6th GRADE RENAISSANCE GRADE LEVEL PROJECT

(Counts as a test grade in M	Iath, Science, Social	Studies and Language Ar	ts)
DUE:			

Objective: Students will research and evaluate the culture, economy, lifestyles, and effects of scientific discovery during the Renaissance period. In order to evaluate the social hierarchies, students will develop a resume and portfolio to justify why they should be allowed to "move up" within the hierarchy.

HELP WANTED!!!

If you are qualified and worthy enough to perform the duties of the following positions, please bring your resume and a portfolio to our Annual Festival of Moving Up! Call your local cultural director (alias Social Studies teacher) or send your resume and portfolio to the Court of Fools (your sixth grade teachers) for consideration.

Each student will create a portfolio to include: a **resume** (name, address, objective, work history, awards/recognitions, and references), a **sample** of his/her work (music, art, speech, writing, etc.), a **cover letter** that justifies why this particular work sample proves that he/she is qualified for the job, and a **report** that justifies how he/she will contribute to the overall economy of our village in a positive manner.

I. Resume – 25 points (sample below)

- Must include: name, address, objective, work history, awards/recognitions, and references
- Be creative and remember to "sell" yourself out of the lower classes!
- 12 point Times New Roman
- No more than 2 pages

II. Work Sample – 25 points

This aspect of the project should connect to the position and integrate the Renaissance time period for which you are applying. For example, if you would like to become a dancer, then an appropriate dance for the Renaissance era would be appropriate. Other examples include:

- Political leader speech, commercial, editorial, etc.
- Pope speech, research paper on religion during the era, etc.
- Artist painting, sculpture, etc.
- Scientist project, invention, etc.
- Mathematician architecture, astronomy, Pythagorean theory, etc.
- Shakespeare's Apprentice writing samples,
- Dante's Scribe samples of fiction, poetry, drama, etc.
- Musician performance, written song, etc.

Presentations will be conducted during our Renaissance fair and graded according to the rubric. The work sample must: reference the Renaissance time period, integrate aspects of the job you are applying for (do not sing a song if you are applying to be Dante's Scribe!), and be creative!

III. Cover Letter – 25 points (example below)

The cover letter must make an argument for why you should be hired. It should include the following:

- Name and address of both parties (sender and receiver)
- Introduction paragraph Introduce yourself and why you are applying for the job and then begin to discuss your work history
- Second paragraph continue discussing work history
- Third paragraph state what your strengths are and how you will make a difference
- Fourth paragraph conclusion in which you thank them and inform them you are looking forwarding to hearing from them
- 12 point Times New Roman
- No more than one page

IV. "FAST FORWARD" ESSAY: The Renaissance vs. The Present (2011) – 25 points (example included)

This essay should compare and contrast economic life during the Renaissance with the current state of the economy in our world. Focus on a **specific** aspect of the Renaissance that relates to your new "position."

For example:

• Politics, Religion, Art, Math/Science, Writing/Publishing, Theatre, Music, Inventions, Class System in general

Example: I may look specifically at the music of the Renaissance if I am applying to be a musician. I would investigate how musicians made a living during the Renaissance and compare and contrast the information to salaries and positions in the industry today. I would look for economic connections and influences from the Renaissance that I may see in our current music industry. I would examine how musicians got paid then and how they get paid now – who is responsible for their "paychecks?"

Through research, you will need to provide specific examples from each time period, making connections through similarities, and highlighting how things have changed economically through the differences. Support your claims with details and elaboration. Finally, you should explain what the implications your findings are. How does it affect us today? Do we still have a class system? Is this industry financially stable or making more that they should?

- 12 point Times New Roman
- No more than one page
- At least 3 paragraphs to support data

In addition to your essay, you must create a graphic representation of how things have changed or remained the same over time.

OPTIONS:

- Chart/graph
- Graphic organizer
- Timeline
- Info-graphic

The resume, cover letter, and essay should use credible research sources for support and evidence to support your argument. Students are required to use at least 5 sources for research (book, websites, and encyclopedias) and create a Works Cited page. Time will be provided at school for research, media center, and time in the computer lab with all teachers within his/her team. Our media center specialist will also provide research sessions for all students. However, some time will be needed at home as well. All projects will be graded by the homeroom teacher and will be due on Monday, December 12 to be used in a culminating Renaissance Fair where students will have the opportunity to interview with local companies.
