




As with most street artists, the Obey Giant was intended to inspire curiosity and cause the masses to question their relationship with their surroundings. "The sticker has no meaning but exists only to cause people to react, to contemplate and search for meaning in the sticker"



Fairey states "At first I was only thinking about the response from my clique of art school and skateboard friends. The fact that a larger segment of the public would not only notice, but investigate, the unexplained appearance of the stickers was something I had not contemplated. When I started to see reactions and consider the sociological forces at work surrounding the use of public space and the insertion of a very eyecatching but ambiguous image, I began to think there was the potential to create a phenomenon."


After Graduating from the Road Island School of Design, Shepard founded a small printing business called Alternate Graphics that specialized in t-shirt and sticker silkscreens.




His work often provides a social or political message.



What do you think this piece represents?




Fairey distributed 300,000 stickers and 500,000 posters during the campaign, funding his grassroots electioneering through poster and fine art sales.

But the huge success of the image brought into question where the original image came from.

Mannie Garcia, a photographer from the Associated Press, took the original photo and AP wanted a slice of the pie.



Fairey said his use of the photograph fell within the legal definition of fair use.

After years in court, a settlement was reached.

In addition to the settlement:

On September 7, 2012, Fairey was sentenced to 300 hours of community service, ordered to pay a \$25,000 federal fine, and placed on probation for two years for contempt of court by tampering with evidence in the case.
