Rule 1-All entrants must abide by entry

Rule 3 - Release of all livestock: Livestock will be released after the judging of each species or times indicated. Any exhibitor violating this rule will forfeit any prize money

received during the fair.

Rule 4-Separate exhibits must be provided for each entry. Not more than one entry in any class except livestock and poultry may be

made by any exhibitor.

Rule 5-The Garvin County Fair Board Association is without authority to permit or pay out tax money collected in Garvin County, Oklahoma, to any exhibitor other than those who live in the county or school

county.
Rule 6-All crop, vegetable and flower exhibits must have been raised by the exhibitor during the year 2020.

Rule 7-Superintendents will have final decision on entry eligibility. The placing decisions of the judges shall be final.

sions of the judges shall be final. Rule 8-Junior livestock owned by 4-H or FFA members may be shown by the owner or

some other designated 4-H or FFA member. Rule 9-Junior exhibitors in livestock shows must have continuously owned and cared for

their livestock for thirty (30) days.

Rule 10- All articles exhibited in O.H.C.E.,

Open Class and 4-H/FFA must have been
made since the 2019 fair and not previously

made since the 2019 fair and not previously entered at any fair. An Exhibitor who refuses to comply with this rule faces automatic disqualification of all entries.

Rule 11-No diseased animal will know-

ingly he permitted to be exhibited or occupy a space at the fair, and every precaution will he taken to enforce this rule. However, the management will not be responsible for any

loss or damage that may result from the viola-

tion of this rule.

Rule 12-No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted or suit instituted or maintained against the Free Fair Association, its officers or agents, representatives or employees, on behalf of any person or corporation as a result of damage sustained on the grounds of any free fair in Garvin

County. It is further understood that any loss of property (including exhibits) is not the responsibility of the above mentioned.

4-H Club work in Oklahoma was first

Educational Program, allowing young people the incentive to achieve and then to be recognized for outstanding achievement.

The major goal of 4-H is the individual development of youth in personal, leadership and positive citizenship skills expressed throughout life in the home, school, state, nation and world.

The 4-H exhibits and activities at the State Fair are planned to reflect the many phases of 4-H and the use of projects in the development of boys and girls. The public is invited to visit the 4-H exhibits to observe the accomplishments of 4-H youth.

### ELIGIBILITY OF EXHIBITORS Exhibition in this department is limited

to Oklahoma 4-H members who have been enrolled and actively participating in the program for a minimum of 30 days prior to this State Fair, and who meet the following requirements.

Each county must enter and exhibit all members' entries in sections 4300-4325 at the one state fair they designate. Unless the State 4-H Office is notified by July 1, it is understood that the county will exhibit at the same fair as in the previous year.

All 4-H exhibits must be entered by County Extension Educators.

Members should be enrolled in the project area to exhibit.

The 4-H member should enter the class that matches his/her grade (grade as of September 1 of the 4-H year.) \*If youth are in 3rd grade they must have been 8 years old before September 1\*

All exhibits must have been made and completed by the exhibitor during the last year, and cannot be entered more than one time, except for classes which are collections that are added to in successive years.

For each class, entries are limited to one per individual and also one per county. For other pertinent information relative to projects being exhibited, refer to specific sections, classes, and respective project curriculum.

4-H members who enter crops and horticulture must be able to prove that such crops entered in the 4-H member's name were produced by the member during the current


