When word of the plans was heard by the business

and property owners of Dakota, they gathered together to do something about it.

To start, they all wrote letters to the DOT letting them know how bad the changes would be for Huron.

The DOT listened to them and changed the plans to allow a turning lane and to make the parking spots along the street wider.

When the city heard about all these people taking an interest in the downtown

area, they started to think about upgrades. Nothing is set in stone yet, but there are decisions being made. The whole point of these upgrades is to bring the Huron community together.

The most important part of the upgrades is to create a pedestrian friendly, clean, and energetic atmosphere for the citizens of Huron. To make all these changes possible the city hired a person from Sioux Falls that designs downtowns to come up with a plan for Huron's downtown area.

The city is also working with Greater Huron Development Corporation to give the small business and property owners on Dakota the money to upgrade the fronts of their buildings.

In the coming years hopefully the changes do some good, while preserving what is so special about the town.

A month with meaning

During her time, it was seen as nearly impossible for an African American, let alone an African American woman to be highly educated and to hold a high profile job, but she accomplished both, graduating from West Virginia University and working for NASA.

Rosa Parks is another African American woman who paved the way for many. Her seemingly simple act of refusing to give up her bus seat had an important and lasting impact. She showed that it was possible for African Americans to stand up to the people who tried to oppress them.

During Black History month, it's important to take the time to remember the many Black Americans who made such a lasting impact on history.

Governor makes headlines

In the past couple months, South Dakota's governor, Kristi Noem, has made attempts to pass new bills.

One of these bills' main focus was to restore protection for prayer in the classroom. Noem proposed this bill in December of 2021. Just last month, the House Committee voted nine to six to kill the proposition. If the bill was passed there would've been a "moment of silence" each morning in public schools. The bill stated that students and teachers, during the minute of silence, could pray, reflect, meditate, or engage in another quiet activity.

State Representatives found

this bill to be "...personal and not performative..." and denied the idea.

Other bills that Noem introduced centered around transgender women and abortions.

In December, Noem proposed a bill that would ban transgender women from participating in women's sports. The bill was passed on February 3. This bill specifically bans transgender and college-age women from playing on female sports teams.

In explaining her reasons for proposing this bill, Noem said that, "...making sure that girls will always have the opportunity to play in

girls sports in South Dakota and have an opportunity for a level playing field, for fairness, that gives them the chance to experience success."

Noem's abortion-related bills focused on two things. One bill would ban telemedicine abortions, and one proposed to protect a fetus(es) once a heart beat was detected.

Noem brought forward these two bills in late January with the goal of protecting babies and their mothers. She stated in a press release, "Every human life is unique from the moment it is conceived. Every life is worthy of our protection, worthy of the right to live." On February 2, legislators denied the pro-life bills.

There are many South Dakotans' who do support Governor Noem's proposals, and there are also many citizens who are concerned about what Noem is planning next.

Will the proposed bills affect the daily lives of the student body? It depends on the state legislature who must decide whether they are beneficial to the people of South Dakota or not.

Boys' bathroom How to stop vandalism

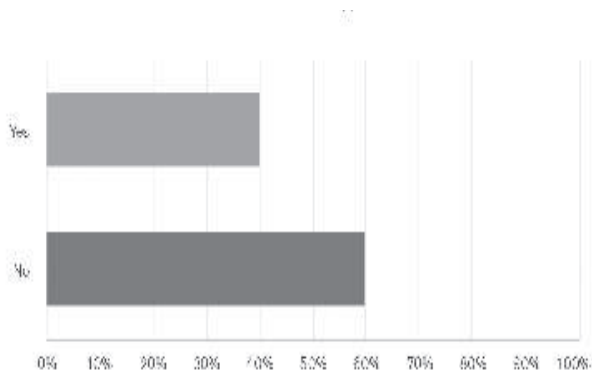

Tutoring a new tooter

The HHS band department is bursting at the seams with musical talent, having three students selected for All-State Orchestra and ten students selected for All-State Band, along with various honor bands and region contests, but one may wonder: Is band as easy as it looks? Can band students share their wisdom with students who have little to no musical experience?

The *Tiger Stripes* staff put this to the test by asking junior Madyson Schroder to teach junior Tate Meyer the trumpet in an hour and recorded the results.

Meyer, who hadn't played any instruments before this lesson, began the lesson not able to even produce one note. Under the careful guidance of Schroder, who has played trumpet for seven years, Meyer learned to play the traditional tune, "Hot Cross Buns".

Meyer's tone may be described as airy at best. Once he learned the proper embouchure, or mouth structure, he was able to produce a few notes. The trick Schroder used to teach Meyer the proper mouth shape is to say the letter "M" and to smile a little while buzzing his lips to make a sound.

After a few minutes, Meyer was able to produce his first sounds on the trumpet. Schroder then taught Meyer the fingerings or combinations of buttons to push to play "Hot Cross Buns".

As the lesson went on, Meyer's tone became more and more consistent and less difficult to listen to. He made it all the way through the song a few times with a few wrong notes, but he was getting exponentially better.

Meyer also learned some maintenance tips and tricks. He learned how to empty the condensation from inside the trumpet using the water keys, and when one of the valves became sticky, Meyer learned how to properly lubricate it.

By the end of the lesson, Meyer

could play "Hot Cross Buns" very well. Schroder describes Meyer's trumpet playing as "beautiful," and she thinks that he was a very good student.

Meyer claims to have disliked his experience, but it is obvious to onlookers that he enjoyed himself thoroughly. Though he was frustrated at times because he wasn't perfect right away, he always laughed it off and tried again. Meyer's advice for those trying something new is that "You need to work towards things, even if you don't like it."

Solos and ensembles

Every year in February (excluding the past two years because of weather and COVID-related issues) music students from schools around the Huron and Aberdeen region go to the annual Region IV Solo and Ensemble Contest.

Each student that goes to this has a prepared selection of music they have been practicing and perfecting for months. The contest has become important for the students in the music department because of the work, the time, and the dedication it takes to prepare for. The students attend contest to get judged and to receive feedback on their musical performances. Even last year when students weren't able to physically be at the contest, the choir soloists sent videos to college professors from the University of South Dakota, and the band students hired Mr. Stueckrath's high school band director, Jerrold Heide, who is now Director of Concert and Athletic Bands at Valley City State University, to come and judge them.

Judging is based on a scale from unacceptable (0-10 points) to a superior (26-30 points). Soloists can earn up to 30 points, getting judged on tone, intonation, rhythm, musicianship, technique, and other factors. Ensembles, or small groups of performers, are judged on balance and blend as well, and are scored on a 35-point scale. Music students benefit from this because they are getting professional feedback, which can help them to be better musicians in the future.

This year, Huron students brought 68 solos and 30 ensembles, and received many superior and excellent ratings. These students will receive their awards for their ratings at the music awards ceremony on May 9.

Pep band performs for the people

Huron Arena celebrates platinum jubilee

The Huron Arena has been around for seventy years. In those seventy years, many things have taken place there. Before the wood floor was installed in 1989, dirt would be hauled into the arena to host rodeos. The arena was used as the physical education gym for the middle and high school before the new schools were built.

The Huron Arena hosted All-State Chorus and Orchestra in the fall and All-State Band in the spring for several years. The arena also hosted both boys and girls State AA, A, and B Basketball and State Volleyball. Teams and fans enjoyed it because at the time, it was the only facility that was attached to a hotel. They could eat their team meals in the Huron Convention Center or Verto's Restaurant (now Ryan's Hangar).

Terry Nebelsick, former superintendent of Huron schools was interviewed on the subject of the Huron Arena's history. He has a wide variety of experiences with the arena. He had the honor of reffing the State B Boy's Basketball championship between Crow Creek and Northwestern. Later on, he refereed the AA Girls State championship between Yankton and Sioux Falls Roosevelt.

Mr. Nebelsick enjoys the Huron Arena the most because prom and graduation are held there. He enjoys how all the parents and grandparents can watch graduation in the four thousand seats of the balcony.

After the new middle school was built back in the late 1990s, the arena had vacant space upstairs. In 2010, the community supported the moving of the Central Administration and school board offices to the second floor classrooms which used to house middle school band and vocal.

State tournament bound

Every year, the Huron Tigers wrestlers get the opportunity to qualify for the South Dakota State Wrestling Tournament.

This year, on February 19, the varsity headed to Milbank to try their chance at qualifying for state at the regional tournament. The Tigers had three boys wrestlers qualify at regions: sophomores Bryan Ramirez and Beauty Moon, and freshman Moses Gross.

On February 24, they will travel to Sioux Falls for the state tournament. In past years, the Huron Tigers have done pretty well at State with multiple people placing and some even winning the championship title. Our last state champion was Tyson Lien. He won first place at State in 2020 and 2021.

This year, in addition to the three boys, four girls will also compete at state: Tori Buffington, Htee Htoo, Ehler Klay, and Kaitlyn Florey. Regions weren't held for the girls, so they qualified for state according to seed points for the top 16 girls in each weight class.

On Thursday, February 24, wrestlers will have their first match in the morning and then a qualifier match later that night. The next day, they will wrestle semi-final matches. For the third and fourth round wrestle backs, or the losers bracket, they will wrestle back up to the placing rounds. On the final day, they will wrestle the placing matches; after those are done, they move on to the championships.

To help with costs for the team warm-ups and singlets worn during State, the wrestling team does a fundraiser. This fundraiser is not like most fundraisers. It is called the Pin Club and it goes on throughout the whole wrestling season. In this fundraiser, each wrestler has to go ask people if they want to join the club. If the people do, they have to pick a donation price. So, if that person picks \$1, every time the wrestler pins their opponent, the donor owes another dollar. At the end of the season, Coach Goth looks at the sheets and sends letters out to everyone who agreed to donate. This letter tells the person how many pins their wrestler had and how much they owe.

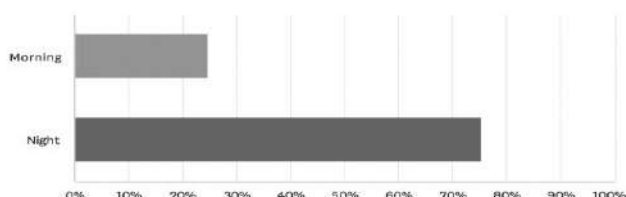

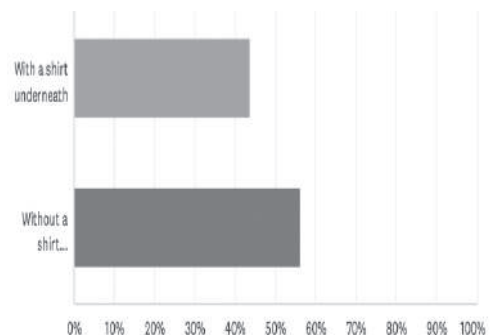
How to wear a sweatshirt
