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Attendance

Regular attendance is extremely important. Every student is expected to attend each day of school except when illness or some other condition beyond his/her control prevents attendance. Upon returning to school after a period of being absent, students are expected to report to the office as soon as they enter the building. A note or phone call from parents is required. Students are expected to make up work missed. Students who are habitually absent, without valid reason, may be suspended from school. Students absent from school without the knowledge or consent of parents or guardians, or students leaving school during any session without the consent of the principal, shall be considered truants.

- A. Any student who comes to class within fifteen minutes of the starting bell will be considered tardy for that hour. Anytime thereafter, the student will be considered absent from the class.
- B. Student absences shall be limited to five (5) excused days per semester for such incidents as sickness of the student or sickness or death of a member of the student's family, and medical appointments. The unused portion will not be carried into the second semester. Special health issues will be considered with a doctor's note. The Juvenile Office may be contacted in truancy situations.
- C. Makeup work for credit will be allowed for any absence which falls within the above guidelines, but makeup credit will not be allowed for absences beyond the 5 day limit unless stated on an IEP.
- D. Written or oral communication (a phone call between 8:00 am and 9:00 am is recommended) from parents or guardians will be required for all absences.
- E. When it is felt a student may have a valid reason for missing more than the allowable number of days, the administration may grant excused absences in circumstances which are not otherwise covered in this policy.
- F. Students with perfect attendance shall become eligible for special recognition.

Tardies

A student arriving late to class disrupts the educational process. Any student who comes to class within fifteen minutes of the starting bell for any class period will be considered tardy for that hour.

A tardy report will be run every month. If any student has accrued three tardies or more during that month, they are subject to a 30 minute detention. This detention will be served with all offending students and will be monitored by a designated teacher. The detention will be served at a time and date determined by the teacher.

1st- 2nd- Warning, 3rd-5th- 30 Minute Detention, 6+- 1 Hour Detention

Requests for Excused Absences During the Day

When it becomes necessary for a student to be excused from school during the day, the parent of the student must make the request in writing, by phone, or in person to the principal's office. A student leaving the building without permission from the office automatically becomes a truant.

Illness at School

Students who become ill during the day should report to the nurse for evaluation. Students who are ill will not be sent home without approval from the nurse and/or office. Those deemed ill are to report to the office where efforts will be made to contact the parents.

ISS/OSS

Any student serving an ISS will be allowed to make up missed school work while serving the ISS.

Any student serving an OSS will not be allowed to make up missed school work while serving the OSS unless otherwise decided by administration.

General Information, Rules and Regulations

1. All students 7-12 will be required to sign and return the Good Citizenship form at the start of each school year. Failure to do so may prevent students from participating in activities.
2. Students are expected to follow the directions and instructions of their teachers and school authorities.
3. Common courtesy and respect for the rights of others should be the hallmark of a Stanberry student.
4. Students may use the school building and facilities only under the direct supervision of the school staff. A faculty member must be physically present and supervising all activities held in the school building. This includes the weight-room, gymnasium and multi.
5. Vandalism and destruction of school property will not be tolerated. This school and facility belongs to all of us. Let's keep it a nice place to learn. This would include picking up your trash and keeping your belongings in order.
6. Disrespect to faculty and staff, as well as the use of foul language, is unacceptable. Running, pushing, shouting, and hitting is immature and has no place in school.
7. Fighting on school grounds will result in immediate disciplinary action.
8. We encourage students not to be in the school before 8:00 a.m. unless they are involved in a student activity. Students are not to remain in the building after dismissal unless under the supervision of a teacher.
9. Lunch is a closed lunch in the multipurpose room.
10. While we do not have a dress code, inappropriate dress is not allowed. An example might be a spaghetti strap tank top, excessively cut off t-shirts, an offensive tee shirt or one that advertises something inappropriate. No hats, including stocking hats, are to be worn in the building during the school day. Inappropriateness will be determined by the faculty and administration.
11. No food should be brought into any classroom or library. Only lidded drinks may be brought into classrooms upon teacher approval. The ala-cart breakfasts, as well as, drinks, are to be consumed in the multi before school begins. Highly caffeinated beverages and pre-workout supplements are not allowed at school. Example- Monster Drinks, Red Bull, etc. If brought on school grounds, they may be thrown away.
12. The school provides students with a locker in the hallway and in the athletic locker rooms. The school cannot be held responsible for student possessions that are left in unlocked lockers, and students are encouraged to purchase lock(s). Only school purchased locks are permitted for use and can be purchased in the office. You will take the lock(s) with you when you graduate.
13. Field Trips/Contests/Organizational meetings, etc: Students with an F are not permitted to attend these events. These events are privileges and students must earn the opportunity to attend. Poor attendance is a consideration as well.
14. Prom:
 - a. Any junior with an F on the Thursday at *noon* before prom setup will not participate in prom setup on Friday. He/she will be expected to be at school, working to improve his/her grade regardless if the grade is passing at the end of the day on Thursday. If you opt out of attending Prom, you will not participate in this activity.
 - b. Anyone who is age 21 and over or is a junior high student is not permitted to attend prom.
15. Senior trip:

Any student who does not meet graduation credit requirements will not be allowed to participate in senior trip. He/she will attend school during this time to complete any missed work in order to ensure his/her diploma. Senior contract rules also apply.
16. Graduation:
 - a. Early graduation (December) students will not be allowed to participate in prom, senior trip or graduation.
 - b. All bills, projects and grades must be cleared and paid upon last day & senior release forms must be filled out and turned in or they will not receive a diploma on Graduation day.**

Lunch (BP 5550)

Due to the large number of charges not being paid, students will only be permitted to charge up to ten meals. Once this limit is met, students will no longer be able to charge meals and will have to bring their own lunch or eat an alternative meal provided by the school. The alternative meal will include a cheese sandwich, ½ serving of fruit or vegetable and milk. We ask that lunch charges be paid promptly. If a student's lunch account has a negative balance, they will not be allowed to charge ala carte items.

Cell Phones

Stanberry 7-12 has become a "No Cell Phone" school effective August, 2020. Cell phones are no longer allowed during the school day. Students will leave their phone with their seminar teacher at the beginning of seminar each day and will retrieve them upon the 3:15 dismissal bell. The purpose of this change is to remove distractions so students can focus on acquiring foundational learning skills they need, including reading, writing and math and to develop strong critical thinking skills.

Violations of the cell phone policy will be dealt with in the following manner:

- *First Offense:* - Phone will be confiscated and kept in the school safe for two days, perhaps longer if the violation falls throughout a weekend. The phone will be returned to the student upon the end of the violation period. Should a person not choose this mode of discipline, the student can opt for two days OSS in which missed work is not allowed to be made up.
- *Second Offense:* - Same as above only violation period goes to three days.
- *Additional Offenses:* Will result in further consequences deemed by the school administration

Should smart watches become a distraction to learning; the administration reserves the right to add them to the No Cell Phone policy at any time.

School Closing

Announcements will be made on KAAN. It will also be announced on KQTV when notice of school closing is given the night before. A textcaster will be sent out as well.

Bullying (BP 2655)

The District is committed to maintaining a positive learning and working environment, free of any form of bullying or intimidation by students toward District personnel or students on school grounds, or school time, at a school sponsored activity or in a school related context. Bullying is the intentional action by an individual or group of individuals to inflict physical, emotional or mental suffering on another individual or group of individuals.

Bullying occurs when:

- harassment is repetitive or is substantially likely to be repeated
- causes a reasonable student to fear for his or her physical safety
- behavior substantially interferes with the educational performance

Students who are found to have violated this policy will be subject to those consequences detailed in the district's discipline policy. (policy 2655 in appendices)

Honor Roll

A student honor roll for students' grades 7 through 12 will be published quarterly to recognize superior scholastic achievement. Students will be given a reception in the fall and certificates will be handed out at that time for 4 quarter (a full year) honor roll accomplishments during the previous year. Certificates for either High or Regular Honor Roll all 16 quarters of High School will also be available after senior grades are calculated. High Honor Roll is a grade card with all A's. Regular Honor Roll is a grade card with all A's or B's.

Cheating

Any student(s) involved in a cheating incident will receive a zero on the cheated assignment and parents will be notified by the teacher. A detention, ISS or Saturday School may be assigned for the infraction and for any additional incidences.

Internet Policy (BP 6320)

The Stanberry School has a board approved Computer and Internet Acceptable Use Agreement in place. Due to the large expansion of computers and accessibility in the building, students and their parents will be required to have a signed use agreement on file before access is given to the Internet.

Textbooks (BP 6231)

Textbooks will be issued to students at the beginning of each term and are expected to be returned in good condition at the end of the year. Fines will be levied for missing textbooks or excessive damage. Grade reports, transcripts and diplomas may be held until all fines are paid.

Student use of cars

Students who drive cars to school are to use the north parking lot on school property. Students are asked to exit using 7th street when leaving the school grounds. Do not park in the handicap areas or in the alley behind the building.

School transportation will be used to all interscholastic events and trips. Students may ride home with their parent or guardian if they sign them out at the game using the form provided by the coaches. If a student is to ride home with someone other than a parent/guardian, a note or phone call is to be made *through the office* prior to the event. Students, however, are not allowed to leave with anyone under 21 years of age.

Health Instruction

The Stanberry R-II School District engages in health education which is a state requirement and does contain human sexuality. The Stanberry R-II School District presents a conservative, well rounded approach, which is medically and factually accurate. Parents/guardians can be advised of the content of this program or have the right to remove their student from any part of the District's human sexuality instruction.

Sexual Abuse Awareness Training (BP 2742)

Beginning in the 2020-21 school year and annually thereafter, The District will provide trauma-informed, developmentally-appropriate sexual abuse training to students in grades 6-12.

Students With Communicable Diseases (BP 2860)

A student shall not attend classes or other school-sponsored activities, if the student (1) has, or has been exposed to, an acute (short duration) or chronic (long duration) contagious or infectious disease, and (2) is liable to transmit the contagious or infectious disease, unless the Board of Education or its designee has determined, based upon medical evidence, that the student no longer has the disease, is not in the contagious or infectious stage of an acute disease or has a chronic infectious disease that poses little risk of transmission.

Extra-Curricular Activities

Eligibility to participate in school athletics and activities is a privilege - not an inherent right - granted if you meet the eligibility standards as set forth by the Missouri High School Activities Association. According to the MSHSAA eligibility standards, students must be good citizens in their school and community. More specifically, any student who represents his/her school in interscholastic activities must be a creditable citizen and be judged so by the proper school authority certifying the list of students for competition. A student whose character of conduct is such as to reflect discredit upon himself/herself or school is not considered a creditable citizen.

In addition, all after school interscholastic activities are governed by our local eligibility policy. An F on a quarter grade card (grades 7-12) makes a student ineligible for one full quarter. If a student receives a 4th quarter F, he/she will be deemed ineligible effective the date grades are due until the completion of the next year's first quarter. No student will compete or participate in an interscholastic activity with an F.

The use of alcohol and drugs is unhealthy and against the law. A confirmation of a student's drinking or drug usage will result in the following consequences (athletes may practice):

- 1st confirmed offense: From the date of the confirmation, four weeks removal from participation in interscholastic events.
- 2nd confirmed offense: From the date of the confirmation, nine weeks removal from participation in interscholastic events. The students must complete a minimum of 2 hours of outside counseling with documentation before returning.
- 3rd confirmed offense: Removal from all interscholastic events for the remainder of the year. The students must complete a minimum of 4 hours of outside counseling with documentation before returning the next school year, prior to the start of practice in August or the first day of school.

This policy is effective first day of fall practice to last day of all interscholastic events of the school year. Administration/coaches/sponsors reserve the right to impose a more strict punishment which may include removal from the team for the remainder of the season. Suspected incidences must be reported to the proper administrative officials within one week of the alleged infraction.

MSHSAA: Any incidences involving law enforcement must be reported within 24 hours of the incident and will adhere to MSHSAA guidelines for eligibility.

Students are to be at school for half a day to participate in extra-curricular events or practices. Exceptions could be determined by administration in situations with extenuating circumstances.

We have many extra-curricular activities at Stanberry both athletic and non-athletic. Each sport or activity has a set of participation rules to be given out by the individual coaches or sponsors.

Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSHSAA) policy 2.2.3 e. states:

If a student misses class(es) without being excused by the principal, the student shall not be considered eligible on that date. Further, the student cannot be certified eligible to participate on any subsequent date until the student attends a full day of classes.

Drug Free Schools (BP 2641)

This is a tobacco free school. Students are not allowed to smoke, chew or possess tobacco products on school property. This includes vaping and e-cigarettes. In addition, the use of alcohol, drugs, or the possession of these items at school is not allowed. Any of these infractions will result in disciplinary action.

Sexual Harassment Policy

A comprehensive sexual harassment policy can be found in school board policy. Sexual harassment can take many forms and is unacceptable. All cases should be reported either to staff, counselors, or the building principals for disposition. A grievance process is in place.

Access to Students Records (BP 2400)

Parents/guardians or eligible students are entitled to inspect and review the student's educational records, to request changes, to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's educational records, and to obtain a copy of this policy and guidelines as found in Board Policy.

AMI PLAN

AMI day is used to improve learning during a school day that has been cancelled due to inclement weather or closure for an extended amount of time. An AMI day means that students will complete learning activities and assignments provided by the teacher at home. Students will receive learning activities and assignments for each subject that would have originally taken place during a regular school day. attendance is recorded based on completion of assignments given during an AMI day.

Scheduling for Classes

Pre-registration will be held in the spring. Students and parents are encouraged to discuss all the information and plan accordingly to fulfill the best needs of the student.

Students will register early in August and sign up for lockers, receive all paperwork to be filled out and complete changes at that time. No classes will be changed after school starts, except for administrative reasons such as overloaded sections.

Grades

Weighted Grades/Graduation Requirements

The Stanberry R-II School Board has approved the new weighted grade scale found in the appendix for the incoming class of 2020 and all classes thereafter. A complete listing can be found in the appendix. Students can max out at 28 credits for Valedictorian and Salutatorian calculations. All outside credits will be reviewed for their validity or need in conjunction with school policy. In accordance with state law, students must pass the state and national constitution requirement.

Progress Reports

Progress reports are given, if needed, approximately halfway into each quarter. They are figured and written by the teacher. The high school office mails all progress reports to parents and these grades can be viewed electronically through the student records program.

Grade Cards

Grade Cards are given at the end of each quarter if all bills are paid and obligations are complete. First and third quarter grades are given to parents at parent/teacher conferences. Second quarter grades are given to students. Fourth Quarter grades may be mailed, depending on the end of year schedule.

The Stanberry R-II School Board approved the following weighted grade scale to become effective during the fall of 2015 for the class of 2020 and all classes thereafter.

*Due to state assessment program, Algebra I is required for all high school students; therefore, no weight will be assigned to this class.

Any classes that are not listed on the above weighted grade scale are considered "1.0" in weight and will receive points normally awarded on a regular (non-weighted) 11.0 grade scale. Any additional classes that are added to the curriculum or revisions of the above weighted grade scale must first receive recommendation and approval from the weighted grade scale committee. Final approval for any weighted grade scale changes must be made by the Stanberry R-II School Board.

How the Stanberry R-II High School Weighted Grade Scale functions:

<u>11.0 Grade Scale</u> 11.0 = A 10.0 = A- 9.0 = B+ 8.0 = B 7.0 = B- 6.0 = C+ 5.0 = C 4.0 = C- 3.0 = D+ 2.0 = D 1.0 = D- 0.0 = F	Stanberry R-II High School students receive points for each semester letter grade they earn; these points are averaged together to determine cumulative grade point averages (GPA) which establish class rank. For example, if a student earns an “A” in Biology, it would be worth 11.0 points when averaged for cumulative GPA since this class would be considered at “1.0” weight on the above scale. The 11.0 points for this “A” is then multiplied by its class weight (1.0) to receive a total point accumulation of 11.0. This 11.0 point total is then added when figuring cumulative GPA. Language Arts IV, however, is weighted “1.3” on the above scale. If a student earns a “B” [worth 8.0 points on the regular (non-weighted) 11.0 scale], this 8.0 point total is then multiplied by its class weight (1.3) to receive a weighted grade scale total point accumulation of 10.4. This 10.4 total is then added when figuring cumulative GPA.

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Stanberry R-II High School Graduation Requirements

A student must fulfill the following to satisfy specific state legal requirements, as well as local requirements, in order to be graduated from Stanberry High School. State mandated graduation requirements were approved by the State Board of Education in October of 2005. Furthermore:

- A. To receive a Stanberry R-II High School diploma, a student must complete eight semesters of attendance during grades nine and above and earn a minimum of 24 units of credit in an educational program. This program should be cooperatively planned by the student, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s), and the school to meet the individual needs of the student. Additional information about high school classes and local requirements can be found in the 9-12 Course Description Guide. This educational program shall consist of at least the minimum units of credit in the following areas:

*Local requirements. Both of these, along with Personal Finance, will fulfill the State's requirement for 1 unit of a Practical Art and add .5 units of credit toward the 24 needed for graduation.

- B. It is strongly recommended that all students attend high school for a total of eight semesters. However, the eight semesters of attendance may be waived by the Board if a student earns a minimum of 24 units of credit during grades nine and above in an educational program that should be cooperatively planned by the student, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s), and the school to meet the individual needs of the student.
- C. The Stanberry Board of Education shall reserve the right to waive course requirements in special circumstances.

Stanberry R-II Selection Process **for the North Central Area Vocational-Technical School**

Selection for the Stanberry R-II District's students who will attend the North Central Area Vocational-Technical School (NCAVTS) at Bethany, Missouri, will be dependent upon a variety of areas. A committee composed of the superintendent, the secondary principal, the guidance counselor, and a secondary instructor will make the final selection of students by using a ranking process.

Each Stanberry applicant will be ranked in relation to the areas which follow:

1. Four-year plan (review of applicant's plans since their freshman year).
2. Desire to complete the second year of a specific NCAVTS program.
3. Desire to complete a one-year NCAVTS program as a senior.
4. Attendance of Vocational Awareness Day at NCAVTS during the spring of the applicant's sophomore year.
5. Eleven Units of credit by their sophomore year.
6. Seventeen Units of credit by their junior year.
7. Attendance
8. Tardiness
9. Test scores at Stanberry R-II
10. Work ethic
11. Attitude
12. Timeliness of the application process

Saturday School

By being placed in Saturday School, the student has either skipped school or other disciplinary measures have been exhausted. The school may also conduct an Academic Saturday School for students that are on the F list.

While in Saturday School, the student will:

- Arrive to the Saturday School room and be seated by 8:00 am. You will be dismissed at noon.
- Bring all materials needed to complete assignments, or have free reading materials or other work to do.
- Follow all oral and written directions given by the supervisor.
- Bring expected supplies to complete assignments. (The rest of the building is not open)
- Sit properly in the chair and do not leave the assigned seat without permission.
- No sleeping. You must be working, reading, etc. or you will be assigned further busy work.
- Take drinks or use the restroom only when instructed.

The student will follow all the above rules and any additional verbal instructions given by the instructor. If any of the rules are not followed, the student will be asked to leave the school grounds and will be referred to the principal for further disciplinary action.

If a student was assigned for disciplinary purposes, the principal will assign a minimum of two days out of school suspension for any violation of the above rules or skipping an assigned disciplinary Saturday school.

If the student skips Academic Saturday school, a minimum of one day in school suspension will be given for the first missed Saturday school. On the second and subsequent days missed, two days ISS will be given.

Students may make up work during an ISS, however, if a student serves OSS, no credit for missed work will be given.

Behavioral Expectations

The discipline code set out in this regulation is intended to be illustrative but not an exclusive listing of acts of misconduct and the consequences for each. Misconduct which is not specifically listed in this regulation may be deemed to warrant discipline up to and including expulsion following provision of all due process procedures. In addition, the disciplinary consequence listed for each offense may be increased or decreased by the Administration or the Board of Education due to mitigating circumstances.

Copies of the regulation as well as the District's corporal punishment policy will be provided to each student at the beginning of each school year upon request. Copies of these documents will be also be available for public inspection during normal business hours in the Superintendent's office. (BP 2670)

1. Possession or presence under the influence of a controlled substance or substance represented to be a controlled substance while at school, on the school playground, on the school parking lot, on a school bus or at a school activity, whether on or off school property (including counterfeit drugs or drug-related paraphernalia.) In addition, this includes prescription medication without a valid prescription for such medication on school premises or on a school bus.
First Offense: 11-180 days out-of-school suspension, notification to law enforcement officials.

Subsequent Offense: Expulsion, notification to law enforcement officials.
2. Sale or distribution of a controlled substance or substance represented to be a controlled substance (including unauthorized prescription drugs, counterfeit drugs, or drug related paraphernalia).
First Offense: 11-180 days out-of-school suspension, notification to law enforcement officials.

Subsequent Offense: Expulsion, notification to law enforcement officials.
3. Assault of Student-Use of physical force with the intent to do bodily harm.
First Offense: In school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out of school suspension, or expulsion, notification to law enforcement officials.

Subsequent Offense: 11-180 days out of school suspension, or expulsion, notification of law enforcement officials.
4. Assault of Staff Member-Use of physical force with intent to do bodily harm
First Offense: 1-180 days out of school suspension, or expulsion, notification to law enforcement officials.

Subsequent Offense: 11-180 days out of school suspension, or expulsion, notification of law enforcement officials.
5. Possession of a Firearm or Weapon on school premises (BP 2620)
First Offense: (Cannot be less than one-year suspension however suspension can be modified if deemed by Superintendent and BOE) (Students that have an IEP developed by the special services staff can appeal the suspension to the superintendent) Law enforcement and/or juvenile office will be notified.

Subsequent Offense: (Cannot be less than one-year suspension) (Students that have an IEP developed by the special services staff can appeal the suspension to the superintendent) Law enforcement will be notified.

6. Possession of or presence under the influence of alcohol while at school, on the school playground, on the school parking lot, on a school bus or at a school activity, whether on or off school property as provided for by the school policy for activities.

First Offense: 1-10 days out-of-school suspension

Subsequent Offense: 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, expulsion.

7. Arson-Intentionally causing or attempting to cause a fire or explosion

First Offense: 11-180 days of out-of-school suspension or expulsion, law enforcement and/or juvenile office will be notified.

Subsequent Offense: Expulsion, notification to law enforcement officials.

8. Inappropriate Sexual Conduct- Refer to Policy and Regulation 2130-Harassment

Physical touching of another student in the area of the breasts, buttocks, or genitalia

First Offense: In-School Suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Subsequent Offense: 1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Use of sexually intimidating language, objects, or pictures

First Offense: In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Subsequent Offense: 1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

Indecent Exposure—Includes display of buttocks and genitalia in a public location

First Offense: In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Subsequent Offense: 1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion.

9. Harassment (BP/R 2130)

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Subsequent Offense: In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

10. Threatening Language- Use of verbal threats to do bodily harm

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion,

Subsequent Offense: In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension,

11. Extortion-Verbal threats or physical conduct designed to obtain money or other valuables

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-10 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Subsequent Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

12. Fighting-Physically striking another in a mutual contact as differentiated from an assault

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Subsequent Offense: 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

13. Disruptive Behavior-Conduct which has intentional effect of disturbing education

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, In-school suspension, Saturday School

Subsequent Offense: Detention, In-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-90 Days out-of-school suspension

14. Theft-Non-consensual taking or attempt to take the property of another

First Offense: In-school suspension, Saturday School, or 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, possible notification to law enforcement officials.

Subsequent Offense: 11-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion, notification to law enforcement officials.

15. Vandalism-Intentional damage or attempt to damage property belonging to the staff, students, or the District

First Offense: Restitution, Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion, possible notification to law enforcement.

Subsequent Offense: 1-180 days out-of-school suspension or expulsion, notification to law enforcement.

16. Truancy-Absent from school or leaving the building during any session without authorization

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-10 days out-of-school suspension

Subsequent Offense: 1-3 days In-school suspension or Out-of-school suspension

17. Defiance of Authority-Refusal to obey directions or defiance of staff authority

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-10 days out-of-school suspension

Subsequent Offense: Detention, In-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 Days out-of-school suspension

18. Improper Displays of Affection-Consensual kissing, fondling, or embracing

First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, In-School suspension, Saturday School

Subsequent Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, in-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

19. Indecent Exposure-Includes display in public location of breasts, buttock, and genitals
First Offense: In-School suspension, Saturday School, 1-10 days out-of-school suspension
Subsequent Offense: 5-180 days out-of-school suspension, expulsion.
20. Use of Obscene or Vulgar Language - Language, which depict sexual acts, human waste, and blasphemous language
First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, In-school suspension, Saturday School
Subsequent Offense: Detention, In-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 Days out-of-school suspension
21. Possession or use of tobacco or tobacco products, to include vaping, e-cigarettes, etc.
Possession:
First Offense: Student/Principal conference, ISS
Subsequent Offense: ISS, 1-10 days out of school suspension
Usage:
First Offense: Student/Principal conference, ISS
Subsequent Offense: ISS, 1-10 days out of school suspension
22. Disruptive Speech or Conduct-Use of hate language to demean other persons due to the race, gender, disability, natural origin, or religious beliefs. This provision also includes conduct, verbal, written, or symbolic speech, which materially and substantially disrupts class, school activities, transportation, or school functions.
First Offense: Principal/Student conference and/or detention, In-school suspension, Saturday School, or 1-10 days out-of-school suspension
Subsequent Offense: In-school suspension, Saturday School, 1-180 days out-of-school suspension, or expulsion.

Buses

It is customary for the superintendent's office to handle bus service and questions about it, although any office can handle requests for bus pick-up. Students are to follow all bus rules. The school bus driver will be responsible for referring discipline problems to the bus manager; in turn, the bus manager will contact the building principal. The building principal shall have authority to suspend a student from riding the bus.

BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The driver is in charge of the pupils and the bus. Pupils must obey the driver promptly.
2. Classroom conduct is to be observed by the pupils while riding the bus, except for ordinary conversation.
3. Students must remain seated and face the front of the bus until their own bus stop is reached. The driver may assign a seat for any student.
4. Unnecessary conversation with the driver is prohibited.
5. Students must be on time. The bus cannot wait beyond its regular schedule.
6. Students riding on any but their assigned bus or getting off the bus at any but their assigned bus stop must bring a signed note from a parent to the teacher. If a parent calls school with a bus route or stop change, the teacher or school secretary will write a note confirming verbal permission from a parent.
7. Students must not at any time extend arms or head out of the bus window.
8. Eating or drinking on the bus is not allowed.
9. No tobacco products allowed on the bus.
10. Do not throw any article inside the bus or out the window.
11. No glass containers allowed on the bus.
12. Pupils who must cross the road after leaving the bus shall cross in front of the bus.
13. Stand back at the bus stop until the driver opens the door.
14. Students must treat each other with mutual respect. Verbal or physical harassment will be reported to the principal for necessary action.
15. The bus company cannot be responsible for items lost or stolen on the bus.
16. No animals, insects, etc., allowed on the bus without prior permission.

BUS CONDUCT PROCEDURE

Disciplinary incidents will be reported by drivers to the bus manager. The bus manager will turn bus conduct reports into the appropriate school principal. Upon receipt of a bus conduct report, the following action will be taken:

- First Offense: Principal conferences with student and contacts parents.
- Second Offense: Principal conferences with student, contacts parents, assigns student to a specific seat on the bus.
- Third Offense: Principal conferences with student, contacts parents, student suspended from the use of bus transportation for one week. Further incidences could result in removal for the rest of a school year.

SEVERE CLAUSE

Major violations, listed below, will be dealt with following school discipline procedures in the student handbook and may be subject to immediate suspension from the bus.

1. Smoking, having drugs, or throwing firecrackers in or at the bus.
2. Having dangerous items such as weapons, knives, matches, cigarette lighters, or sharp blades on the bus.
3. Foul, profane, or abusive language.
4. Damaging the bus, such as, cutting seats, etc.
5. Fighting on the bus.
6. Creating a safety hazard for the entire bus.

Title 1 Parent Notification of Teacher Qualifications

NOTIFICATION OF TEACHER QUALIFICATIONS

Dear Parent or Guardian:

Our district is required to inform you of certain information that you, according to the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 10-110) have the right to know.

Upon your request, our district is required to provide to you, in a timely manner, the following information:

- Whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualifications or licensing criteria have been waived.
- Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.
- What baccalaureate degree major the teacher has and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification.

In addition the information that you may request, the District will provide to you individually:

- Information on the achievement level of your child in each of the state academic assessments as required under this part; and
- Timely notice that your child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who is not highly qualified.

Dear Parents and Guardians:

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Stanberry R-II School District, with certain exceptions, obtains your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Stanberry R-II School District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Stanberry R-II School District to include this type of information from your child's educational records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

If you do not want Stanberry R-II School District to disclose directory information from your child's educational records without your prior written consent, you must notify the District in writing by 10 days of the district's public notice. Stanberry R-II School District has designated the following information as directory information:

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Nondiscrimination and Student Rights**Searches by School Personnel**

School lockers and desks are the property of the Board of Education and are provided for the convenience of students, and as such, are subject to periodic inspection without notice, without student, and without a search warrant. The lockers and desks may be searched by school administrators or staff who have a reasonable suspicion that the lockers or desks contain drugs, alcohol, material of a disruptive nature, stolen properties, weapons, items posing a danger to the health or safety of students and school employees, or evidence of a violation of school policy. In addition, the Board of Education authorizes the use of trained dogs to sniff lockers or other school property to assist in the detection of the presence of drugs, explosives, and other contraband.

Students or student property may be searched based on reasonable suspicion of a violation of District rules, policy or state law. Reasonable suspicion must be based on facts known to the administration, credible information provided or reasonable inference drawn from such facts or information. The privacy and dignity of students shall be respected. Searches shall be carried out in the presence of adult witnesses, if such witnesses are available. Students may be asked to empty pockets, remove jackets, coats shoes and other articles of exterior clothing for examination if reasonable under the circumstances.

No employee shall perform a strip search of any student. The exception to this would be if a school administrator reasonably believes that a student possesses a weapon, explosive, or substance that poses an imminent threat of physical harm to himself or another person, and if a commissioned law enforcement officer is not immediately available. Strip searches may be conducted by, or under the authority of, a commissioned law enforcement officer.

Students are permitted to park on school premises as a matter of privilege, not of right. The school retains the authority to conduct routine patrols of the student parking lots. The interior of a student's automobile on school premises may be searched if a school administrator has reasonable suspicion to believe that illegal, unauthorized or contraband items, or evidence of a violation of school policy is contained inside the vehicle.

Law enforcement officials shall be contacted if the search produces a controlled substance, drug paraphernalia, weapons, stolen goods or evidence of a crime, in any case involving a violation of law when a student refuses to allow a search, or where the search cannot safely be conducted. Parents may also be contacted. A student who refuses to submit to a search may be appropriately disciplined by school officials.

Discipline**Bullying**

The District is committed to maintaining a learning and working environment free of any form of bullying or intimidation. Bullying is strictly prohibited on school grounds, or school time, at a school sponsored activity or in a school related context. Bullying is the intentional action by an individual or group of individuals to inflict intimidation, unwanted aggressive behavior, or harassment that is repetitive or is substantially likely to be repeated and causes a reasonable student to fear for his or her physical safety or property; substantially interferes with the educational performance, opportunities, or benefits of any student without exception; or substantially disrupts the orderly operation of the school. Bullying may consist of physical actions, including gestures, or oral, cyberbullying, electronic, or written communication, and any threat of retaliation for reporting acts of bullying.

Cyberbullying means bullying as defined above through the transmission of a communication including, but not limited to, a message, text, sound, or image by means of an electronic device including, but not limited to, a telephone, wireless telephone, or other wireless communication device, computer, or pager. The District may prohibit and discipline for cyberbullying that originates on any District campus or at a District activity if the electronic communication was made using the school's technological resources, if there is a sufficient nexus to the educational environment, or if the electronic communication was made on the District's campus or at a District activity using the student's own personal technological resources. Further, students who engage in significant acts of misconduct off campus which materially and adversely impact the education of District students will be subject to discipline.

Bullying, as defined in this policy, is strictly prohibited. Students are encouraged to report any incident of bullying which they have witnessed or incurred, by contacting their building principal. District employees are required to report any instance of bullying of which the employee has witnessed within two (2) school days of the occurrence. Employees shall report the occurrence to the building principal, who is the person the District designates to receive reports of incidents of bullying. A principal who receives a report of an incident of bullying shall initiate an investigation into the allegations within two (2) school days of receipt of the report. The principal may assign other employees to assist in the investigation, or request that the superintendent assign an outside investigator. The investigation shall be completed within ten school days from the date of the written report of bullying unless good cause exists to extend the investigation. No employee or student who reports an act of bullying shall be subject to reprisal or retaliation for making such a report. Any person who engages in reprisal or retaliation against an employee or student who reports an act of bullying shall be subject to disciplinary action.

Students who are found to have violated this policy will be subject to consequences depending on factors such as: age of student(s), degree of harm, severity of behavior, number of incidences, etc. Possible consequences to a student for a violation of this policy include: loss of privileges, classroom detention, conference with teacher, parents contacted, conference with principal, in-school suspension, out-of-school suspension, expulsion and law enforcement contacted.

The District shall give annual notice of the policy to students, parents or guardians, and staff. This policy shall be included in all student handbooks. This policy shall also be posted on the District's web page (as a Board policy) and a copy shall be placed in the District Administrative Office.

The District shall provide information and appropriate training to District staff who have significant contact with students regarding the policy. All staff with significant student contact shall be trained on the requirements of this policy on an annual basis.

The District shall provide education and information to students regarding bullying, including information regarding this policy prohibiting bullying, the harmful effects of bullying, and other applicable initiatives to address bullying, including student peer-to-peer initiatives to provide accountability and policy enforcement for those found to have engaged in bullying, reprisal, or retaliation against any person who reports an act of bullying. The District shall instruct its school counselors, school social workers, licensed social workers, mental health professionals, and school psychologists to educate students who are victims of bullying on techniques for students to overcome bullying's negative effects. Such techniques include but are not limited to, cultivating the student's self-worth and self-esteem; teaching the student to defend himself or herself assertively and effectively; helping the student develop social skills or encouraging the student to develop an internal locus of control. District administrators will implement programs and other initiatives to address bullying, to respond to such conduct in a manner that does not stigmatize the victim, and to make resources or referrals available to victims of bullying.

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PROHIBITION AGAINST HARASSMENT, DISCRIMINATION AND RETALIATION (Board Policy 1300)

The District is committed to maintaining an educational and workplace environment that is free from discrimination, harassment, and retaliation in admission or access to, or treatment or employment in, its programs, services, activities and facilities. The District is committed to providing equal opportunity in all areas of education, recruiting, hiring, retention, promotion and contracted service.

In its programs and activities, the District does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, age, genetic information, or any other characteristic protected by law and as required by Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, and state law. In addition, the District provides equal access to the Boy Scouts of America and other designated youth groups. Further, no person shall be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subject to discrimination based on the above listed characteristics under a school nutrition program for which the District receives federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA Food and Nutrition Service).

This Policy governs the District's compliance with the laws identified above, outside of Title IX. The following person is designated and authorized as the District's Compliance Officer to coordinate compliance with the laws identified above (outside of Title IX), including to handle inquiries or complaints regarding the District's non-discrimination policies:

A complaint by students, employees, parents, and patrons of the District alleging harassment, discrimination, or related retaliation based on a protected classification under the laws identified above (outside of Title IX) should be filed in accordance with the procedures outlined in Regulation 1300. A complaint regarding sexual harassment or related retaliation of a student or employee under Title IX and that is alleged to have occurred on or after August 14, 2020, should be filed in accordance with the procedures outlined in Regulation 1301. A complaint regarding the identification, evaluation, educational program, or placement of a child with a disability under Section 504 should be filed in accordance with the procedures outlined in Regulation 2110.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Parents have the right to file complaints with the U.S. Department of Education or the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education concerning alleged failures by the district to meet the requirements of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

The Stanberry R-II School District has developed a Local Compliance Plan for the implementation of State Regulations for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). This plan contains the agency's policies and procedures regarding storage, disclosure to third parties, retention and destruction of personally identifiable information and the agency's assurances that services are provided in compliance with the General Education Provision Act (GEPA). This plan may be reviewed at the school during regular school hours.
