- Authority: Who is the author and is he or she credible?
- Purpose: Why was this produced?
- Platform: Look at the hosting URL. Is it a .gov or .edu? Look again at authority
- Links: What do the links lead to?
- Depth: Is it just common knowledge or do you learn more?
