Couse Description and Expectations

ESL I is a year-long course. It introduces you to basic and intermediate structures and vocabulary of the English language through the skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking to function proficiently in social situations as well as learn challenging academic content through the curriculum. The acquisition of language skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) occurs as you use English effectively in a variety of social and academic settings. This means that you will need to actively participate in all activities that involve the use of English. You will learn strategies in order to advance your reading, listening, and pronunciation skills. Additionally, you will expand oral comprehensibility and write complete sentences, a standard paragraph, and short content-based essays. A goal of this course is that you will learn to utilize level-appropriate conventions of grammar and punctuation with a minimum of errors.

Standards: We have five **WIDA** standards and the four domains of speaking, listening, reading, and writing are embedded in each of these:

Standard 1: Social & Instructional Language Standard 2: The language of Language Arts Standard 3: The language of Mathematics Standard 4: The language of Science

Standard 5: The language of Social Studies.

These standards as well as the *Massachusetts State Curriculum Frameworks drive* the context of our course work throughout the year.

Assessment/ Grading/ Evaluation Practices

- Your grades will be based on the classroom assignments, tests, homework and active class participation.
- Work missed because of an absence must be made up as soon as possible. If you need to make up a test, a quiz, or a class activity, see me as soon as you return to set up a time to make it up.
- Each assignment, quiz, class activity, or exam has a set number of points. All points are weighted equally.
- Late Assignments are NOT acceptable. Your work needs to be turned in on time.
- All late assignments will be have 5% of full credit deducted each day they are late.
- You will have the opportunity for extra credit periodically. Please take advantage of these opportunities!

Exams, Quizzes, Assignments, Homework

At various times throughout the course, quizzes may be given on vocabulary terms, grammar, and reading comprehension. At the end of the first semester there will be a midterm exam and at the end of the second semester there will be a comprehensive final exam.

These quizzes/ tests can include any combination of questions, including essay questions. There are also W.I.D.A. level appropriate informational reading assignments about American culture and customs, topical current events, and well as readings from literature, short stories, etc. Research projects are also assigned in Google Slide Show. All quizzes and projects have a percentage of 0 - 100%, and carry the same weight as all other grades. Exams are graded in accordance with WHS exam policies.



PLAGIARISM

Plagiarism is the practice of taking someone else's work whether written, a work of art, music, or ideas and passing them off as one's own. The WHS policy regarding this can be found on page 81 of the *Student Handbook*, and states:

". . . Any student who cheats/plagiarizes on an examination, or any other assignment, shall receive a zero, and may not make-up such work. . . ."

Furthermore, the instructor, will then notify the parent/guardian, and will speak to the student privately about the issue.

The NEW Cell Phone Use Policy, Student Handbook, pg. 79:

ELECTRONIC DEVICES
