

REALISM

- Did not focus on "hyper realism"
- Wanted to depict realistic situations
- Depicted morals
- Rustic Painting

REVIEW: REALISM AND IMPRESSIONISM



IMPRESSIONISM (ELBOW)

- Everyday subjects and events, including less moral or amoral subjects
- Lighting Captures effects of natural light. Color in artwork is illuminated...or seems to glow
- •Brushstrokes Artists have broken the solid shape into smaller pieces and blurred the edges, creating dabs of color that blend together.
- Outdoor en plein air was a common setting
- Weather weather and atmosphere were 'captured'

Expressionism was a modernist movement, initially in poetry and painting, originating in Germany at the beginning of the 20th century. Its typical trait is to present the world solely from a subjective perspective, distorting it radically for emotional effect in order to evoke moods or ideas.

Expressionist artists sought to express meaning or emotional experience rather than physical reality.



GERMANEXPRESSIONISM 1900-1933

- Reaction to discord in Germany and the dehumanization caused by the Industrial Revolution
- Used abstraction to distort reality in order to express internal experiences.
- Barrowed brushstroke application techniques from Impressionism
- Expression: the process of making known one's thoughts or feelings.
- Use of Elements: Color, shapes, and texture are all used to express a certain experience




EDVARD MUNCH

- Born in Norway in 1863
- Traveled to Paris in the 1880's to study the works of the Impressionist and Post-Impressionist artist
- played a great role in German expressionism because of the strong mental anguish that was shown in his artwork
- Many of Munch's works depict life and death scenes, love and terror, and the feeling of loneliness
- These emotions were depicted by the contrasting lines, the darker colors, blocks of color, somber tones, and exaggerated form
- symbol = a thing that represents or stands for something else



FRANZ MARC (1880-1916)

- German Painter
- Used bright and primary colors, simple style, profound sense of emotion
- Marc gave emotional meaning to each color: blue = masculinity & spirituality yellow = feminine joy red = sound of violence

ERANZ MARC, THE FATE OF THE ANIMALS, 1913

- painted in 1913 just before WWI
- represents the tension the of impending disaster that had pervaded society
- premonition of war
- on the back of the canvas Marc wrote: "and all being is flaming and is in flaming agony"



MARC CHAGALL (1887-1985)


- Born in Russia
- Jewish Artist
- Famous for his "fantastic style"
- "Fantastic Art" comes from fantasy like dreams.
- Used a lot of complimentary colors



CHAGALL, I AND THE VILLAGE (1911)




A "cubist fairy tale" reshaped by his imagination, without regard to natural color, size or even the laws of gravity.

DADA: 1916-1920

- Began in World War I, it began as an anti-war, political statement, protest against "world of mutual destruction" (George Grosz)
- Created anti-art art
- Dada rejected reason and logic, prizing nonsense, irrationality and intuition.
- Art serves the purpose of a new mentality, a new epoch
- Its purpose was to ridicule the meaninglessness of the modern world

DUCHAMP'S "FOUNTAIN"

Duchamp purchased a urinal from a sanitary ware supplier and submitted it – or arranged for it to be submitted – as an artwork by 'R. Mutt' to the newly established Society of Independent Artists that Duchamp himself had helped found and promote on the lines of the Parisian Salon des Indépendants (Duchamp had moved from Paris to New York in 1915). The society's board of directors, who were bound by the Society's constitution to accept all members' submissions, took exception to Fountain, believing that a piece of sanitary ware – and one associated with bodily waste – could not be considered a work of art and furthermore was indecent. Following a discussion and a vote, the directors present during the installation of the show at the Grand Central Palace (about ten of them according to a report in the New York Herald) narrowly decided on behalf of the board to exclude the submission from the Society's inaugural exhibition that opened to the public on 10 April 1917. Arensberg and Duchamp resigned in protest against the board taking it upon itself to veto and effectively censor an artist's work.

- Readymades "ordinary objects transformed into art through the decision of the artist"
- "art is a matter of what the head creates, not what the hand makes"

MARCEL DUCHAMP 1887-1968

- French-American painter, sculptor, and writer
- Duchamp has had an immense impact on twentieth-century and twenty first-century art
 Referred to other art as
- Referred to other art as "retinal" art, intended only to please the eye.
- please the eye.
 Duchamp wanted to use art to serve the mind.








HENRI MATISSE (1869-1954) -REVIEW

- Part of Les Fauves (Wild Beasts), a group of French Expressionist artists.
- Inspired by Impressionism, Post-Impressionism and Pointillism
- Colors were vibrant, intense, and sometimes irrational
- Turned towards collage cut outs after suffering physical difficulties from stomach cancer surgery in 1941.

- Matisse liked the connection between art and musical improvisation
- Jazz- a type of music of black American origin characterized by improvisation



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


WASSILY KANDINSKY DELUGE, 1913






Traditional Abstraction



WASSILY WASSILYEVICH KANDINSKY (1866-1944)

- Russian artist known for purely non-representational works
- he taught at the Bauhaus school of art and architecture from 1922 until the Nazis closed it in 1933
- Kandinsky had synaesthesia the capacity to see sound and hear color
- He once said he heard his paintbox "hissing"


A regular repetition of elements to produce the look and feel of movement or to MOVE the viewers eye around the artwork.

REPETITION, MOVEMENT, RHYTHM CONTINUED...


Where there is a sense of movement in an art work, created by a repetition of elements rhythm is created

Visual Rhythm- one or more elements repeated to create a visual beat

Visual Movement: the look and feeling of action and to guide a viewer's eye throughout the work of art.










NON-REPRESENTATIONAL DRAWING

You are going to listen to more music!!!

- Born in the Netherlands
- Strove to simplify the subjects of his paintings to their essence
- As his art progressed, he used more and more basic elements (vertical and horizontal lines, black white grey values, primary colors).






MOVING INTO CUBISM

 - brushstrokes from Impressionism
 - object distortion from Expressionism
- Added
 - breaking down objects into geometric shapes

 - Or the same point of view in different moments in time simultaneously




