Supporting the Whole Child

The Somerville Public Schools (SPS) is a diverse community of about 5,000 students who are part of an innovative and creative educational environment. Among the features that make the Somerville Public Schools leaders in education are:

A Comprehensive, Challenging, **Engaging Curriculum**

Somerville students benefit from a comprehensive, engaging curriculum that provides them with a competitive edge that comes from a wide range of learning opportunities, such as:

- · Hands-on learning experiences including visits to high-tech institutions in the region, and learning opportunities with community partners who provide our students with real-world connections;
- Project based learning activities that help students develop leadership and communication skills while mastering core content, such as History Day presentations that include role playing of historical figures, Hour of Code events, and more;
- Nature's Classroom and other educational field trips that broaden students' knowledge and appreciation of the world around us:
- The Middle Grades Project a fun and challenging media project where students learn about collaboration, problem-solving, critical thinking, technology and communication while researching ways to address current issues;
- Cross Integration Projects where students use knowledge gained in one subject to enhance their learning in another;
- Robust menu of course offerings for high school students, including AP courses, a wide breadth of World Languages and electives, and Career and Technical Education courses to meet the needs and interests of a diverse student body.

Somerville students benefit from an instructional program that includes:

A Rigorous Core Curriculum that provides students with a solid foundation for academic success by developing critical thinking skills and connecting their learning to the real world:

- Balanced Literacy approach to English Language Arts that challenges students daily
- Investigations Math curriculum that promotes critical thinking skills
- · Social Studies curriculum enriched with project-based and experiential learning opportunities
- Science curriculum enhanced by off-site hands-on learning experiences

A Comprehensive Instructional Program that provides students with a rich overall learning experience, builds leadership skills, and develops the 21st century skills necessary to compete on a global scale.

- Art The Visual Arts Department endorses the research that shows that students who participate in a Visual Arts Program develop basic skills that encourage visual awareness and are fundamental to intellectual growth and creative self-expression. All students have the opportunity to explore the visual arts. The Art Department offers a wide range of courses aimed at students of varying abilities and interests. Students who wish to pursue careers in art are offered specialized courses and portfolio preparation.
- Athletics Athletics are an integral component of the overall educational experience, with the goal of having student athletes strive to reach their potential and give their best in the classroom and on the field. High School students can participate in interscholastic sports; middle grades students can participate in a variety of intramural sports teams.

- English Language Education In all English Language Learner (ELL) programs, students learn English as a Second Language (ESL) while learning grade-level content. Teachers modify their teaching methods to meet the needs of students as they develop English proficiency. ESL Instructional Specialists assigned to each school provide services to English Learners in general education and special education classes.
- Health/Physical Education A comprehensive health and physical education instructional program encourages students to make healthy decisions and live an active lifestyle to the best of their ability across their lifetimes. The program includes swimming instruction in Grade 3, and bicycling instruction at Grade 5. Health topics are taught by a combination of classroom teachers, physical education instructors, guidance staff, school nurses, and community partners.
- Library/Media Studies Weekly Library/Media Studies instruction helps ensure that SPS students are media literate. This is achieved through the integration of library media instruction with subject specific activities. Library Media Specialists collaborate with staff and students to develop activities that reinforce and expand classroom learning.
- Music Weekly music instruction is available to students in grades Pre-Kindergarten (PK)-8. In addition, free instrumental music lessons are offered to students in grades 4-8. Somerville High School offers many music electives and students can concentrate their electives on music theory and practice. Students have the opportunity to demonstrate their individual musicianship skills, as well as their contributions to the overall performance process at school, district, and community performances throughout the school year.
- **Special Education** The Special Education Department helps ensure that students who require special education services in order to maximize their learning are identified, and that students' individualized learning needs are met in the least restrictive and most inclusive environment possible. Special Education staff members work with teachers, administrators and families to develop and implement Individual Education Programs (IEPs) for students, that will provide them with the greatest opportunity for success.
- World Languages Somerville's World Language program is built on one of the greatest strengths of our community the cultural and linguistic diversity of our students and their families. The SPS World Language Department endorses the research that shows that students who learn another language reach higher academic performance, display greater cognitive benefits, and develop a more positive attitude toward the target language and the speakers of that language. Elementary instruction focuses on appreciating other cultures through the understanding of their language. Middle grades students can participate in the Spanish world language program, while high school world language instruction includes opportunities to master Spanish, Italian, French, and Portuguese.

Continuous Learning for Continuous Growth

Somerville's commitment to supporting students extends beyond classroom time, with Out-of-School-Time programs and Adult Learning opportunities.

Community Schools Afterschool — PK-5 afterschool programs offer a diverse mix of grade-appropriate learning and enrichment activities that complement the school day and provide students with an opportunity to enhance their English, organizational, leadership and teamwork skills. Students also benefit from daily academic support, including homework assistance and targeted tutoring support.

Partnerships with Citizen Schools, Breakthrough Greater Boston, and Enroot provide additional afterschool academic and college and career readiness support for middle grades and targeted high school students.

Adult Learning —We're committed to helping build a stronger community by providing opportunities for continuous adult learning that can ultimately strengthen family foundations and lead to greater support of our youth.

• SCALE—Since 1974, The Somerville Center for Adult Learning Experiences (SCALE) has provided classes and support services to more than 1,200 adult learners annually who need basic reading, writing and math skills, English instruction for non-native speakers, or a high school credential. SCALE's fully accessible facilities have a state-of-the-art computer lab and an on-site HiSET Test Center. Most classes are free. Fees are charged for orientations as well as for testing for the GED (General Educational Development) diploma and for the ADP (Adult Diploma Program).

A Safe and Healthy Learning Environment

Our vision of educating the whole child extends beyond the classroom. By creating a learning environment that nurtures the physical, social and emotional well-being of students, we are creating an environment that enhances their ability to enjoy success in the classroom and beyond.

Our award-winning Somerville Food & Nutrition Services **Department**, a leader in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, provides students with nutritious meals including a universal free breakfast program to help students start their day right.



Lunch options include fresh salad bars at most schools, delicious healthy entrees and plenty of fruits and vegetables. Students also actively explore the benefits of healthy food choices through fun Farm to School educational programs such as the annual district-wide Corn Shucking event, and food tastings that introduce students to new foods. Some schools also participate in the USDA's Fresh Fruit & Vegetable program which provides students with a healthy mid-afternoon fresh fruit or vegetable snack.

A structured Physical Education curriculum is enhanced with a variety of additional programs that keep students active and energized. The morning BOKS program at K-8 schools offers students a chance to kick-start their day with a 45-minute structured fitness program followed by a nutritious breakfast so students are ready to focus on learning when the morning bell rings. Through a partnership with Shape Up Somerville and dedicated teams of parents/guardians and community volunteers, many of our students periodically walk to school by participating in various "Safe Routes to School" initiatives, such as Walking School Buses and Park and Walk.

School Nursing support plays a key role in helping students develop healthy bodies and healthy minds. School Nurses in Somerville, managed through a partnership with the Somerville Health Department, facilitate positive student responses to youth development, promote health and safety, intervene with health concerns, provide case management, and actively and collaboratively build student and family capacity for adaptation, self-management, self-advocacy, and learning.

We also enhance students' success in the classroom by promoting safe and supportive learning environments in our schools. We help K-8 students develop good social skills using evidence-based curricula: Second Step and Responsive Classroom. Strong partnerships, such as our partnership with Middlesex Partnerships for Youth (MPY), provide our students and staff with the strategies and knowledge to help them create a welcoming and supportive culture in their schools. These partnerships also help empower students to set high aspirations and to learn by leading. A variety of student clubs and groups, such as the Somerville Mediation Team at Somerville High, also help create positive school cultures through active student participation and civic engagement.

Community Engagement—The SFLC

Somerville students benefit from an engaged community, eager to share their expertise, time, and resources to support youth. The Somerville Family Learning Collaborative (SFLC) offers workshops and activities that engage parents and guardians in school-based programs that support their students' learning and development. Programs and workshop are open to all Somerville families and are organized in four strands: Family in the Community, Leadership and Advocacy, Teaching and Learning, and the Whole Child. Translation and interpretation are available at all workshops in the District's target languages (Spanish, Portuguese and Haitian Creole). The SFLC also offers Parent-Child Literacy Playgroups, a Parent Child Home Program, The New Moms Group, and a Toddler-Parent Group. Schoolbased Family and Community Liaisons also help connect families with their school.

The Dr. Albert F. Argenziano School at Lincoln Park is driven by the mission of supporting and fostering an educational and communal environment that results in the development of students who are literate in all subject areas, experienced in current technologies, and who think critically, behave ethically, lead healthy lives, and assume the responsibilities of citizenship in a multicultural and multiracial society. Opened in September 2007, this state-of-the-art facility features upgraded classrooms, a gymnasium, a multi-purpose cafetorium, a library/media center, and a math/science technology center.

Building on the school's multicultural and multilingual strengths, the staff is committed to pursuing innovative teaching strategies that enable students to meet every academic challenge, and to fully develop lifelong learning skills. The Argenziano School at Lincoln Park also serves as the home of the District's Structured English Immersion Program (SEIP), offering intensive instruction for English Language Learners, including integrated model classrooms in the early grades. Many Argenziano students participate in a variety of academic and recreational activities offered both before and after school that provide additional quality education and enrichment programming.

Built in 1900 and named for Tufts faculty member Benjamin G. Brown, the Brown School is the oldest elementary school in Somerville, and the smallest of the Somerville Public Schools' elementary schools. The Brown School offers a small school family atmosphere with a strong emphasis on preparing students to excel academically and personally, providing them with the tools to become productive and positive members of society.

The educational philosophy of the Brown school reflects its motto: "We are a community of learners who: Believe in ourselves, Respect ourselves and our community, Organize ourselves for success, Work together and help others, and Never give up!" Teachers participate in professional development endeavors to develop and create engaging teaching strategies that will meet the individual learning needs of their students.

Creative learning experiences such as Nature's Classroom and a focus on multi-grade relationships like learning buddies and academic mentors, help keep students engaged in their learning and in their community.

The East Somerville Community School (ESCS) is a diverse learning community in an ethnically rich neighborhood. ESCS lives its motto, "Every Student can Succeed" by preparing students to achieve at high levels in their next stage of education, while applying lifelong learning skills. ESCS's instructional focus is a school and community-wide effort to increase students' ability to write to express their thinking and learning across the content areas as measured by the MCAS and school based common assessments.

The ESCS features state-of-the-art technology, a beautiful auditorium, child-friendly recreation facilities, outdoor learning environments including a school garden courtyard, and energy-saving features, all of which help create a positive teaching and learning environment.

ESCS is also home to the District's UNIDOS program, a two-way English/Spanish language and cultural immersion program that enrolls native speakers of English and Spanish to learn together 50% of the day in Spanish and 50% in English. UNIDOS students are taught in both languages, and develop oral and written proficiency along with an appreciation of each other's culture and heritage.

The Arthur D. Healey School is an innovative, participatory learning community that places a high value on academic competence and the belief that children learn best in a joyful, creative environment in which their natural curiosity, imagination and thinking are encouraged. The school emphasizes learning through creative experiences of project-based learning, arts integration, service learning integration and off-site learning. Learning experiences are designed to engage children's interest and best efforts, and to promote the importance of community in the lives of children. The Healey School celebrates diversity through its core values of excellence, joy, openness and creativity.

The Healey School was the pilot site of a Head Start/SPS classroom, an initiative launched in September 2014 as part of the District's commitment to universal kindergarten readiness and birth-to-grade 3 alignment efforts. This partnership has continued to grow across the district.

Healey School students and teachers also benefit from excellent outdoor spaces that are used for learning. The Healey school garden is the site of many hands-on student projects. The schools' proximity to the Mystic River also offers an outdoor learning laboratory for life sciences and much more. Teachers design engaging and creative learning experiences that include the use of these outdoor spaces.

- · Arts integration as an important curriculum practice
- Use of the Second Step curriculum to support social-emotional learning
- Use of Responsive Classroom to support development of a positive school climate
- Middle Grades Program that emphasizes college preparation including visits to local colleges
- Numerous rich afterschool programs that include academic support, technology, and arts
- Strong partnerships with Tufts University, Mystic Learning Center, and SomerPromise
- Emphasis on experiential learning opportunities, such as Nature's Classroom trips

Somerville's John F. Kennedy School is driven by the goal of providing all students with academic, social and emotional experiences necessary for future success. The school places a strong emphasis on inclusion, ensuring that all students with special needs can thrive in the general education setting.

Service learning, History and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) play prominently in a Kennedy students' learning experience. Kennedy middle grades students regularly compete in regional, statewide and national History Day competitions, and students at all grade levels have opportunities to learn the value of making a positive difference in their community by engaging in service learning activities throughout the year. The Kennedy School was the district's first school to develop a Makerspace/ Innovation Lab that all students and teachers are able to use to enchance and support what students are learning daily and to further stimulate student inquiry and engagement. A rich menu of out-of-school-time activities and programs provide students with additional enrichment and academic support.

SEEK and SKIP at the Kennedy School

The Somerville Public Schools are committed to providing the least restrictive setting possible for children with special educational needs. The SEEK (Socio-Emotional Education at the Kennedy) program serves children in grades K-8 who exhibit emotional and behavioral challenges preventing them from accessing the curriculum. A highly skilled staff of teachers, clinicians and support staff serve up to 40 children in five classrooms. Opportunities for inclusion in general education classes are provided with the active support of SEEK staff. SKIP (Specialized Kennedy Intensive Program) provides services to students with severe physical, cognitive, and medical disabilities and related challenges. This program offers an individualized program in very small class settings with staff-to-student ratios of up to 1:2, along with two full-time nurses and related clinical specialties. While students spend a considerable amount of time in small classes, each program strives to provide appropriate 'inclusion' opportunities based upon individual student needs. Both programs serve the entire public school district and are housed at the Kennedy School.

The Winter Hill Community Innovation School (WHCIS) is a child-centered, academically rich environment that serves a population of students from culturally diverse backgrounds. As part of the school's collaborative approach to teaching and learning, teachers regularly have one on one conferences with students to assess progress and mutually set goals. In 2014, the WHCIS advanced to Level 2 status on the state's 5-level accountability rating system and has continued to make gains in narrowing achievement gaps.

Winter Hill is the district's first school to receive "Innovation School" designation from the Dept. of Elementary and Secondary Education. As part of its Innovation status, WHCIS enjoys increased autonomy and has been introducing new educational practices to support its vision of using innovative approaches to better meet the varied needs of a highly diverse range of learners. In 2017, the Winter Hill became the first public Innovation School to receive the Pozen Prize for Innovative Schools and the accompanying \$75,000 award.

A new approach to professional development includes cross-team, grade-level common planning time. WHCIS also adopted the Responsive Classroom social and emotional learning program. These initiatives have strengthened the schools' commitment to inclusion. Introduction of a dress code (voted on by students) and Breakfast in the Classroom support the commitment to the whole child.

Next Wave Junior High School and Full Circle High School are Somerville's alternative therapeutic schools. Both schools are designed to meet the academic, social, emotional, and behavioral needs of students who, for many reasons, have been unable to experience success in more traditional education settings. By combining the clinical concept of a therapeutic community with the educational concepts of individualized and specialized integrated learning experiences, Next Wave/Full Circle effects academic, social, and personal success for students between the ages of 12 and 21.

The program at Next Wave and Full Circle includes academic, therapeutic, and structured student governance components. Students work with materials and on projects designed to meet them where they're at academically and socially, proceeding at their own pace, and developing strong personal relationships that foster participation in the school as a democratic community. Both schools help students develop the necessary academic and social skills to complete high school and to continue their education or successfully enter the workforce. Project-based and experiential learning opportunities in small-group settings are important aspects of the program. This approach helps students gain teamwork and leadership skills that can lead to success in and outside of the classroom.

Students earn a Full Circle diploma upon completion of all course and credit requirements. Full Circle offers a standard (although adapted and individualized) high school curriculum that includes math, language arts, science,

and social studies, along with some electives. Credits are awarded based on attendance, academic performance, and participation in a comprehensive program of required curricula, student government activities, a work-study program, and counseling groups.

Full Circle and Next Wave are committed to the idea of an integrated teaching and counseling environment. Counseling is an important part of the program, and is incorporated into the daily schedule. Every student is assigned to a counseling group, which meets biweekly. Emphasis is placed on conflict resolution through a verbal, rather than physical, expression of emotions.

At all times, two basic values are stressed: first, that Next Wave/Full Circle must be a safe place for everyone; and secondly, that every member of the school community must be treated with respect. Parent involvement is also crucial to students' success at Next Wave/Full Circle.

Somerville is a wonderfully diverse city located just two miles north of Boston. Occupying slightly over 4 square miles, its population of more than 75,000, including immigrants from all over the world, make Somerville the most densely populated community in New England and one of the most ethnically diverse cities in the nation. Somerville is rich in history and culture. Somerville was officially incorporated as a city in 1872, but its roots date back to 1630 when it was originally settled as part of Charlestown. Somerville's historic Powder House - now considered one of the most distinct ancient ruins in Massachusetts -was part of the route ridden by Paul Revere on his famous "Midnight Ride." Prospect Hill, another Somerville historical gem, was the site of the raising of the first Grant Union Flag. 


