### Course Introduction:

History Major is a course that focuses on key social studies skills. It is designed as an intensive research, writing, presentation, and project-based class that will introduce students to the practice of conducting research in history, orienting their research into written work, and orally presenting their research effectively to an audience. Students will also have the opportunity to observe and critique their peers' work while also working closely with the teacher. Our class will move through the various steps of the research process, select topics, create a thesis, use and evaluate primary and secondary sources, organize and write drafts, self and peer-critique, create and interpret data graphs, and more. In sum, the students will enjoy a year of real social studies skills actualized through student-centered project-based learning. This will promote quality participation of students in civic life and develop their ability to better address and understand society.
