### "I'm sort of a spy..."

Vivian Maier's style is characterized by:

- Candid portraits
- Low angled black and white shots taken with a medium format Rollieflex camera
- Balance, geometric shapes, reflections, and patterns
- A sense of calm

She took to the streets to capture unguarded moments, often of working class people and those who were less fortunate.

She would photograph her subjects from various angles and perspectives, often including a self portrait on her rolls.

The Vivian Maier collection was discovered after her death by John Maloof quite by chance when he purchased bin of her negatives!

## What I learned from VM according to Eric Kim, photographer

#### SHOOT FOR YOURSELF

In photography, we sometimes forget that the only person we need to impress is ourselves. What other people think isn't important!

#### **BE PROLIFIC**

VM left behind over 100,000 negatives, most of which went undeveloped. For her, the joy was in the process of photographing. Always keep a camera with you and take as many photos as you can.

EMBRACE YOUR DAY JOB Having a "day job" can be liberating! There will always be time to work on developing your craft.

#### PHOTOGRAPH YOURSELF

Get creative and look for opportunities to photograph yourself in shadows, water, mirrors, glass. Push your creativity!

## LEADING LINES CONTRAST SHADOWS

### Photographer of the week:

Before Ken Russell was recognized as one of Britain's most flamboyant and outrageous filmmakers, he toyed as a freelance photographer. He captured a remarkable series of photographs of teenage girls (and boys) from north and east London, dressed in their own dandyish take on the "Ted" look that was sweeping the country. In jackets with velvet collars, high-necked shirts and slicked-back hair, they posed against striking backdrops in the rundown, bomb-scarred capital.
