## Figurative Language

Figurative language is used to make writing more interesting and easier for your reader to visualize.

# Similes & Metaphors Comparing two unlike things

**Simile:** A simile makes the comparison using the words like or as.

She was AS pretty AS a flower.

Her hair was flowing LIKE a rainbow.

**Metaphor**: A metaphor uses the verb is, was, were, etc. to make a direct comparison of two objects.

He WAS a mountain. (He is not actually a mountain)

She IS a dandelion. (she is not actually a flower)

#### Idiom

**Idiom:** A phrase or saying that means something completely different than what it says.

Idiom Meaning

Don't let the cat out of the bag  $\rightarrow$  Don't tell the secret.

He has butterflies in his stomach.  $\rightarrow$  He is nervous.

She is under the weather  $\rightarrow$  She is feeling sick.

#### **Hyperbole**

**Hyperbole**: An exaggeration that S-T-R-E-T-C-H-E-S the truth.

That joke is so old, last time I heard it I was riding a dinosaur.

(The joke was in fact old but it didn't go back to the time before the ice age!)

#### Personification

**Personification**: Giving an object a human feeling or emotion.

The sun glared down at me from the sky.

(Humans with eyes glare. Glaring means to stare in an angry or fierce way.)

The wind howled in agony.

(Humans and animals can howl but the wind can make a noise that sounds like a howl.)

I could hear Hawaii calling my name.

(Can Hawaii speak? No, but someone can feel an emotional pull to a place.)

### **Onomatopoeia**

**Onomatopoeia**: A word that spells out the sound it makes.

Crash! I knew I was in trouble as soon as I heard that sound.

A shot rang out like a bang in the quiet night sky.

# Repetition

**Repetition**: Repeating the same word or phrase to emphasize or make the meaning clearer

#### **Alliteration**

Alliteration: The repetition of an initial consonant sound in multiple words in a sentence or stanza.

**R**oy **r**an in the **r**aging **r**ain.

I <u>slipped</u> <u>slyly</u> into the <u>slow</u>, <u>slippery</u> <u>sled</u>.

Her <u>brown</u> <u>braid</u> <u>brushed</u> the <u>bridge</u> of her <u>brow</u>.

"Wait," whispered Wendy, her gaze wandering wistfully.

## **Allusion**

**Allusion**: a brief reference to a person, place, event, or passage in a work of literature or religious text assumed to be sufficiently well known to be recognized by the reader. (**Historical allusion**, **religious allusion**, **literary allusion**)

You're acting like such a Scrooge!

This is your Waterloo!

## **Imagery**

Imagery: words that create a mental picture and appeal to the senses (sight, touch, smell, sound).

My head is pounding like a drum.

The night was black as ever, but bright stars lit up the sky.

I heard the machine make a great slushing noise.
