Through lectures and demonstrations by professors, on-site tours of facilities available for study and research, projects used to demonstrate industrial and research applications, and hands-on exercises, students will begin to gain an understanding of which areas excite and interest them the most. In addition to academic seminars, students also participate in information sessions, round table discussions, and team-building activities that are conducive to the open exchange of ideas.
