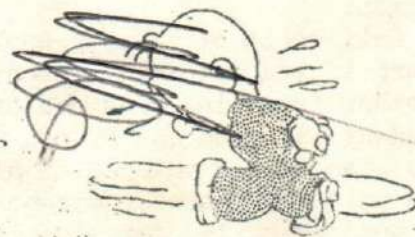
Corsica High would like to thank the Highway Department for their time and effort in showing the film.

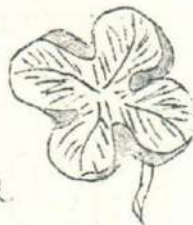
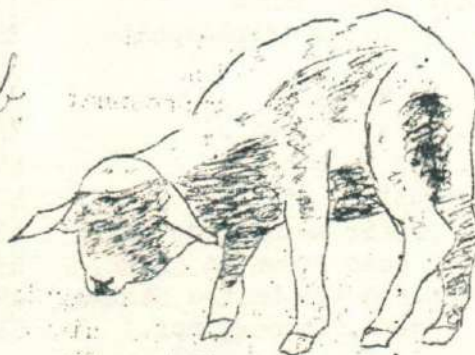

Corsica Draws Bye-- The District 26 basketball tournament which annually closes the basketball season will be played at Delmont, February 23, 24, and 25.

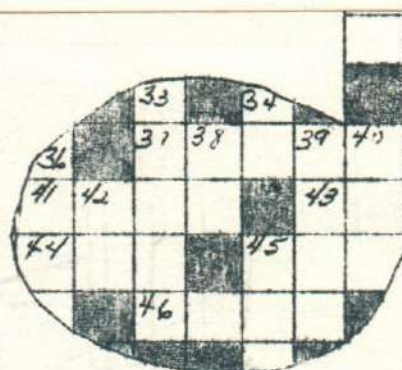
## Miss Jungman New Teacher
