Performance Task #2: Individual Research- Based Essay & Presentation	8 weeks (24 classes)	Task Overview The College Board's AP Program will annually release cross-curricular stimulus material (texts and print media) representing a range of perspectives focused on a single theme. Students will use these texts to identify a research question of their own; conduct research; analyze, evaluate, and select evidence to develop an argument; and present and defend their conclusions. The final paper must refer to and incorporate at least two of the provided sources. Students have at least 30 school days to complete their research, compose their essays, and develop their presentations. The exam consists of four items (three short-answer and one essay question). The three short-answer questions assess analysis of an argument in a single source or document. The essay question assesses students' skills in synthesizing and creating an evidence-based argument.
