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FOSTER-GLOCESTER REGIONAL SCHOOLS ONE OF 79 ORGANIZATIONS NATIONWIDE TO RECEIVE AN NEA BIG READ GRANT

The communities of Foster and Glocester to Read and Celebrate <u>The Things They Carried</u> From November 1, 2018- January 18th 2019

September 7, 2018—Foster-Glocester, RI—Foster- Glocester Regional Schools is a recipient of a grant of \$15,000 to host the NEA Big Read in the communities of Foster and Glocester. A national initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest, the NEA Big Read broadens our understanding of our world, our communities, and ourselves through the joy of sharing a good book. Foster- Glocester Regional Schools is one of 79 nonprofit organizations to receive an NEA Big Read grant to host a community reading program between November 2018 and January 2019. The NEA Big Read in Foster-Glocester will focus on *The Things They Carried* by Tim O'Brien. Activities will take place between November 1, 2018 and January 16, 2019.

"This program encourages people to not only discuss a book together, but be introduced to new perspectives, discuss the issues at the forefront of our own lives, and connect with one another at events."

The NEA Big Read showcases a diverse range of contemporary titles that reflect many different voices and perspectives, aiming to inspire conversation and discovery. The main feature of the initiative is a grants program, managed by Arts Midwest, which annually supports dynamic community reading programs, each designed around a single NEA Big Read selection.

Foster- Glocester Regional Schools will be partnering with the Foster and Glocester public libraries, veterans' organizations, and local businesses in both communities to present inter-generational programming surrounding *The Things They Carried.* A kick-off event with a book distribution will be held at Ponaganset High School on November 1st at 6:30pm following a candlelight vigil in connection with the hosting of the Moving Wall (a half-size replica of the Vietnam Memorial). After the vigil, free copies of the book will be distributed to community members during a reception featuring the Ponaganset High School Jazz Ensemble performing music of the Vietnam era. Festivities will culminate in January with author Tim O'Brien visiting Foster-Glocester to work with Ponaganset High School students. A free evening presentation and book signing on January 16, 2019 will be open to the public.
