This art lesson is perfect for teachers who do not have an extensive background teaching art or art history.


Each unit includes:


- a read-aloud script for teachers to introduce the lesson

These projects are created with an understanding that teachers may have limited budgets for art supplies. They were created with common and inexpensive are supplies.


The goal of these lessons is to remove the time and stress of planning art lessons, and enjoy the engagement, fun and meaningful communication that comes from experiencing art.

Ted Harrison Arctic Art

Teacher Script:

Ted Harrison was an artist who lived in Canada. He was born in 1926. He died in 2015.

Ted Harrison moved to the north of Canada to a place called Yukon, which is near the North Pole. When he got there he noticed that things near the North Pole were different from other places in the world that he had visited and lived.

What do you imagine might have been different? What do you think it's like near the North Pole?

When you are very close to the North Pole, the sun never fully sets in the summer time.
So, it is light out all night long!
Kids have to go to sleep when the sky is still light!

What do you think happens in the winter?
In the winter, the sun never comes far above the horizon. The sky doesn't get very much light, even at lunch time!

What would it be like to come to school in the dark?

Have you ever come to school in the dark? How did it feel?

Ted also noticed that the landscape of the Yukon was different than other places he had lived, such as England and New Zealand.

There were open, snowy fields called "tundra", and not as many forests as he was used to.

Ted started to draw and paint things he saw in the Yukon. He developed a style that used warm and cool colors beside each other. He also used a lot of lines to outline the land and sky.

Show pictures of Ted Harrison's paintings and discuss together.

What do you notice about the artwork? What do you notice about the colors?

Ted Harrison sometimes chose big areas of warm colors (red, yellow, orange) next to big areas of cool colors (blue, purple, green).
This created "contrast" because warm and cool are opposite or complementary; it's what makes his pictures so vibrant.

Can you find an example of cool colors and to warm colors?

Do the paintings look realistic like photographs?

Ted Harrison used simplified versions of the things he saw around him. He was more interested in shapes and colors than making things look like a photograph.

We are going to make our own painting that is inspired by Ted Harrison.



Materials: Students will need a piece of thick or watercolor paper, a pencil, and pastels or paint

Directions:


Together, draw the following steps:

I. Draw wavy lines horizontally across the bottom of the page. The lines drop down near the middle, then go up again. (See examples). This represents mountains.



2. Next, make a simplified sunset. Draw a small sun in the very middle sun in the middle, and add more lines every inch or so above it. This does not have to be perfect; the variations make it interesting.



3. Now it's ready to color! Color the sky with warm colors, going from lightest on the sun (yellow then orange) to darkest at the top of the paper (red)

4. Color the mountains with cool colors. You could start with purple at the bottom and move to blue and green, but any combination will do, especially if you have different shades of each color.

Continue until the whole page is covered with color. If the black lines were covered, you can trace over all the lines again with black marker or pastel, depending on which one shows up the best with your materials.





Ted Harrison sometimes included people and objects in his paintings. If you choose, you can make a black inukshuk silhouette. These stone, people-shaped statues are found in the Yukon and were used for navigation and communication.

The inukshuk can be drawn or painted with black, or it can be cut out of black paper and glued on. You can also use the templates provided.
