The Evolution of Woman's Basketball

The face of today's game in 2021 is Sabrina Ionescu. Ionescu was named a McDonald's High School All-America and Jordan Brand All-American selection. She was named the McDonald's All-America game MVP after scoring a record 25 points, including seven three-pointers, with 10 rebounds. Ionescu left Miramonte with a career win-loss record of 119–9 and a school-record 2,606 points scored. As a senior at Oregon, Ionescu won every single national player of the year award, including Pac 10 Player of the Year and ESPN College Athlete of the year. In 2020, ESPN did a <u>Cover Story</u> on Ionescu.

It was only natural that two of the greatest basketball players of their respective generations would find each other. The friendship between Kobe Bryant and Sabrina lonescu was born out of the dream they shared: to elevate women's basketball to the national level. Along the way, lonescu became friends with Kobe's daughter Gianna "Gigi" Bryant, worked on her game with Kobe and rose to college basketball stardom at Oregon. She would credit Kobe for pushing her, and for being in her life through her victories and defeats. In Mid April, lonescu was drafted #1 overall by the WNBA's New York Liberty.
