## Brunswick School Department Social Studies Grade 7 –Ancient Greece

### <u>Unit Overview</u>

Ancient Athenians were the first people in human history to experiment with largescale self-governance. This unit will trace the impact that experiment had on our nation's ideals and principals, while also reviewing the major people, events, and turning points of Ancient Greece. The relationship between the geography of Ancient Greece and its ancient cultures will also be explored.

- Identify major city-states, peninsulas, and bodies of water of Ancient Greece
- Compare and contrast Ancient Athenian direct democracy vs. Wabanaki consensus-based governance
