The World of High School English II, III, & AP Literature

A lot has changed since Lynn Shackelford came to Cashion seven years ago. There's a new high school. What was once an indoor swimming pool on campus is now a spacious weight room. The old high school, the gym and cafeteria are being remodeled.

Few things look the same as they did when he came to town in 2003. "It's safe to say things have changed quite a bit in my seven years here." Shackelford said.

And that includes the football program.

For starters, Shackelford came into an eightman program. The Wildcats are about to enter their third season in Class A, the smallest of the 11-man classes. Cashion enters the 2010 season — which is a new era for Class A football in Oklahoma — as the No. 1-ranked team in its class and returns 14 starters off a team that went 12-1 a year ago, losing in the quarterfinals to eventual runner-up Stroud. When Shackelford arrived in the Kingfisher County town, none of that probably seemed possible. Originally hired as a football assistant and head boys' basketball coach, he's seen the culture there change first-hand. "When two-a-days started my first year here, we had 16 quys on the field the first day," Shackelford said. "Then there were 22 kids in the gym (for basketball) on my first day when school started."

That culture has completely changed.

"Now when school starts, there will be probably five or six kids in the gym and we expect about 33 or 34 kids to be out for football," he said,

Success has been a big reason.

Although Cashion won Class C (eight-man) championships in 1977, 1979 and 1961, the tradition had worn off and the Wildcats had become only occasional visitors to the playoffs.

The turnaround began with Phil Elerick, but has been catapulted by Shackelford, now entering his fifth season as the head coach. In his first four years, Cashion has won at least 10 games three times and rattled off a 42-7 record. "It's just so popular now with all the kids," he said. "We have 25 sixth graders playing football this year. That shows that it's what the community has fallen in love with."

He says that much is evident on Friday nights. "They pack the stands now and it wasn't always like that," he said. "It's been really amazing to see the turnaround."

Of course, Shackelford is no stranger to success. A product of Morrison, Shackelford never tasted defeat in high school as his teams went 54-0 and won four state titles (he started all four years, playing a combination of defensive back, running back and quarterback). As a coach, he's learned how valuable those extra 14 games were to the program. "If you look at the teams that are in the playoffs all the time, there's no big secret why they're there," he said. "You get to practice more and you play more games."

Shackelford played more than an entire extraseason in his career and all that extra time just continued to build the monster that was Morrison football. "Every round you win in the playoffs, it just helps the program so much more each time," he said, "The practice and the experience you get from that are invaluable."

Cashion now has that experience.

This year's crop of seniors played in the Class B quarterfinals in 2007, the Class A first round in 2008 and had three playoff games last year. That 52-47 loss to Stroud to end last year's run didn't

Leading that charge is quarterback Jeremy Seaton.

At 6-foot-4, 230 pounds, he could easily be mistaken for a linebacker (which he is, too), a defensive lineman, or even an offensive tackle. Instead, he's perhaps the most dangerous offensive weapon in Class A. Last year he threw for 2,015 yards, rushed for over 1,300 yards and took part in 42 total touchdowns.

"It's kind of scary what he might look like when he becomes a man because he doesn't even turn 18 until the middle of the season," Shackelford said. "But the thing about Jeremy is that he's the kind of leader I want on my team."

Seaton speaks with his actions, not his words. "He's not a 'rah-cah' guy. He doesn't yell and scream at his teammates," Shackelford said. "He just shows up, does what he's supposed to do and does it as hard as he can do it."


And he wants to help make others better too, even if it means getting his QB hands dirty. "If we're doing a drill and we need a defensive end or an offensive lineman, he'll jump in there and play," Shackelford said. "He just wants to do what it takes to get better and win."

The quarterback is also a dominant force on the defensive side, coming off a season in which he recorded 97 tackles, mostly at linebacker, where he'll play all of this season.

When throwing, Seaton's favorite target will be junior Britt Basfer. As a sophomore, he caught 57 passes for 941 yards and 11 touchdowns. "When we played really good teams, he really stuck out and that was as a sophomore."

Shackelford said of Basler, who has been nearly unstoppable in this summer's team camps and 7-on-7 competitions. "People just have a hard time covering him. He's not extremely fast, but he's deceptive, runs really good mutes, has great hands and has a lot of confidence in him."

> Basier added 81 tackles as an outside linebacker as well, but will likely move to free safety as Cashion makes the transition from a 3-4 to a 4-2-5 defense. Junior Taylor Cochran will start opposite Basler on offense. Although his numbers aren't as impressive, they'll certainly increase this year. "He caught some huge passes for us fast year and he's had a really good summer," Shackelford said. "It really gives us a chance to be good in the passing game when we line him up opposite of



However, as good as Cashion may be at the skill positions, it may be even better on the offensive and defensive fronts. That, said Shackelford, is where it matters. "You can have the Heisman Trophy winner at quarterback, but if you can't block for him, it doesn't matter, he said. "That's what gives us the thought that we could be pretty good is the expecience we have coming back up front."

That includes three linemen who started and two athers who earned significant playing time. The biggest is Dexton Robertson, a 6-4, 300-pound sophomore who remarkably was just 14 years old when last season started. He worked his way into being the team's best lineman by the end of his freshman year.

Robertson and Branden Nixon, a 250-pound junior, will play offensive tackle. Cody Freeman, a 260-pound senior, will play guard. Harley Hernandez, Lane Welch and Mitchell Yearout will fill up the other spots. All six will also rotate on the defensive front. The group gives the team not only experience, but size and strength. That kind of depth could come in handy once the Wildcats hit the playoffs, a destination the program fully expects to make every year now. "Once you get your program to a certain level, the expectation is that you just win. There is nothing else you think about," Shackelford said.

The coach admitted that his program isn't at that point just yet like Jenks, Union, Morrison, Carl Albert and a handful of others. But it's a lot closer than it was in 2003 when 16 players came out for that first practice.

"We're turning the corner here," Sharkelford said, "Getting to the playoffs isn't a goal here anymore, it's expected.

"Now we want to do something when we get there and that's good to see."
