With their 21-3 record, Abington Boys Soccer won the Suburban One League American Conference Championship, advanced to the District 1 Class AAAA Championship game, and played in the PIAA Class AAAA

Girls Soccer finished the regular season with a 15-3 record and won their first League Championship since 1992. The team earned a bye for the First Round of the District 1 Class AAAA playoffs. Under the lights of Schwarzman Stadium, Abington defeated Central Bucks South as they advanced to the District 1 quarterfinals.

MATHEMATICS

Abington Senior High School's Health program started with a sense of great anticipation for our seniors as they began a wellness journey that will lead them into the next big phase in their lives, "Life after High School." Our Health curriculum is designed to provide information that will help our seniors make complex decisions that will impact their future in a positive way. One of our "curricular goals" is for our seniors to learn how to identify stressors and deal with them in a healthy manner. One of the most stressful times in a senior's life can be the college application process. In response to this stressor, every class had a member of our guidance department spend a period walking them through the process. Additionally, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) is raising awareness and changing perceptions of mental health conditions with their "Ending the Silence" presentation in all health classes.

The Physical Education program provides students with the opportunity to select activities that align with their interests. This has allowed us to further our mission by encouraging healthy and active lifestyles through a variety of activities. Sound body, sound mind, is our mantra as we look to support cross curricular endeavors moving forward. In striving to achieve this goal, students are exploring and engaging in an assortment of indoor lifetime fitness activities as we move indoors for the winter months. Aquatics and Aerobics have students working hard to achieve personal fitness goals while Kan Jam has been an emerging activity in the Fall Sports course. We are continually looking for opportunities to meet the ever changing fitness needs and activity preferences of our student population.

SOCIAL STUDIES

The Social Studies Department is off to a tremendous start for the 2018-2019 school year. Students have had the opportunity to participate in many unique and engaging projects and activities in each of their classes. Members of the social studies department created lessons and activities to commemorate 9/11 and Constitution Day and they shared special lessons in honor of Veterans Day. In anticipation of the General Election on November 76h, voter registration links were made available to all students who were eligible to vote this year. During the week leading up to Non-Violent Conflict Resolution week, the Social Studies Department conducted special civics lessons and a Mock Election featuring state and federal elections. All of the results from both the Mock Election and the General Election on November 6th were made available to students through their Social Studies teachers. As part of our No Place For Hate initiative students in 10th and 11th grade classes participated in curriculum-based activities that addressed the issues of bigotry and racism, and advocated tolerance and embracing diversity. Our Advanced Placement Government classes welcomed Montgomery County Commissioner, Ken Lawrence, who spoke to the students about local government and shared information about becoming poll workers for the county Election Commission. In the area of extra-curricular activities, students had the opportunity to elect officers for the class of 2021 as well as student council representatives. Our World Affairs Club, Psychology Club, Model U.N. Club and our newly-created NAMI club are up and running and are planning a number of trips and activities throughout the year including Start with Hello week during the first week of school and a "We Belong" campaign to promote inclusiveness in our school community.

For a number of years now some of the computer science students at Abington have participated in hackathons all over the country. These students have gone on their own, not as a school trip.

This year we decided to form a school trip to attend a hackathon. We attended EastHacks, a student-run hackathon in the South Jersey area for high school students, hosted by members of Cherry Hill High School East's Women in Science Organization. As defined by techopedia.com, a hackathon is a gathering where programmers collaboratively code in an extreme manner over a short period of time. For 24 hours, over 200 participants learned about technology, competed in coding competitions, and met up/make friends. Twenty-four of our own Abington students attended and had a great time.

Our Future Business Leaders chapter has begun its competitive season. Students have begun preparing for exams and creating projects in all areas of business administration and areas of technology.

Our Advanced Placement Computer Science Principles students participated in the Spotted Lanternfly Hackathon, a STEM-related initiative that invites students in grades 9-12 to design an app to easily track, detect, identify and access information about the invasive species.

On Halloween Weekend the Marching Ghosts hosted thirteen visiting bands for the 14th Bands in the Boneyard competition which, due to weather conditions, was held indoors for the first time. The marching season ended on Saturday, November 10th with the Cavalcade of Bands Yankee A Class Championship in Hershey, PA. The Marching Ghosts placed 2nd and won caption awards for "Best Visual Performance," "Best Color Guard," "Best Percussion" and "Most Improved Score."

As the final notes of marching season echo in the distance, the indoor season begins with the Abington Indoor Guard and Abington Indoor Percussion starting rehearsals on November 26.
