Essential Understandings	 Good readers use skills and strategies of the reading process to comprehend, interpret, evaluate, and appreciate what they have read.
Essential Questions	 What makes themes universal? What are some reoccurring themes in literature? How are elements of fiction interrelated? How does culture affect literature? How does an author's use of literary devices contribute to a literary piece? How can applying reading strategies contribute to a more meaningful understanding of the text? A book may have multiple themes.
Essential Knowledge	 Themes are common to many pieces of literature. Elements of fiction (plot, characterization, point of view, and theme) are interrelated. Literary text is affected by its cultural context. Authors use specific literary devices to involve readers. Authors use minor characters to develop the main characters. Reading strategies allow the reader to better comprehend a text.
Vocabulary	 <u>Terms</u>: symbolism, irony, tone, foreshadowing, metaphor, hyperbole, alliteration, onomatopoeia, synthesizing, evaluating
Essential Skills	 Identify and defend themes in literary works. Analyze the interrelationship among elements of fiction (e.g., how characters react to events, how plot develops theme, how point of view affects character development). Apply knowledge of a culture's social and cultural context to understand a work of fiction. Identify and recognize literary devices an author may use (e.g., symbolism, irony, tone, mood, foreshadowing, flashback, etc.) Identify and analyze examples in fiction and poetry of figurative language (e.g., simile, metaphor (review), personification, hyperbole, alliteration, onomatopoeia). Analyze characters and the relationship of major to minor characters. Identify and apply the following reading strategies: (Review strategies introduced in grades 6 and 7) Synthesize (review, sort, and sift to form new ideas) Evaluate (form opinions, make judgments, and develop ideas from reading)
