- Chicken Sunday by Patricia Pollaco: Readers learn that Family isn't necessarily restricted to relatives. Two African American boys and one Russian American girl celebrate their shared love for Gramma. Can they find the right gift in time for Easter Sunday?
- The Chocolate Touch by Patrick Skene Catling: What if everything you touched turned into chocolate?! Would it be the best thing ever, or a nightmare?
- Charlie and the Great Glass Elevator by Roald Dahl: A sequel to the beloved Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. Readers are taken on another magical ride to discover what happens when they ride the glass elevator to space?
- Horrible Harry Moves Up To Third Grade by Suzy Kline: Moving to third grade is a big transition. Can Harry manage his emotions when a sworn enemy from 2<sup>nd</sup> grade accidentally kill's Harry's pet spider?
- The Magic Tree House Series #1 Dinosaurs Before Dark by Mary Pope Osborne: Where did the tree house come from? Before Jack and Annie can find out, the mysterious tree house whisks them to the prehistoric past. Now they have to figure out how to get home. Can they do it before dark...or will they become a dinosaur's dinner?
- The Magic Tree House Series #3 Mummies in the Morning by Mary Pope
  Osborne: Jack and Annie don't need another mummy. But that's what they get

- The Magic Tree House Series #6 Afternoon on the Amazon by Mary Pope Osborne: Vampire bats and killer ants? That's what Jack and Annie are about to run into when the Magic Tree House whisks them away to the Amazon River. It's not long before they get hopelessly lost. Will they be able to find their way back to the tree house? Or are Jack and Annie stuck forever in the rain forest?
- Who is Derek Jeter? By Gail Herman and Andrew Thomson: One of many books in the popular biographical series. Readers learn about the early life and career accomplishments of the famous baseball player.
- Who Was Nelson Mandela? By Stephen Marchesi: Another from the popular Who Is series, readers learn about major accomplishments and milestones in the great leader's life.
