Dear Indian Creek Families.

October brings a crispness to the air and thoughts of the change in seasons. Our focus at school is on high levels of learning for all. We look forward to parent/teacher conferences as a way to share goals for the school year.

Parents often ask us here at school, what can we do at home to help our children with reading? Parents are their child's first and most important teacher. It's almost impossible to overestimate the tremendous impact parents have on their child's reading success. Throughout the first years of school, teachers are helping your child develop reading skills that will enable him or her to become a proficient reader. But make no mistake, learning to read takes practice, practice and more practice—much more than a child can get during a school day.

You can provide reading opportunities and extra guidance at home by simply implementing some simple activities. They are sure to help your child with reading comprehension regardless of what skill level they are currently at. Equally important, these activities will help foster a love for reading.

The good news is that teaching reading comprehension strategies are really second nature to parents. For example, when a mother says something like, "Jenny, tell your dad what we did at the zoo today," that builds a foundation for understanding how narratives work. While it would be great if all instructional techniques where this intuitive, most parents need a little nudge in the right direction.

Helping your child develop good reading comprehension skills involves planning. In other words, you need to give them the tools they need to apply to whatever kind of book you're reading together.

Before reading a book about ocean life, for example, first talk to your child about how fish are different from mammals and have to live in a water environment. Preview the text to find unfamiliar words like "gills" and "vertebrate" and explain them before you start reading. Talk about the fish you may have seen in a pet store or at the beach. You can even go the extra mile and take your child to the local aquarium. Does this sound a little extreme? Not at all – teachers do it all the time! Just trust that these steps will go a long way in comprehension development.

Studies show that children are exposed to a larger variety of words in children's books that are read to them than from what they hear on prime time TV. That means anything you read to them will enlarge their vocabulary much more than the conversational dribble heard on television.

Remember that your child's listening vocabulary is much larger than their reading vocabulary. When you read books that are interesting to your child, both reading and writing vocabularies increase. That's because if they have heard a word before in context, then when it's presented in the classroom they will be able to recognize it with greater comprehension.

Good readers unconsciously create visual images in their heads while they are reading. It's all part of the comprehension process. While you are reading to your child, think out loud about the images you see or the questions that may arise. That means explaining the ideas, pictures, questions, and connections that go through your mind as you read a passage. Here's an example of a think aloud: The title of this book is Bobby: The Bravest Boxer. There is a picture of a dog on the cover so that tells me Bobby is a boxer dog instead of a man that boxes. I wonder what the dog did that proved his bravery. I need to read ahead and find out. Oh, on the next page it says, "Bobby got very nervous when the children were playing outside all alone, especially if they are near the street." That tells me that Bobby may do something to protect one of the children in the family. But how? I have to read on to find out more.

Most all children jump at the opportunity to play a little role reversal. As you and your child are reading, take turns coming up with questions, making predictions, and summarizing. You be the student and let your son or daughter be the teacher. Children love being able to say things like "Dad, tell me what you think will happen next!"

One of the most important things parents can do is to provide reading material that is interesting and relevant. Nothing turns a child off reading like boring content. If your reader is a young boy make sure he has access to scary stories, sports books, or science fiction. And if your girl likes those things as well, make sure she has them in addition to stories about animals, fairytales, or babysitting clubs.

By consistently using these reading comprehension tips and strategies you'll provide a learning environment that will accelerate your child's reading comprehension development. Not only that, you'll form a parent – child bond that will serve your child well as he or she meets the challenges of school years and beyond.

We hope this has given you some tips about helping your child with reading at home. Meanwhile, enjoy the beautiful autumn weather during the month of October!

FAST or Formative Assessment System for Teachers

Three times a year, Kindergarten through Fifth Grade students will be assessed on a variety of skills that are essential to reading. The staff in the Linn-Mar Community School District is using the FAST assessment. FAST stands for Formative Assessment System for Teachers.

Throughout the school year, Kindergarten students are assessed on the following skills:

- Reading letter names and identifying letter sounds.
- Understanding concepts of print (eg. We read from left to right on a page).
- Identifying individual sounds they hear in a word (eg. "at" has two sounds" /a/ and /t/).
- Reading commonly used words by sight (eg. "the").
- Blending sounds together to read simple words.

The FAST/CBM assessment screens the following First Grade skills:

- Reading simple sentences.
- Number of words read correctly in one minute related to decoding, vocabulary, and comprehension.
- Identifying individual sounds they hear in a word (eg. "at" has two sounds" /a/ and /t/).
- Reading commonly used words by sight (eg. "the").
- Blending sounds together to read simple words.

The FAST/CBM assessment screens the following Second through Fifth Grade skills:

 Overall measure of reading skills where the student reads aloud a passage for one minute. The teacher records the number of words the student reads correctly along with reading accuracy. The CBM Reading provides an overall indication of how well the student is reading and is related to other reading skills like decoding, vocabulary, and comprehension.

On October4, your child will bring a letter home with his/her fall benchmark scores. Teachers will also review this information with you at conferences.

ARTIST OF THE MONTH - Each month an artist from each grade level is selected for quality work and effort. These are displayed in the art room.



Arriving Late to School &

Leaving Early From School

Students who are arriving to school after 8:00 AM need to be escorted into the school office by an adult, the adult will then sign the student in for the day. All students arriving after 8:00 AM, whether they are tardy or coming from an appointment are required to be signed into school by an adult.

If your child needs to leave school during school hours, a written note should be sent to your child's teacher the morning of the day your child will need to leave school. Please include the name of the individual(s) who will be responsible for picking up your child. It is also helpful if you let the person picking up your child know which teacher your child has, this is also a safety precaution for our staff.

When signing a child out of school early, go directly to the Indian Creek Office where you may sign your son or daughter out on the appropriate list, at that time we will call your student to the office, we do not call students to the office unless a parent is in the office to pick them up. When returning to school, we ask all parents and students to please report to the Indian Creek Office to sign-in. Students should not go to their classrooms before their parents sign them into school and parents are asked to let their students return to their classrooms on their own. PINK NOTES

Pink notes are a communication tool sent at the end of the day to students who have a change in their typical way home ~ please remember the notes are not meant to be a daily communication. It is best to send a note to your child's teacher in the morning indicating how he or she will be going home if you have a change in plans. If you need to call to make a change you will need to call before 2:00 pm and know who your child's teacher is and what their bus number is ~ these are safety measures to ensure safety for our students. We ask that you do not send an e-mail indicating changes for your children as we cannot guarantee the person receiving the e-mail will be able to see the message in time, or they may be out of the office for the day, or in meetings. The Counselor Corner

Many children and families have discovered the fun entertainment of video games. From handheld individual devices to large interactive game systems, our children are able to enter imaginative worlds of fun challenges and competition. For most kids their video game time provides a chance to relax and enjoy some free time either alone or with family and friends. But, how much is too much and how do parents decide which games are okay for kids to play?

Fortunately there are many groups that provide guidelines and suggestions for age appropriateness and limits for video games. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) suggests limiting screen time (TV or video games) to two hours per day or 14 hours per week. The American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP) and the AAP take the view that exposure to violent media (including video games) can contribute to real-life violent behavior and harm children in other ways.

So how can parents determine which games are okay for kids to play? The Entertainment Software Rating Board (ESRB) has developed a rating system for video games, similar to movie ratings. Checking the ESRB rating of a game can help you determine if a game is appropriate for your child. Video games with a T (Teen) rating should be carefully previewed and monitored by parents to determine the level of questionable and objectionable content.

Know that it is our belief here at Indian Creek that NONE of our students are old enough to play or watch video games with an M (Mature) rating. Developmentally, their brains aren't ready to process the violence and mature scenarios that are presented in the games. Often students who have the opportunity to play or watch video games rated T or M will come to school 'acting out' the scenes from the games 'shooting' their fingers around the playground or at peers. Others become de-sensitized to some of the language used in the games and begin using those words while playing and interacting with peers. This language and behavior can cause concern and hurt feelings among peers.

We understand that some families use video game time as a way for their families to participate in an activity together. It is our belief that this family together time should not include video games with a T or M rating.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

Titles rated EC (Early Childhood) have content that may be suitable for ages 3 and older. Contains no material that parents would find inappropriate.



EVERYONE

Titles rated **E** (Everyone) have content that may be suitable for ages 6 and older. Titles in this category may contain minimal cartoon, fantasy or mild violence and/or infrequent use of mild language.



EVERYONE 10+

Titles rated **E10+** (Everyone 10 and older) have content that may be suitable for ages 10 and older. Titles in this category may contain more cartoon, fantasy or mild violence, mild language and/or minimal suggestive themes.



TEEN

Titles rated T (Teen) have content that may be suitable for ages 13 and older. Titles in this category may contain violence, suggestive themes, crude humor, minimal blood, simulated gambling, and/or infrequent use of strong language.



MATURE

Titles rated M (Mature) have content that may be suitable for persons ages 17 and older. Titles in this category may contain intense violence, blood and gore, sexual content and/or strong language.



ADULTS ONLY

Titles rated **AO** (Adults Only) have content that should only be played by persons 18 years and older. Titles in this category may include prolonged scenes of intense violence and/or graphic sexual



RATING PENDING

Titles designated as **RP** (**Rating Pending**) have not yet been assigned a final ESRB rating. This icon appears only in advertising, marketing and promotional materials related to a game that is expected to carry an ESRB rating. The RP is replaced by a game's rating once it has been assigned.
