So what does it mean to be a 100 years old?

- ...In human terms, we refer to someone who reaches this distinctive age as a *centenarian*. This exclusive group conjures up notions of longevity, perspective, wisdom, and connectedness.
- ...In the areas of science and technology, it was a hundred years ago that Einstein profoundly changed the 20^{th} century by finishing and publishing the equations that substantiated his theory of relativity (E=mc²), leading to new branches of study in physics, astronomy, philosophy and even sociology.
- \dots In numerology, 100 represents energy that's self-determined, independent, and has infinite potential.

In many ways, Greenacres embodies all of these elements and many more. Greenacres today is, undoubtedly, the culmination of its rich history, commitment to quality education and innovation, and influence by all alumni and teachers who have been on this journey to date.

The first Greenacres school began in a private home at the corner of Greenacres and Walworth Avenues in 1915. By November of that year, Scarsdale's first elementary school was built in the location of the current school on Huntington Road. The small, one story building had five classrooms and two play porches, and the students were in the capable hands of six teachers. Clearly, a lot has changed over the years, not only in terms of the physical space, but also in teaching methodologies and the programs and services that are offered to students and families. Each of the last 100 years has brought both new ideas, as well as challenges, to the community. This has been a critical part of its development, ensuring innovation and progressive practice, while retaining core values and community traditions.

At its core, Greenacres has and continues to be a neighborhood school, the centerpiece of the community, and the hub of activity for children and adults alike. Without question, the first century in Greenacres has provided a strong foundation for what promises to be another, exceptional one ahead.

Congratulations Greenacres! You are 100 years strong and still growing.

Greenacres History



The Greenacres School circa 1930's

The growing population in Scarsdale necessitated the building of a new school building within Scarsdale's District #1. In May of 1915, a district meeting resulted in the authorization of \$17,000 for the school site, known as the McCabe site and \$28,000 for construction.

The Greenacres Elementary school building opened on November 29, 1915.

The school originated as a one-story building consisting of five classrooms and two play porches. There were six teachers and 86 students.

Enrollment has changed over the years.






In 1922 the Village of Scarsdale had an option to purchase approximately 12 acres of land opposite the Greenacres School from The Scarsdale Estates. This property bounded by Brewster Road, Kevlin Road (now Kingston), Montrose Road and Huntington Avenue was to be used for park and playground purposes. The first proposal was voted down in November, 1922. Soon after, construction of new houses along Brewster and Kevlin Roads started on this land.

In June, 1923 the Board of Education proposed the purchase of 6 acres of land, which was the remaining undeveloped land of the original 1922 proposal. This purchase was approved.

Greenacres History

The Scarsdale Inquirer wrote in its October 29, 1926 edition: ONE WAY STREET - Traffic signs have been placed in Butler Place (now Putnam Avenue) to the west of the Greenacres School, making this a one-way street. This step has been taken to avoid the congestion of cars during the noon and afternoon dismissal periods of the school.



Map of Greenacres, from The Town Club An Introduction to Scarsdale Community Life Huntington Avenue is named after Dr. George Huntington, a professor of astronomy and former resident.

Sage Terrace is named after William H. Sage, a Greenacres resident and former President of the school board.

Putnam Road was originally named Butler Place by Robert Farley, the manager of Scarsdale Estates. The Village Planning Commission changed the street name in 1928. The Putnam name may refer to Colonel Rufus Putnam, chief engineer to General George Washington.

Greenacres History



Greenacres School circa 1970's

The Greenacres School building has changed over the years to meet the needs of the community.

- 1920: The school expanded with the addition of the east and west wings.
- 1929: The addition of the gymnasium created the courtyard space.
- 1957: The library was modernized and expanded to its current location.
- 1990: A small addition was added to the old multi-purpose room.
- 2000: The new multipurpose room, classroom space and the building elevator were added.


Charlie Alterman - Broadway Music Director

GA 1987 & SHS 1993

Charlie Alterman is a Broadway conductor and music director, whose Broadway credits include music direction of Martin Short: Fame Becomes Me, Next to Normal and the recent revivals of Godspell and Pippin. His love for music began at a very early age, fostered in large part by the incredible Trudy Moses at Greenacres.

He began piano lessons at age 4, and by the end of his time at Greenacres, Ms. Moses entrusted him with accompanying several songs on piano at school chorus concerts. This gesture had a lasting impact, as it laid the foundation for his professional work as an accompanist and conductor.

He is currently in rehearsals for the upcoming Broadway show Gotta Dance.



Woody Bliss - Statesman

GA 1948 & SHS 1954

Woody Bliss moved to Scarsdale and started at Greenacres in 4th grade. His teachers, including Mrs. Urmston, (5th G), and Mr. Christie (6th G) awakened an interest in math and science. Woody graduated from Scarsdale High School winning an award for the highest-grade average in math and science. He was a dean's list graduate, earning a BSME and an MMEE at Cornell University.

His professional career includes working for IBM for 34 years in various jobs, including Director of Education for North and South America and the Pacific Rim. While living in Hong Kong from 1984 to 1989 Woody was responsible for the computer operations at the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, Korea.

Woody's participation in many civic activities includes serving on the Board of Education, the Board of Finance and being First Selectman (Mayor) of Weston, Connecticut for eight years.

Throughout his life, Greenacres has had a strong influence on his love of science, technology and engineering.

Nicole Eisenman - Painter/Sculptor

Nicole Eisenman is a painter whose work has been exhibited in exhibitions at such institutions as the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Museum of Modern Art, the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the Carnegie Museum of Art, Kunsthalle Zürich, and the Ludwig Museum in Cologne, Germany. In 2014, she was the subject of a midcareer retrospective exhibition organized by the Contemporary Art Museum, St. Louis, and that traveled to the Institute of Contemporary Art, Philadelphia, and the Museum of Contemporary Art, San Diego. She has received numerous awards including a Guggenheim Foundation Grant and most recently, The MacArthur Fellowship.

The MacArthur Foundation writes "Eisenman is an artist who is expanding the critical and expressive capacity of the Western figurative tradition through works that engage contemporary social issues and phenomena. Over the course of nearly four decades and working across various media, including painting, sculpture, drawing, and printmaking, Eisenman has restored to the representation of the human form a cultural significance that had waned during the ascendancy of abstraction in the twentieth century."

Kenneth I. Juster - Lawyer and Diplomat

Ken Juster is a partner and managing director at the global private equity firm Warburg Pincus. He previously served in the U.S. Government as Under Secretary of Commerce (2001-2005), Counselor (Acting) of the Department of State (1992-1993), and Deputy and Senior Adviser to Deputy Secretary of State Lawrence S. Eagleburger (1989-1992).

In the private sector, Ken has been Executive Vice President of salesforce.com (2005-2010) and a senior partner at the law firm Arnold & Porter (1981-1989, 1993-2001), where he practiced international law.

Ken traces his interest in international affairs to the classmates from other countries that he met at Greenacres and the daily discussions of current events in his fifth grade class with Rose Nichthauser. He also has fond memories of his other excellent teachers, Connie Mehegan, Dottie Farrell (Haseltine), and Vince Dempsey.

Rob Kissner is the founder and CEO of The Digital Arts Experience in White Plains, which offers cutting edge extra-curricular programs focused on creative technology to the kids and teens of the Westchester community. The Digital Arts Experience offers after school programs during the school year and day camps over the summer. In addition, many schools & youth organizations around Westchester and Southern Connecticut contract The Digital Arts Experience to offer programs at their locations.

Linda Carpenter Leavitt - Editor Emerita

GA 1957 & SHS 1964

Linda Carpenter Leavitt entered Greenacres third grade in 1954 and was thrilled to win a short story contest sponsored by the school newspaper. She loved fifth grade with Rose Nicthauser. Her mother, Josephine Carpenter, was PTA president in 1960 and her daughter Alison also attended Greenacres.

In 1984 Linda joined *The Scarsdale Inquirer* and was appointed editor-in-chief in 1990. During her tenure *The Scarsdale Inquirer* received many awards and honors, locally and from the New York Press Association. Linda was named a "distinguished alumna" of Scarsdale High School in 2006 and was recently honored by the Scarsdale Forum after her retirement. Looking back, Linda notes, "I've had a wonderful career writing the weekly history of my hometown."





Alan Schwarz - Journalist

GA 1980 & SHS 1986

Alan is a Pulitzer Prize-nominated journalist at *The New York Times* best known for his 100-article series about the dangers of concussions in sports, which spurred reform both in the National Football League and in youth sports nationwide.

His passion for mathematics -- displayed on the first day of Greenacres kindergarten when he told Mr. Baker, "I want to learn square roots" -- has so infused his ground-breaking journalism that the American Statistical Association honored him in 2013 with its lifetime Excellence in Statistical Reporting Award.

Alan's 2004 best-selling book, The Numbers Game: Baseball's Lifelong Fascination with Statistics, was dedicated to his teachers.





Saya Woolfalk - Artist

GA 1989 & SHS 1997

Saya Woolfalk is a New York based artist who uses anthropology and mythology to re-imagine the world in multiple dimensions.

Fourth grade teacher, Stephanie Harley, introduced Woolfalk to ways to think about culture through creativity, which have been a major influence on her work and her life.

She has exhibited at the Studio Museum in Harlem; Asian Art Museum, CA; P\$1/MoMA; Brooklyn Museum; Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago; MoCA Taipei; MAK Frankfurt; and Performa 09; and has been written about in Artforum, The New York Times, and the Huffington Post. Her solo museum exhibitions include The Empathics at Montclair Art Museum in the fall of 2012, and ChimaTEK Life Products at Chrysler Museum of Art in the fall 2014. She recently completed a video installation commission for the Seattle Art Museum and is a recipient of a NYFA grant in Digital/Electronic Arts.

The Principals of Greenacres

Francine Ballan: The years I spent at Greenacres were the most exciting and satisfying of my career. It was a time of growth for the school including more students and teachers, additional classroom space, an increased use of technology to support instruction, a new multi-purpose room and a new library.





Gerry Young: When we were refurbishing the entryway, we sought out historical photos and artifacts of the school. The daughter of a former teacher gave us many old photos, two that showed the memorial ceremony for Cora Louise Gravely. She died while principal in 1951. A birdbath, stone and a plaque were placed in the courtyard and dedicated in her

memory at that time. Over the years the birdbath deteriorated, leaving only the stone and plaque. It appeared to the students that she was buried there and her name being Gravely didn't help. Some believe she is the "Greenacres Ghost" who appears at the annual Halloween Assembly. One never knows....

Greenacres PTA President Timeline

Before 1924 there was one Parent Teacher Association for the Scarsdale School District. In 1925 the Scarsdale PTA established Grade Mothers for each school.

- Flag Day concert.






From the 1960 Greenacres Handbook

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
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
