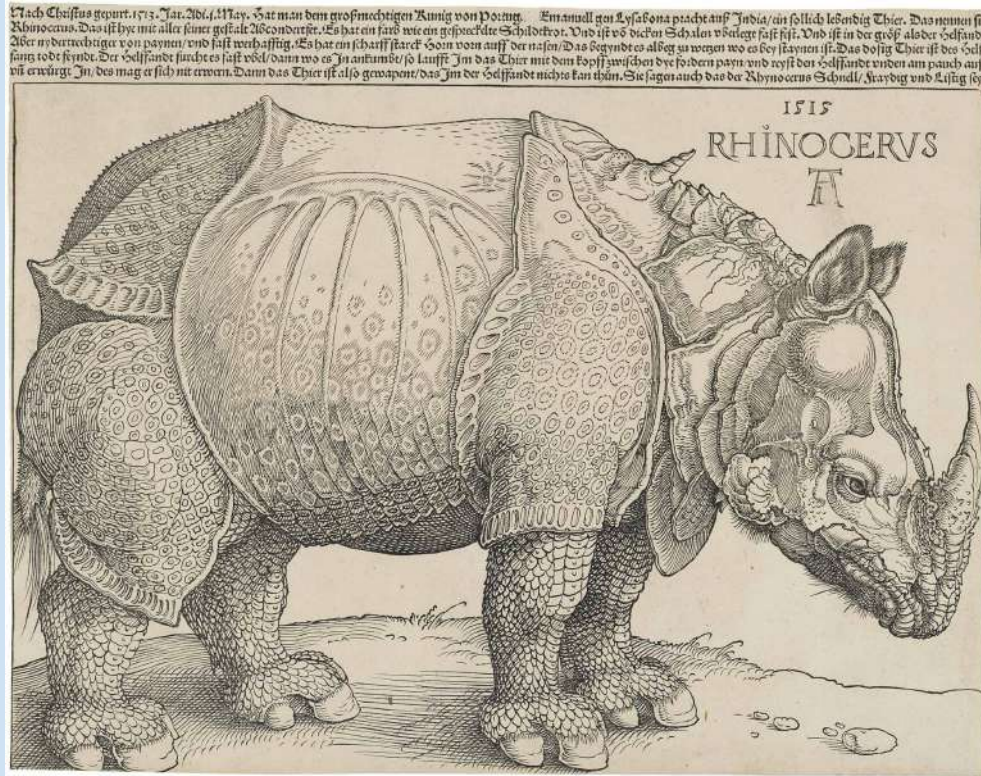
Wassily Kandinsky (1866-1944) used bright colors to create many of his artworks.





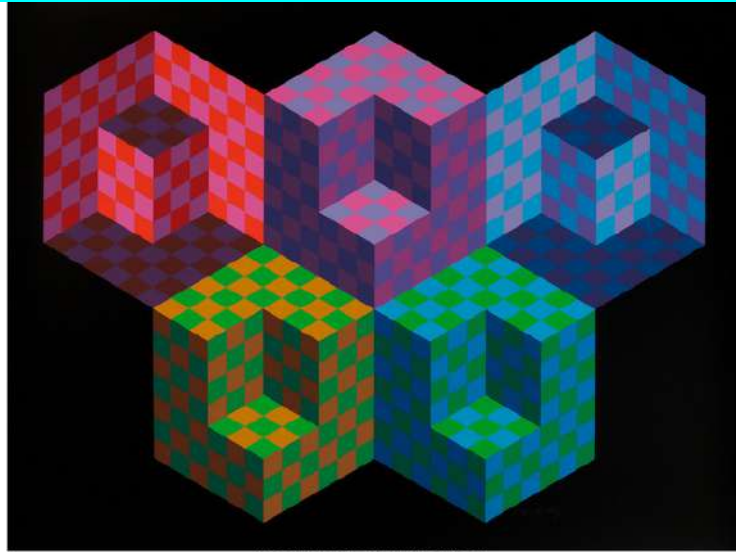
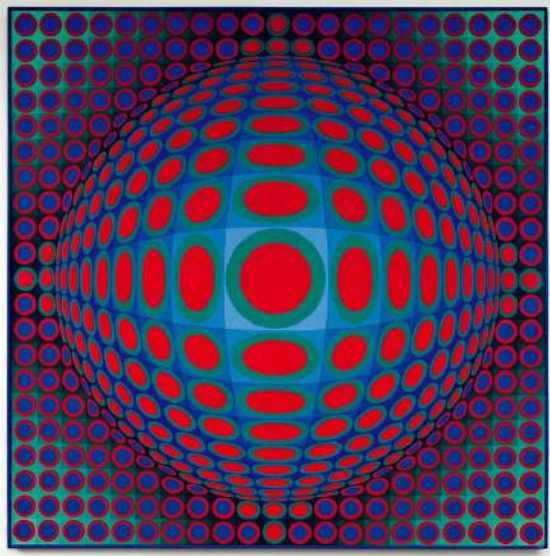
# Texture: Artistic Focus

Albrecht Durer (1471-1528) produced high quality woodcut prints that were rich in detail and texture.



# Form: Artistic Focus

Victor Vasarely (1908-1997) created Op Art (optical illusions) using form.

# Value: Artistic Focus

Rembrandt van Rijn (1606-1669) used value in his paintings by including strong contrast of light and shadow, a technique known as chiaroscuro.



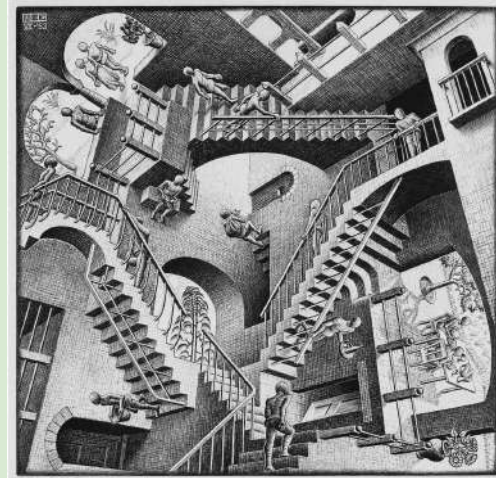
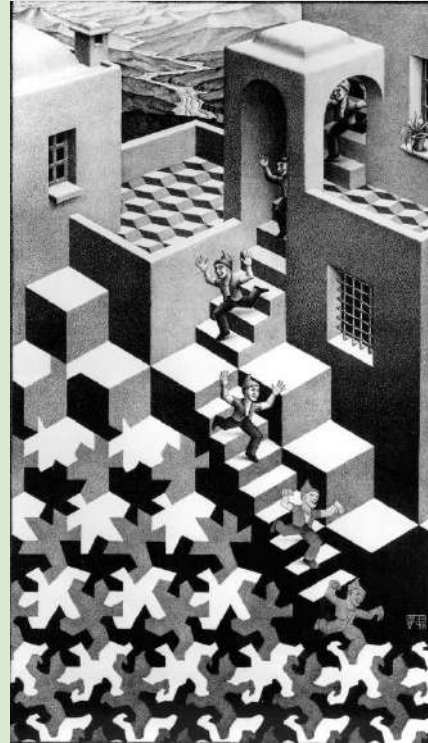


# Space: Artistic Focus

Edward Hopper (1882-1967) used perspective in a unique way to create a cinematic viewpoint and a “mood of eerie stillness.”



M.C. Escher (1898-1972) used twisted spaces and positive and negative space to create a new type of art that no one had ever seen.
