Brunswick School Department Social Studies Grade 6 Ancient Egypt

<u>Unit Overview</u>

Sixth grade students will be studying the geography, economics and culture of Ancient Egypt in this unit. Topics covered include: daily life of the five separate classes of Egyptian society, the role of religion, and effects of Egyptian technology on future societies. Larger philosophical issues will be discussed, such as: the role social classes have in maintaining a stable society. Attention will also be paid to the physical geography of the region and how it affected Egypt's growth.

- Geography dictates human settlement patterns.
- Ancient civilizations laid the foundation for future societies.
- Characteristics of civilizations are common across time and place.
